#### **Christian Marriage**


Couples should contact the Pastor at least six months in advance. Couples should include Archdiocesan Marriage Preparation Course in their plans.

#### LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Human beings easily get bored. Life's routines can become so predictable that there is often little time for excitement or freshness. Today is all about the new and the wonderful. In celebrating the beauty and simplicity of the Epiphany, we see in tangible ways God's creative, redemptive, and restorative power. This refreshment and revitalization is offered not only to a select few but to everyone throughout the world. There is nothing routine or static about God. Surprises, wonders, miracles, opportunities, healings, and joy without measure are available to those who believe. There are never any endings, just beginnings. And, when darkness, boredom, and gloom seem to be the order of the day, a bright new light now shines that points us to truth and reminds us that we are loved.



### Sunday, January 2, 2021 \*Epiphany of the Lord\*

#### From the Shared Pastor's Desk (Father Rick):

This Weekend's – Feast of the Epiphany is among my favorite in the church year! While fascinated by a moving star, the mysterious Magi (Casper, Balthasar, and Melchior are their traditional names) and their exotic gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh, the meaning embedded in this part of the infancy narratives of Jesus is multivalent, like the layers of an onion! First, without knowing the Hebrew Scriptures, they're able to discover the true God as the heavens' declare His glory. Second, despite their kingly status, they willingly adore and bend the knee to kingliness disguised in the flesh of a shivering baby; true faith leads to humility. Third, traditionally depicted as old, middle aged and younger, one white, another black, and still another brown, there seems to be no discrimination at the manger; there are also no preferences as sometimes given certain social status; wealthy kings mingle happily with poor shepherds! Fourth, gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh are appropriate poor parents of a newborn mouth to feed – gold as their go-fund-me for future expenses, frankincense to deodorize the smell of diapers in an already fragrant stable, and myrrh as medicine for sometimes upset tummies of newborn infants - and a symbolic connection of the Lord's birth with His death and Resurrection - "myrrh ... for Him who should die and be buried for the mortal human race, gold for a King whose kingdom will have no end and is not of this world, frankincense because He is God." Fifth, when dreams tell them not to return to Herod, they're prayerfully open to the mysterious ways of God while risking worldly displeasure; they, as all believers, must obey God, not men! This and more in a charming account likely given Matthew by Mary who remembered and treasured this and all things related to her Son's birth and life, handing it on for the sake of we, His Bride, the Church!

New Year's Resolutions – Along with health and fitness topics also hear many wanting to pray more this year than last. Knowing that a new year has the same amount of days, hours and minutes as a previous year and will also have its' fair share of anxieties and worries to consume them, maybe we ought not try so much to pray more but to pray better! Pope Francis says some kinds of piety and prayer are heretical, calling them "intimism," a religiosity that makes prayer something for me more than it is for God; it calms me and I feel "fuller" of God; it is characterized by overly sentimental attachment to prayers that swaddle us safely and tightly swaddle us in comfort without consideration that prayer is for God's glory and honor as well as to strengthen us in His service before they're for us; prayer can be misused when we try to get God to agree with our dreams, hopes, needs and wills before we consider whether what we actually want changed or to be done for us might not be part of His will for us in the first place; our prayer is directed to a heavenly Father Who knows best and loves us but whose thoughts and ways are certainly not our own; prayer ought not to be about changing God to agree with us but about allowing God to change us more completely and fully into His image and likeness, so much so that at some point we might say, as St. Paul did, that it is no longer our human lives that we live but it is Christ who is alive in us. Instead of trying to pray more we might want to pray better.
