



When we make decisions based on things such as these core Gospel truths we really act as Christ himself, revealing to others the new creations that we are. This is how we live our baptism.





St. Hilary of Poitiers, Bishop and Doctor of the Church | January 13



Born a pagan, St. Hilary (c. 315 – c. 367) studied philosophy and the meaning of life, eventually making his way through the bible. He became a convert and was appointed bishop of Poitiers in 353. Sometimes referred to as the Hammer of the Arians, St. Hilary defended the Nicene Creed against a popular heresy, Arianism. He was exiled to Phrygia for opposing Roman emperor Constantius II, who

preferred the heresy which denies Christ's divinity. From Phyrgia St. Hilary fought with his pen, zealously writing against the heresy.

Eventually he was allowed to return to Poitiers, but did so by a circuitous route, preaching against Arianism all the way. St. Hilary was likely the first writer of hymns in the West, his writings on the Trinity, Psalms and Gospel of Matthew survive today. St. Hilary was created Doctor of the Church, a title given to those who provided important contributions to theology and doctrine, in 1851 by Pope Pius IX.

Earth Stewardship Ministry: Introduction to PFAS

This is the first in a series of articles on PFAS. As we learn more about the health risks of these "forever chemicals," we will hear of them more frequently. The Earth Ministry team wants to prepare you to understand PFAS. The letters stand for Per- and Poly-Fluoro Alkyl Substances. Some of these manufactured chemicals have been used since the 1940's.



They are found in and associated with the making of firefighting foam, Teflon, and liquid repellents like Scotchguard, Stainmaster and Gore-Tex. They are not currently regulated by the federal government or the state of Wisconsin.

We are now realizing that they can cause serious health problems, such as decreased fertility, high blood pressure, developmental delays, cancers (prostate, kidney, and testicular), reduced ability to fight infections, interference with the body's natural hormones, increased cholesterol, and increased risk of obesity. The PFAS can be found in water, soil, air, food, and many materials found in homes and workplaces. They breakdown very, very slowly and so they have been building up in people, animals and the environment since the 1940's.

In today's reading from the Gospel of Luke we hear the proclamation of the baptism of Jesus with "all the people." Indeed, "heaven was opened," and the Father announced his special favor. I Hope I Am Like Him

"Who is this Christ? Is he like you?"

Perhaps you've heard this story, often attributed to the life of St. Teresa of Calcutta. A sick man asked her this question, as he marveled at her tireless service to himself and others in the name of someone named Jesus Christ.

"He is nothing like me," the saint is said to have answered. "But I hope I am like him."

Though the authenticity of this exchange cannot be verified, its message rings perfectly true: all the value of our stewardship lies in its relativity to the one in whose name we perform it.

Consider the figure of John the Baptist — a magnificent, towering character even purely from a literary or historical perspective. A martyr who fed on wild locusts

Memorializing the Deceased

Because of their commitment to their parish and out of concern for helping it to continue its mission, many parishioners choose to name the parish in their last will and testament. They wish also to remain connected to the community, even in death, by remembrance in prayer. All too frequently, however, their good intentions toward the parish are defeated by wording used in their wills.

When a bequest is made to a parish and the amount of the bequest is attached to the offering of Masses (e.g. "I bequeath to St. X Parish \$10,000 for Masses to be said for my intentions."), the entire amount mentioned must be set aside for Mass offerings. Using this example, 1000 Masses are to be offered for the deceased individual. What many people do not understand is that none of this bequest goes to support the parish and its programs or ministry. Mass offerings are given to the priest who celebrates the Mass, either directly or through a salary offset system, not to the parish and its ministries.

If the intention of donors is to have the parish benefit from their generosity, their wills should be worded in such a manner that is it clear that the bequest is directed to the parish itself. Requests that their intentions be remembered in Masses can also be made, but such requests are separate from and independent of the amount of the bequest. Every Sunday and holy day, the pastor offers the Mass for the People, for the intentions of living and deceased members of the parish. Their intentions will surely be remembered at this time. Since the breadth of God's mercy and the graces of the Eucharist are beyond our human calculations, it is difficult to understand how, from our faith perspective, we would insist on the need for hundreds of Masses to be said for any one specific person.

Since parishes may not accept more Mass offerings than can be fulfilled in a single year, frequently these large numbers of Mass offerings must be directed elsewhere, precluding the direct involvement of the parish in these prayers for the deceased.

The wording of the bequest can also result in tax implications. When Mass offerings are attached to the bequest, the amount is free of estate tax only within certain limits; a bequest made directly to the parish is completely free from estate tax, regardless of the amount of the gift.

and boldly spoke truth to power — a man so great some mistook him for the Messiah.

But why is he great? Because he prepared the way. All his accomplishments and escapades mean nothing if they are taken out of the context of salvation history.
