



LIVE THE LITURGY

Inspiration for the week

With our world in such constant turmoil and conflict, it makes such good sense to return to the simple directives given in the Ten Commandments. It is also a time to remember that Jesus is the true sign of God's presence. Everything he says and does, including his suffering and death, is a sign of the God who sent him. The anger we witness when Jesus exhorts those in the temple to stop making his Father's house a marketplace can equally be seen in his anger and frustration over humanity's constant mission to turn God's creation into a secular world. We have a lot of work to do for sure.

NEW TABLES

In our Gospel Jesus, who is often described as “*meek and humble of heart*,” made “*a whip out of cords and drove them (merchants and money changers) out of the temple area. ... Take these out of here, and stop making my Father’s house a marketplace.*” His words and actions took place in the Temple, yet he called it “*my Father’s house.*” Jesus’ message is crystal clear: what is going on in the Temple area is no longer appropriate for “his Father’s house.”

“People can be measured by what angers them.”

This incident tells us something about Jesus and something about ourselves. People can be measured by what angers them. While anger can be dangerous, it can provide the respectable and desirable energy to reform and improve. Anger can become the primary Lenten emotion and form the basis for a series of reflective questions.

We get angry when we are stalled in traffic, or treated poorly in commercial establishments, but are we angry over poverty, starvation, homelessness, violence, or corruption? Allow Lent to become the Church’s official time to get angry enough to overturn old tables and set up new ones. What new tables might we set up? Start with these five:

First, love things that are worth loving. Some things are not worth loving—cars, electronics, clothes or celebrities. The things worth loving are God, family, friends, and faith to name a few. (1) I will love things worth loving!

Second, put first things first. Jesus reminds us, “*Seek first his Kingdom, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.*” [Matthew 5:20] Celebrating the Eucharist on Sunday comes first before anything else. Putting vacation plans, sports activities, or social events before that, is not a Catholic priority. Being present to family, children, and those in need comes before any of our leisure activities. **(2) I will put first things first!**

Third, cultivate spiritual insight. This means seeing beyond the realities we can see, or the stuff of the buildings in which we live, to the ultimate spiritual reality behind everything, which is God. It means seeing our brothers and sisters as they really are, as children of God made in his image and likeness, and treating them accordingly. (3) I will cultivate spiritual insight!

Fourth, remember to never do anything to damage your integrity, which means to avoid whatever compromises our integrity. In all our undertakings, avoid those actions that will put us ahead of others at their expense. In plain English, don’t do anything to get ahead at the expense of others. **(4) I will strive for integrity of character!**

Fifth, become involved in causes that benefit the community and require our loyalty. Support organizations like: Bread for the World, Pax Christi, Save the Children, or Catholic Relief Services to help our struggling brothers and sisters in all parts of the world. Engage in activities that will promote turning the Temple back into “*my Father’s house.*” **(5) I will enlist in causes that benefit others!**

Let our Lenten anger provide us with the energy we need to set up new tables that will stand long after this Lenten journey is over. [Much of the information for this reflection came from, “*Once Upon A Gospel*,” by William Bausch, Twenty-Third Publications, 2008, Pgs. 84-86.]

While the Matthew 25 Program has assigned specific items to each week during Lent, please feel free to adopt these Lenten responses as you can.

ANNUAL RICE BOWL COLLECTION

Beginning the first weekend of Lent the Human Concerns annual Rice Bowl Program will begin. “*Rice Bowls allow us to reach beyond our own parish and beyond national boundaries to become a truly Catholic parish.*” [U. S. Bishops, 1997] Rice Bowls will be available on the first Sunday of Lent and during that first week of Lent in church or in the parish office. Use the Rice Bowl Program to share a part of your wealth with the needy and hungry of the world. Rice Bowls will be collected during Holy Week. Catholic Relief Services sponsors the “Operation Rice Bowl” Program. They ask that we pray for the poor of the world and share some of our resources with them.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN PRIESTS AND BROTHERS, FRIARS, ETC.?

The distinctions titles and categories used for priests and the male members of religious communities can be confusing, especially since the categories can sometimes be intertwined as a man can be both a priest and a monk, or a brother and a friar. So, to help to piece the puzzle together, it's important to begin by noting some basic distinctions:


The distinction between priests (who are ordained for sacramental ministry) and brothers (who are non-ordained members of religious communities and who are committed to lives of prayer and service).

Priests: A priest is a man who has been ordained for sacramental ministry and these fall into two categories: A) Diocesan (or Secular) Priests can either be attached to a diocese and who serve under a bishop. Their ministry is usually oriented toward pastoral service. B) Religious Priests are members of religious communities (like the Franciscans, Jesuits, Salvatorians, or Carmelites) and their lives are guided by the special mission and charism of their community. While both kinds of priest practice sacramental ministry, their

spirituality and how they live out their priesthood can be very different.

Brothers: Brothers are non-ordained members of religious communities (such as those mentioned above) who live lives committed to prayer and service. Religious priests and brothers serve together in their communities and their ministries include much more than the care of parishes.

Monks, Friars, and Canons: These are broad categories that include religious priests and brothers, and each of these is connected to specific ways of life and spiritualities.

Financial Aid for Catholic Education


St. Mary's Congregation is offering financial aid in support of families sending their children to St. Joseph Catholic Academy and All Saints Catholic School. These programs are open to all registered, active members of the Parish.

The Tuition Assistance grant is to families that might not be financially able to send their children to St. Joes or All Saints. This program is not limited to either school or to any particular grade level but is based on need. The amount to be given is at the discretion of the Pastor with the assistance of the selection committee. Tuition Assistance applications are available in the parish office and can also be found on the Parish's website. The Application with all required supporting documents are due in the Parish Office by noon on April 30, 2021. If you have any questions regarding the Tuition Assistance program you can contact Fr. Roman at the parish office (262)694-6018.

The second program is the St. Mary's Scholarship program that the parish has offered for a number of years to worthy eighth grade students who will attend St. Joseph Academy as a ninth grader for the 2021-2022 school year. The Parish is again offering two one-time scholarships of \$500.00. Scholarship applications are available in the parish office, and at All Saints School and St. Joe's upper campus. Applications can also be found on the Parish's website as well as the St. Joe's and All Saint's websites. The Application and the necessary supporting documents must be received at the Parish office by noon on April 7, 2021.
