

Reflection for the Sixth Sunday of Easter - By Deacon Steve Pulkrabek

In the first reading we hear that Paul and Barnabas had a question regarding Mosaic law and what was being instructed. The apostles' and elders sent a delegation to resolve this teaching which was causing dissension and debate. Jesus said that he did not come to replace the law but to fulfill it. We learn more about salvation and the new covenant lead by the Holy Spirit. This fulfills what Jesus taught the Apostles at the Last Supper: "I will send you the Holy Spirit. He will teach and guide you to the truth."

What was the truth? That baptism not circumcision was necessary for salvation. Following the developed Mosaic Law was not required any longer. The only requirement was the turning away from their former pagan practices. What would happen if we followed the practice of the Apostles, namely invoking and following the guidance of the Holy Spirit in major decisions?

In the second reading during this post Resurrection times the Church keeps before us the life that God invites us to enter into now and after death. She presents to us another vision of life in heaven. The image of the new, holy city of Jerusalem is the image of the exultant and victorious Church, the bride of Christ in all its beauty and perfection in eternity. We are that Church now, that community, and are called to be in eternity.

In the gospel we learn why we need to gather for the Mass and profess our faith our belief. We continue to read John's narrative of the Last Supper in which Jesus gave a number of teachings as part of his last will and testimony. He speaks repeatedly of the centrality of love as a sign of our union with him and as a sign of our discipleship. He speaks of the need to keep his word because we love him. He teaches us the parable of the vine and the branches, reminding us that the Father loves us and as we love and keep his word, God will dwell in us and we in him.

The only way God dwells among us is to let go of ourselves and hand ourselves over to Jesus. On our own we would not be able to succeed; the good news is that we are not alone, but God dwells within us and gives us all we need to be faithful. This does require obedience on our part.

Totally Yours Totus Tuus, a Latin phrase meaning "totally yours," was the motto of Venerable Pope John Paul II. Taken from St. Louis de Montfort's *True Devotion to Mary*, it signifies our desire to give ourselves entirely to Jesus Christ through the hands of our Blessed Mother Mary. It also expresses our effort to give all that we have to every young person we encounter.

Responding to God

Question:

I can't explain it. I feel a nudge from God to something out of the ordinary. How do I respond?

Answer:

You're in good company! Abraham was asked to leave all he knew and loved for a strange land, with only abstract divine assurance that such a sacrifice would be worth it. Plenty of prophets protested against God's call, whether it was claiming they were too young (Jeremiah) or running away entirely, only to end up in a whale's belly (Jonah). St. Joseph was asked to do something very strange. He was asked to believe — on the word of an angelic appearance in a dream — that his betrothed was pregnant not from another man, but by a miraculous intervention of God. Then he was called to marry her.

Author Flannery O'Connor once wrote, "You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you odd." Sometimes God's invitation might seem strange or challenging. It might require sacrifices we never expected to make. Our life might look different than we had always imagined. But as we all know, life throws its own curveballs, regardless of whether or not we're listening for God's will. Better, one would think, to be open to the promptings of God and to follow along the strange trails that they lead. We have the assurance that, eventually, we will find green pastures. Lpi

Marian Dogmas

Divine Motherhood Various names are used to describe Mary's role as mother of Jesus. She is called "Mother of God" which translates the more accurately stated greek term, "Theotokos" or "Birthgiver of God."

Perpetual Virgin The expression perpetual viginity, evervirgin refers primarily to the conception and birth of Jesus. From the first formulations of faith, especially in baptismal, or professions of faith, the Church professed that Jesus Christ was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit only.

Immaculate Conception Though highlighting a privilege of Mary, it in fact stresses the dignity and holiness required to become "Mother of God". The privilege of the Immaculate Conception is the source and basis for Mary's all-holiness as Mother of God.

The Assumption Mary was elevated or assumed into heaven by the power and grace of God. It may be understood as the logical conclusion of Mary's vocation on earth and the way she lived her life in union with God and her mission. The assumption may be seen as a consequence of Divine Motherhood. Being through, with and for her Son on earth, it would seem fitting for Mary to be through, with and for her Son in heaven, too. She was on earth the generous associate of her Son. The Assumption tells us that this association continues in heaven. Mary is indissolubly linked to her Son on earth and in heaven. Glorified in body and soul, Mary is already in the state that will be ours after the resurrection of the dead. -catholicnewsagency

PARISH PRAYER TREE AND PRAYER CHAIN


