

So before the next time you post anything online, I suggest giving First Corinthians a read — and remember, love never fails.

MANANTIALES DE ESPERANZA

Recently, I was with a family to celebrate the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick for a family member who had been dealing with a lingering health issue. It was not categorized as "Last Rites," but as a situation in which we asked Jesus to aid in the healing process. In preparing to celebrate the sacrament, I explained that when we pray for healing, sometimes God can answer the prayer right away, and sometimes it takes time. One of the family members, a young girl, was intrigued that sometimes God can bring about a healing right away. She stated something along the lines that God often says "no" to her prayers. We then talked about the most important element of any prayer. It is the disposition of our hearts. I said the most important ingredient of prayer is a word that starts with the letter "F." I was hoping that she would guess what the word was, and in guessing, say faith. She did guess a word; however, it was not what I expected! She immediately said "Forcing Him!"

The encounter made me reflect on the relationship between God's healing power for whom nothing is impossible, and the reality that many times we feel like God continues to say "no" to our prayers. For us, as Christians, we live within the tension that our lives are to be conformed to the image of Jesus Christ. The tension comes in because there are the glorious mysteries of Jesus' life, but also the sorrowful mysteries of deep suffering. We of course, tend to focus on wishing to experience the glorious mysteries while ignoring the sorrowful ones.

The powerful dynamic of our relationship with Jesus, is that we're called to be in relationship with Him in everything we do. Even in the midst of suffering, we're able to connect with Jesus. There's an old saying in the spiritual life that Jesus did not save the world by his miracles (as amazing and important as they were), nor did His teachings which live onto this day. What did save the world was His suffering. Within this context suffering takes on a sacred role, because it's the very means by which Jesus saved us.

St. Paul puts this tension in perspective when he writes, "I consider the sufferings of this present time are as nothing to be compared with the glory to be revealed (Rom 8:18)." The good news is in the midst of suffering, healing and glory are on the way. The sorrowful mysteries of this world are always transformed into glorious mysteries. Sometimes this transformation takes longer than we expect it to, and sometimes we don't see the glory until the next life of heaven, but in everything God is victorious.

With Mary, In Mary, Through Mary...For God's Greater Glory!

Estuve recientemente con una familia para colocarle a uno de sus miembros, el sacramento de la Unción de los enfermos, debido a un problema persistente de salud. Muchas veces malinterpretamos este sacramento y creemos que cuando lo ponemos es porque ya no hay nada más que hacer y nadie se percata que se trata de pedirle a Jesús que intervenga en el proceso de sanación.

Al momento de prepararme para impartirlo, le explicaba a la familia que cuando oramos por la curación de un enfermo, a veces Dios puede responder de inmediato y, a veces, lleva un tiempo. Uno de los miembros de la familia, una niña, estaba intrigada porque decía que Dios a veces no hacía sanar de inmediato. Ella dijo algo como "siento que a veces Dios no escucha mis oraciones".

Luego hablamos de la razón más importante de cualquier oración. Todo parte de la disposición de nuestro corazón. Les comentaba que el elemento a tomar en cuenta en la oración es una palabra que comienza con la letra "F". Yo me quede esperando a ver si adivinaba cuál era la palabra y, y lo hizo, ella respondió "fe". Sabía que adivinaría, pero creo que ella se esperaba otra palabra que la complaciera con lo cual no supo ocultar su frustración, cómo queriendo decir "si no hay mas remedio".

Este encuentro me hizo reflexionar sobre la relación que existe entre el poder sanador de Dios, para quien cree que nada es imposible para Él, y la actitud que nosotros tomamos cuando vemos que, al pedir, Dios, "no nos da" eso que pedimos. Como cristianos vivimos y experimentamos esa tensión en nuestras vidas para alcanzar parecernos a la imagen de Jesucristo. Existen los misterios gloriosos de la vida de Jesús, pero también existen los misterios dolorosos. Muchas veces nos concentrámos en desear experimentar solo los misterios gloriosos, pero al mismo tiempo ni queremos pensar que los misterios dolorosos, Dios también permite que los experimentemos.

Lo interesante y la poderosa dinámica de comprender nuestra relación con Jesús, es que estamos llamado a estar en relación con él en todo lo que hacemos y realizamos. Incluso en medio del sufrimiento podemos conectar con Jesús. Hay una antigua reflexión en la vida espiritual que dice que: Jesús no salvó al mundo con sus milagros (por muy asombrosos e importantes que fueran), ni tampoco sus Enseñanzas perduran hasta el día de hoy. Lo que realmente salvó al mundo fue el sufrimiento que él experimentó en su pasión y la cruz. Dentro de este contexto, el sufrimiento adquiere un papel sagrado, porque es el medio por el cual Jesús nos salvó.

