

These past weeks, we have been celebrating liturgically various liturgical stages of the relationship God has with us. From the annunciation, all of the way to the Word made flesh, to the Baptism of the Lord. Our meditation on these events helps us enter more deeply into the Mystery of Faith which we celebrate.

Today we take this mystery one step further. The image of marriage as God's relationship with the people of God is deep in the Hebrew Bible. For us, St Paul will describe Jesus as the Bridegroom, coming to take possession of his bride, which is the Church. To be sure the relationship of a husband and wife is connected to selflessness, sacrifice, and even mystery, as is Jesus' relationship to us.

The transformation of water into wine, as told in the Gospel today, points to the conversion and discipleship of which we are summoned. In marriage, the husband and wife become that outward sign of Christ to each other, and to the whole faith community. In a mystical way, Jesus marries us, and we are then to be faithful and fruitful.

Jesus creates a lot of wine. The new covenant with God, through Jesus the Christ, offers transformation and joy. Jesus is the new wine in new chalices. In water and wine we celebrate this new relationship with God, and in faith make known everything Jesus has done for us.

Prayer Shawl Ministry Welcome new members


The Prayer Shawl Ministry meets on the second Wednesday of every other month in the Fellowship hall. Here are the upcoming dates:

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only then, let us do whatever He tells us.


How can we pray for the dead throughout the year?

The Cathedral of St Peter is beginning the process of renovating the organ. This is an outstanding instrument that adds

to the dignity and reverence of the liturgies. Unfortunately, because of the lack of maintenance over the years, it is not up to its full potential. An anonymous donor, who lives in the diocese has offered \$150,000 for the repair. Our Parish needs to support an additional 150,000. We have already contacted a group of parishioners who have been most generous. At this time, we ask for your financial support for this endeavor. As stewards of our church, we want to ensure that many generations will be able to praise and worship God through song and music. The project is extensive, hence the cost, because the organ is more complex than from what we can see.
