STAFF CORNER

Our second reading today invites us to reflect on God's grace. When we hear that word, I think we often think of it as something we have to earn from God. If I was more patient, God would give me more brownie points of grace. If I prayed more, God would be more likely to grace me with an answer to my prayers.

On the contrary, grace is God's favor, born freely of the initiative of a Father who loves us unconditionally. God is not someone to be likened to Santa Claus, who only gives gifts to children who are good, but has a lump of coal for children who are bad. Ultimately, such a false image of God leads us to believe that if we are good, we deserve to be rewarded with heaven and if we are bad, we have no hope.

Paul's letter to Titus corrects this faulty theology. It reminds us that the grace of God that has appeared is the free undeserved, unearned favor that is available to all people in Christ. It's not ours because of the good we ourselves have done.

Rather, grace is a gift from God made available to us because of what Jesus has done for us. Without the pure favor of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, we would all stand condemned by God's justice, unforgiven of our sins, and without hope of eternal life. But because God is rich in mercy, he favored us with a way to avoid the penalties our sins justly deserve.

That Way is Jesus. The Truth is Jesus alone saves us. He does this by favoring us with a new life that is only possible to live with the help of the Holy Spirit. That life of the Spirit coming through Jesus', favors us to be heirs in hope of eternal life. Heirs do not receive rewards they have earned for themselves. They enjoy the benefits of what someone else has attained and has left them as their beneficiary.

Our inheritance of new life is characterized by two components: 1) by a powerful capacity to please God by loving and serving Him, especially as he lives in others, in this life, and 2) by a growing supernatural capacity to live in perfect communion with God and others in the next.

Grace, a gift freely given, needs to be received and opened. But this is not something we can achieve alone. The Spirit helps us to grow in the fullness of grace by empowering us to pray and to live in a relationship of love with the Father and the Son, primarily through the sacraments and through the support of the Christian community.

John tells us in today's Gospel that Jesus will baptize us with the Holy Spirit. But we must ask him to do so. If we do, we can be assured of growing in the image and likeness of Jesus Himself, the one with whom the Father is well pleased.
