Pope Francis' New Years Resolutions for 2022

1. **DON'T GOSSIP**. Let every word that comes from your mouth be touched by the Spirit. If you need to confront, you can confront. But do it with compassion. But don't simply gossip to elevate yourself. You've already been elevated by your baptism and the power of the Holy Spirit.

2. **FINISH YOUR MEALS**. Too much food is wasted. It goes in the garbage and people are left hungry and that is a sin. Finish your meals. Be grateful for what you have.

3. **MAKE TIME FOR OTHERS** You're not an Adam. You need those brothers and sisters. You need your family and your friends, not only for companionship which is a good in itself, but also for friendship. And perhaps even more importantly: to work through issues, problems and tragedies in life so that you're not left alone.

4. CHOOSE THE "MORE HUMBLE PURCHASE. Don't be a consumer. Don't be addicted to being a consum-

er. And it goes back to the one before. If you're able do that, then you'll always make time for your family and for your friends.

5. **MEET THE POOR IN THE FLESH**. Go to the Shalom Center. Interact with those who have much less than all of us.

6. **STOP JUDGING OTHERS**. Just remember: the measure that we measure with will be measured out to us.

7. **BEFRIEND THOSE WHOM YOU DISAGREE WITH**. There's enough division, there's enough conflict in our world. Be able at least to befriend, to at least speak, to be civil with people who don't agree with you and with those you don't agree with. It happens in families, but be civil and reach out.

8. MAKE COMMITMENTS, such as marriage, religious life, friendship, study, doing good.

9. MAKE IT A HABIT TO "ASK THE LORD". Pray. Daily. Get up in the morning and say a simple prayer, in the middle of the day and also in the evening. Ask the Lord because the Lord is the Perfect Companion.

10. **BE HAPPY**. It always may seem that the grass is greener on the other side, but it's not. Be happy where God has placed you. And if you make time for others, and you understand the baptismal reality of being a brother and a sister, and you understand that family is important, as is friendship and many other things: be happy. Don't just go out. Don't be a sourpuss. Be happy. Remember when we get to lent and all the Pharisees and the scribes like to look glum: wash your face, put some oil in your hair, look good even as you fast. And remake yourself by the Holy Spirit. So remember your promises, they're simple: love God, love your neighbor. But remember them and make them real.

PROPHETS ALL

One reason why our society finds itself in such a confused state and surrounded by so many difficulties is that it has chosen to listen to its politicians rather than its prophets. This observation includes "politicians" in its broadest sense, and certainly is not limited to individuals in government service. A broad definition of a politician is anyone who tells people what they want to hear in order to gain their support, while a prophet is someone who is willing to risk saying what people need to hear to gain their change of heart. Political promises rather than prophetic truths are always more popular.

In today's Gospel, Jesus has a choice. He could have been a successful politician by telling people what they wanted to hear. Instead, he chose to be prophetic by challenging them to look at themselves, their values and their priorities. Walter Brueggemann, one of the most influential American Old Testament scholars and theologians, has stated: "*The task of a prophet is to nourish and evoke a consciousness and perception, which is alternative to the consciousness and perception of the dominant culture in which prophets find themselves.*" In other words, proph-

A prophet challenges us to look at ourselves, our values and our priorities. ets are not simply investigative reporters who seek out injustice and punish criminals, but guides, who force listeners to become aware of an alternative view which understands, appreciates and evaluates reality according to the will of God.

This alternative view becomes the guiding principle in the lives of believers so that injustice in all its forms is exposed for what it is, "*not simply an affront to humans, but a contradiction of the truth and goodness, which is the essence of God.*" Prophets offer an alternative view of reality that allow people to see their own history in the light of God's call for justice. All too often a prophetic message falls on deaf ears or is rejected. Jesus' prophetic message heard today received a mixed review from the listeners in his hometown. Some were im-

pressed while many were angry. Jesus' alternative view that salvation is a universal gift extended to all people, even to sinners and non-Jews, was firmly rejected. Many were convinced that "Joseph's son" had nothing to teach them nor was he able to open their eyes or touch their hearts. It is well for us to remember that this Gospel narrative is set before us today, not to prompt our criticism of his hometown friends and neighbors, but to challenge the quality of our openness to God's world-view, however and through whomever it is revealed to us.

Today we too must decide to listen either to politicians or to prophets. Prophets remind us that the Word of God can teach us who we are if we dare to see the world as God sees it. Prophets suffer because of the messages they deliver, and those who choose to follow those messages will also suffer. However, it is the prophetic voice that can put us in touch with the only viable alternative available to us when we face suffering, injustice and death. That alternative is God.


