

FAITH FORMATION DURING CHRISTMAS BREAK

Parents, while school and religious ed session take a pause, here are some ideas about the Epiphany of the Lord to share with your children.

- The word *epiphany* means to reveal or to be manifest. What have you learned about God from your family? Cut star shapes out of white paper, one for each family member. Have family members write their responses to the question on the paper stars. Older family members can write for younger children. Hang the stars in your home as a reminder of God's presence.
- Help your family experience a true epiphany. Spend time this week looking for God. Go out for a walk, or look for God in your home. See where God leads you.
- Discuss these questions: What stops us from seeing God's presence in our world today? What helps us see God's actions and presence in the world around us? ~ Our Sunday Visitor

2021 MEDICAL REPORT FROM BELLE-RIVIÈRE

Since January Dr. Trezel Claudy, MD, and Dr. Celidor Luxone, DDS, have seen a total of 1,091 patients during their four-day monthly visits to the clinic in Belle -Rivière. Thanks to your generosity this amounts to \$8.07 per patient. This does not include the hundreds of patients who have received medicines from nurse Fatal through the \$200 monthly donation from STA as well as the medicines sent with the 2021 sea-container shipment last spring. TORNADO RELIEF

On Friday, December 11, at least six states - Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Missouri, Mississippi and Tennessee – were hit by tornadoes causing causalities and mass destruction. Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord

Little Amy was looking through the family album and found a picture of a man sitting behind a cow. All that was visible was the man's legs and feet. She took the picture to a photo shop and told the clerk, "This is the only picture of my grandfather that I have. So please remove the cow so I can see what he looked like."

In today's first reading, we are given the portion of the vision of Isaiah which presents the God of Israel as the Light Who removes darkness and clouds from the earth. Matthew, writing to his Jewish-Christian community, describes how the Magi (pagan astrologers), as foretold by the prophet Isaiah, came to Jerusalem with their gifts, following a special star. They wished to pay homage to the newly-born, promised, divine king of Israel.

In some time back the young members of our parish community was asked why they enjoyed reading Harry Potter novels. Most just shrugged, smiled, and (so they wouldn't be called upon), tried to avoid catching my eye. The seventh grader Johnny, however, quietly responded, "Because you never know what's going to happen next."

The same element of suspense marked the journey of the Magi, who never knew what road the Spirit was going to take them down next. Today's readings invite us to have the curiosity of Amy and Johnny, so that we may discover the 'epiphany' of our God in everyone and every event, everywhere.

As our own country becomes more multicultural and multi-religious, the message of today's feast becomes more relevant: Christ came for all people---all men, women, and children, all nationalities, all believers and non-believers. God desires all to live in peace as God's children.

The magi were led to Christ by a star, something that got their attention; this is where God's revelation usually begins. But the star alone was not enough; the wise men needed the wisdom of the scriptures to complete the journey.

The Epiphany invites us to foster a love for both nature and God's word. Together, they will bring us to Christ, the One who has come to fulfill God's plan, drawing us into one family. God does not force us to become a family. But if we are open to the signs God sets out for us, we will find ourselves arriving at a place where we all can live together in peace. We pray today that all the division and hatred that continues to plague our planet will cease. We pray for an increase of wise men and women who will work for this peace. Who or what has led you to Christ over the years?