San Pablo pone esta tensión en perspectiva cuando escribe: "Considero que los sufrimientos de este tiempo presente son como la nada comparado con la gloria que ha de ser revelada (Rom 8:18)". La buena noticia está en medio del sufrimiento, la sanidad y la gloria están en camino. Los misterios dolorosos de este mundo se transforman siempre en misterios gloriosos. A veces esta transformación lleva más tiempo de lo que esperamos, y a veces no vemos la gloria hasta la próxima vida del cielo, pero en todo Dios sale victorioso.

Con María, en María, por María... ¡Para la mayor gloria de Dios!



Gospel Meditation

January 30, 2022
4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

St. Oscar Romero (1917-1980) was a "Salvadoran Roman Catholic archbishop who was a vocal critic of the violent activities of government armed forces, right-wing groups, and leftist guerrillas involved in El Salvador's civil conflict (Encyclopedia Britannica)." As a voice of the voiceless, he was an outspoken champion of the poor who were the ones most affected by the civil unrest and violence. His advocacy provoked several attempts on his life. Nonetheless, St. Oscar Romero was convinced that before all else his faith in the resurrected Christ and the values of the Gospel trumped any earthly concern or worry. He walked with complete confidence and trust. On March 24, 1980, St. Oscar Romero was assassinated while celebrating Mass. Such is often the fate of those who challenge the socio-political agendas of the day.

We may look at the example of witness of St. Oscar Romero as something extraordinary. In one sense it is. Through the power of God, an ordinary human being did extraordinary things. But, in and of himself, St. Oscar Romero was simply a humble, loving servant of God. Oscar knew not only the power of love but the risk that comes when loving unconditionally. The beauty of God's message was able to shine in and through him because he was able to step out of the way and be a vessel. One can assume that for St. Oscar Romero, one's earthly life has no merit when faith, integrity, conviction, zeal and love are jettisoned. Fear and apprehension had no grip on this man who not only saw but spoke the truth.

Do we speak the truth? It makes us feel good to speak of God as love. But have we ever considered the ramifications of this radical message? There are assaults on human life occurring daily. More and more the value and worth of a human being is being reduced and minimalized. We are becoming widgets in the production of life. In our whole simple humble ways, we too are called to be prophets. Knowing who you are and what is within your means to do, how can you make God's love real, stand up for what is right, and give witness to the sacredness of all that is around you?

Meditación del Evangelio

30 de enero de 2022
4º Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

Ser cristiano es ser un profeta comprometido en el amor y en la esperanza. La Liturgia de hoy, por medio del profeta Jeremías, nos pone en alerta sobre este asunto del llamado de Dios al discipulado ya desde el vientre materno: "Antes de formarte en el seno de tu madre, ya te conocía; antes de que tú nacieras, yo te consagré, y te destiné a ser profeta de las naciones" (Jeremías 1,5). Para comprender con mayor claridad y poner manos a la obra en este llamado, debemos recordar que, el domingo pasado, Jesús se encontraba en la sinagoga de Nazaret y sus últimas palabras del pasaje de la Escritura decían: "Hoy se cumplen estas palabras proféticas y a ustedes les llegan noticias de ello" (Lucas 4,21).

Los que escuchaban a Jesús se admiraban de su elocuencia. ¡No lo podían creer! Ellos lo conocían, habían vivido a su alrededor, tenían familiaridad con él. Por lo menos sabían su oficio, "carpintero, hijo de José y María". Jesús conocía sus pensamientos y responde: "Seguramente ustedes me van a recordar el dicho: Medico, círute a ti mismo. Realiza también aquí, en tu patria, lo que nos cuentan que hiciste en Cafarnaúm" (Lucas 4,23). ¿Por qué nadie es profeta en su tierra? Le pasó a Jesús y nos pasa muchas veces a nosotros, hacemos el bien por ahí y cuando se dan cuenta los vecinos y la familia, viene el cuestionamiento y los comentarios sin saber realmente lo que la persona es, vive, o siente. O, mejor dicho, se ignora su compromiso con el amor, como lo expresa San Pablo a los Corintios: "Ahora, pues, son válidas la fe, la esperanza y el amor: pero la mayor de estas tres es el amor" (1 Corintios 13,13).
