**Reflection** In today's second reading, we hear St. Paul reminding us that, "There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit; there are different forms of service but the same Lord; there are different workings but the same God who produces all of them in everyone. To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit."

It is very appropriate this weekend, that we reflect upon our own gifts, for what benefit they are given, and how we are using them. Sometimes when people are asked what gifts they have, they might say they don't have any since it may seem to be boastful or rooted in pride.

Each gift is given not for our own glory, but for the glory of God and to be used in service and love of others. Acknowledging and naming our gifts actually gives honor to God. But we can't stop there. Once we recognize our gifts, we seek to find ways to share them.

Sometimes others can help us in seeing our gifts and calling them forth. We see an example this in today's gospel. Mary saw the need for more wine at the wedding in Cana and called forth her son, Jesus, to act and do something. His action responded to the need and benefitted those present.

This week is a call to Christian stewardship, where we realize all is gift. Everything including our life is on loan and not our own.

This week we observe Martin Luther King Day. He was a great spokesperson for those who suffered hatred and discrimination in any way. Among his gifts were the gift of preaching. He preached nonviolence and love for one another. Ironically, while preaching non-violence, he was the victim of a violent death. Reflecting on how to improve society, he said,

"Everybody can be great because anybody can serve. You don't have to have a college degree to serve. You don't have to make your subject and verb agree to serve. You only need a heart full of grace. A soul generated by love."

This week take time to identify our gifts or seek others to help. As we do, thank God for them. Then take action to use them, being of service to others and in turn giving glory to God.




All bow: and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.

#### PASTOR'S UPDATE

**Dear all,** in today's first reading Isaiah proclaimed, "For Zion's sake I will not be silent, for Jerusalem's sake I will not be quiet, until her vindication shines forth like the dawn and her victory like a burning torch."

These words challenge us today. Monday we observe Martin Luther King Jr. Day. He was not silent, a great advocate for an end to discrimination, recognizing all are created by God, deserving of respect.

In observance of this holiday, the President, United States Conference of Catholic Bishops shared the following reflection a year ago, a portion of which is copied below and is still very timely today:

'For much of the past year, America has been reckoning with the legacy of slavery and the persistence of racial injustice in our country. Sadly, it is still true that the "color of our skin" often matters more in our society than the "content of our character,' as Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., said a half-century ago.

"This year as we commemorate the legacy of this great American, we remember especially Rev. King's belief in nonviolence and the power of love.

"As we witnessed in the violence in our cities last summer and in the violence at the Capitol in Washington, D.C., our country has become too angry, too bitter, and too divided.

"And as we confront our deep divisions, we face the same choices that Rev. King and the civil rights movement faced. For us, too, the question is how will we struggle against the injustices in our society, what means will we use?

"In 1958, Rev. King wrote: 'Along the way of life, someone must have the sense enough and the morality enough to cut off the chain of hate. This can only be done by projecting the ethics of love to the center of our lives.' This is the challenge for every one of us who believes in the promise of America and seeks to renew the soul of this great nation.

"In the spirit of Rev. King, we must meet the forces of hate and ignorance with the power of love. We must learn again the wisdom of the Gospel and love our enemies and bless those who oppose us. In this moment, Rev. King would counsel everyone in public life to seek reconciliation and reject the easy temptation to reprisals and recrimination.

"We do not love those who oppose us because they are loveable, or even likable, Rev. King once said. We love them because God loves them. And by our love, we seek their conversion and friendship, not their humiliation. This is our Christian duty in this moment — to be healers and peacemakers, to overcome evil and lies, not by more of the same, but with words of truth and works of love. "




