

Reflection of The Epiphany of the Lord, by Deacon Steve Pulkrabek

The Greek word Epiphany means appearance or manifestation or showing forth, is used to describe Jesus' first appearance to the Gentiles. Today's readings reflect the first Gentiles recognizing the Messiah from the Old Testament prophecies.


In the first reading the Prophet Isaiah, consoling the people in exile, speaks of the restoration of a New Jerusalem from which the glory of Yahweh becomes visible even to the pagan nations. "Jerusalem," the prophet Isaiah cries out, "your light has come in the midst of darkness and thick clouds covering the earth; the glory of the Lord shines upon you."

Exactly what "magi" are is not clear. Perhaps they are learned men; perhaps they are ancient astronomers. We often think of them as kings, the text in today's Gospel does not call them kings, but rather "magi." Psalm 72 (read in today's Mass) speaks of kings coming from the East bearing gifts of gold and frankincense. The sixth century Italian tradition that the Magi finding Jesus were three Magi, Casper, Balthazar, and Melchior, is based on the fact that three gifts are mentioned in Matthew's Gospel: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Matthew nowhere says that there were three wise men from the East. Tradition holds each of them came from a different culture: Melchior was Asian, Balthazar was Persian, and Caspar was Ethiopian - thus representing the three races known to the ancient world.

Stars were believed to be signs from God, announcing important events. A commentary on the Torah by Jewish rabbis suggests that a star appeared in the sky at the births of Abraham, Isaac, and Moses. Likewise, in the Book of Numbers, the prophet Balaam speaks of "a star that shall come out of Jacob." The star is revelation of the Messiah to the Gentiles. The star is the light for the Magi's journey.

I will end with Pope Francis' reflection. "The Gospel account of the Magi describes their journey from the East as a journey of the spirit, as a journey toward the encounter with Christ. They are attentive to signs that indicate His presence; they are tireless in facing the trials of the search; they are courageous in deducing the implications for life that derive from an encounter with the Lord. This is life – Christian life, is a journey but being attentive, tireless and courageous. A Christian journeys like this. Journey attentively, tirelessly, courageously."...Pope Francis – Angelus, 6 January 2015

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton | January 4

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 - January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint" and she's the patron saint of Catholic schools.

Maybe some of us are afraid of saying something is immoral because we're afraid of offending others or of being labeled intolerant. How do we talk about morality in a relativistic world? A Message from Bishop Malloy: January 2022



Dear Friends in Christ.

Your support for the 2022 National Appeal in the Diocese of Rockford empowers local communities, shares the Gospel message with our neighbors, and cares for elderly religious. Through this combined appeal collection on January 15-16, we continue the work of building the Kingdom of God right here in our own country and within our own Diocese. Rather than make separate collections for the requests in this appeal, and the many other needs of the church, our Diocese has opted to combine these requests into three separate appeals spaced throughout the year. The National Appeal is the first of these combined appeals in 2022.

Benefited by the National Appeal are more than 26,000 senior Catholic sisters, brothers, and religious order priests who are living witnesses to the Gospel. After long lives of service to Catholic schools, hospitals, and communities, many of these retired religious now volunteer in ministry, while others are frail and need assistance. Our combined collection helps care for these elderly men and women, including in our own Diocese, who have given so much to the Church.

Our National Appeal aids The Catholic University of America in Washington, DC in providing academic scholarships to students and meeting other needs of the university. The school was founded by a papal charter in 1887 and is the national university of the Catholic Church in the United States. By giving to this collection, you help support our country's future Catholic leaders – both religious and lay – in receiving educations rooted in faith.

The Catholic Communication Campaign receives funding through our combined appeal, as well, with half of the contributions directed to this campaign remaining in our own diocese. These local efforts share the Gospel through the televised Catholic Mass as well as "Top O' the Morning" weekday broadcasts, periodic livestreamed Masses from our diocesan Cathedral, Be Reconciled Day and other communications projects. Another portion of this appeal supports the national antipoverty program of the U.S. Catholic Bishops. Of those contributions made toward the Catholic Campaign for Human Development, 25% will remain in our diocese to empower those locally living in poverty to transform their lives and our very own communities in the process.

Finally, the National Appeal directly benefits our Catholic elementary schools throughout the Diocese of Rockford and our 40 retired priests, most of whom continue to serve our parishes as they are able. These funds are used to support our grade schools that directly impact the religious and moral formation of our future Church and our retired priests' pensions. Thank you for considering generous support of the 2022 National Appeal.

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
