
MISSION STATEMENT

REMEMBRANCE

Today we celebrate Palm Sunday. The Gospel we heard at the beginning of Mass describes when Jesus entered Jerusalem in triumph, with people singing, "Hosanna to the Son of David; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest." Matt. 21:19. This joy is short lived because we hear later in the Gospel of His passion; He was betrayed, tortured, denied, mocked, crucified and killed. Jesus' suffering is physical, psychological, spiritual and personal. He is rejected by His disciples, and unfairly condemned by the religious and civil leaders. What a turn of events! Sometimes in life we find ourselves going through the same emotions and things change in a blink of an eye. In our everyday lives, are we able to relate with Jesus' suffering? We all experience pain in many different ways, but we try as best as we can to avoid it. We take pain pills. Some use alcohol or drugs to escape the pain. Some pain we can never avoid or escape. We are called to look and see the pain Jesus went through and He was the Son of God. He didn't try to avoid it. He faced the reality of sin and paid His Life for us, because he loved us. We all have moments in our life we would rather forget. Maybe it's a painful divorce you went through after an abusive marriage. The memories of that relationship linger in your mind along with many things that remind us of what we had to endure when things were reaching the breaking point. Or even more painful, we lose a very special person to death after a long illness. It's still painful to recall what they went through in their struggle for life. Even now we may have some who are going through those painful events. We find ourselves hopeless and helpless, just like Mother Mary when she saw her Son Jesus suffering and dying. We have someone who we can run to for comfort, Mother Mary. She knows and understands. Remembering is at the core of our Christian faith. Today we remember the

cost of our salvation. Today marks the beginning of the Holy Week. A week filled with different events with different emotions: the Last Supper, Good Friday and Easter Vigil. These three days form one liturgy, referred to as Triduum, the paschal mystery. Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection accomplish the will of God and the reason for His coming. We understand His life did not end on the cross because He overcame even death itself. We live the paschal mystery each day of our lives, fully embracing the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus. Lent is the time of the year that we are being called to rid ourselves of those habitual sins and vices that keep us away from God and each other. Holy Week is not only simply the "price paid for our redemption," but a historical moment endured by our God in Jesus Christ. The memories of Holy Week give witness that real love demands a cost, a sacrifice, a death to self to live for something and someone greater. Remembering brings alive God's faithful love and brings courage to our own sacrifices. Our Passover is not only a story. It is an ongoing act of God's saving His people.

HOLY THURSDAY & GOOD FRIDAY SERVICES

On April 6, **Holy Thursday** Mass of the Lord's Supper will begin at 7 PM at St. Sebastian Church, immediately followed by a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the Altar of Repose in the church hall. All are welcome and encouraged to participate in prayer and adoration until midnight!

Good Friday services will be held at 1 PM at St. Catherine Parish on Friday, April 7. A Neighborhood Stations of the Cross, led by Fr. Peter Patrick, will follow Good Friday services.

In the evening, we will hold a Tenebrae Prayer Service at 7:30 PM at St. Sebastian Parish. Tenebrae, which means "shadows," is an ancient service in which scripture and psalms are shared. After each lesson, a candle is extinguished until the assembly is in total darkness. A loud, sustained noise or commotion is created, called the strepitus, representing the convulsion of nature following the death of Christ; the chaos of the world without a savior. Suddenly, the Christ light is reignited, the strepitus ends, and all depart in silence. This service is a powerful experience. All are welcome.

REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR APRIL 2, PALM SUNDAY

This semester I have the privilege of teaching a class on the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius. The simplest way to talk about the exercises is to say that it is a tool to help cultivate one's relationship with God. The experience takes a retreatant through a fourweek process. The first week looks at human sinfulness in the context of the unconditional love of God. The second week finds the retreatant accompanying Jesus on his mission. During this time the retreatant reflects on the public ministry of Jesus. In the third week the retreatant is asked to walk with Jesus to the cross. In this week, the retreatant embraces the suffering of Christ and is asked to reflect on their own suffering.

Today on Palm Sunday, let us embrace this third week. Let us choose to walk with Jesus and embrace His suffering. I do not mean to imply that we get stuck here in the third week, because the fourth week (the resurrection) is coming. I think sometimes we have a tendency at the end of Lent to jump over the hard part and go right to Easter. Easter feels good. Of course we are tempted to move to that part, but don't cheat yourself from this very important week. Take time this week to sit in the tension. Connect with Jesus' temptation to "let this cup pass." Walk with Jesus on the road to Calvary. We are blessed with the foresight to know this is not the end of the story, but to get to the resurrection, one must embrace the cross.

" in their titles are red flags.
