Then you shall be radiant at what you see, your heart shall throb and overflow." Much of our lives is about a balance between the gifts we desire to receive and those we are called to give. However, do we ever consider the reality that the great gift we can receive is the gift of giving itself? On this the feast of the Epiphany I pray we can take a note from the wise men who traveled afar for the primary purpose of giving a gift of homage to the newborn king.

This year it seems we have had more than adequate time to prepare for Christmas, and now that it's here we are moving quickly through the celebrations that make up this rich season. Seemingly, only days after the birth of Christ we celebrate the coming of the wise men, this delay of this celebration makes me wonder why the church calls us to reflect separately on this event that seems so integral to the Christmas story. The Christmas story is a nice story by itself and yet there is a much greater story that goes along with the little baby Jesus being born in a manger. This story includes the whole story of God and His people, including the promise of giving everything to His beloved people, "for the riches of the sea shall be emptied out before you, the wealth of nations shall be brought to you." (Is. 60:5)

The story of the magi bringing the gifts at first seems to be about these men giving gifts to God, and yet the greatest gift they have been given is to give what they have been given back to God. Brothers and sisters, to us have been born a savior, Christ the Lord. What else matters, and yet we tend to hold on to the countless other gifts we have received whether for Christmas this year or throughout the years. What lengths are we willing to go to give back to the greatest gift we have received, Christ the Lord?

I love Christmas songs. They bring joy and spread the message of God with us, Christ the Lord! The one that sticks out the most is the hymn, *In the Bleak Midwinter*. The final verse asks the question, "What can I give him? Poor as I am. If I were a shepherd I would give a lamb. If I were a wise man I would do my part. But, what can I give him, Give him my heart Give." This beautifully simple song tells us what will make the heart of Christ throb with excitement. The gift of our hearts. Often when I am presented with the question, what shall I give Christ, I forget to ask, what does He truly desire. As much as we would have a hard time giving Him our riches as the magi do, the greater gift that they gave was their homage, the worship, their hearts.

As we begin this new year as a newly clustered parish community, as one family in Christ, let us take time to give Christ a gift as well, a little more of our hearts, a little more of our service to Him. If we were looking for the best Christmas gift, this is it, the gift of giving ourselves to Christ! Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you all.



Religious Education "News You Need to Know"

Happy New Year!! Happy New Year to everyone. At the start of each new year I like to look back at the past year. While many of us could not wait for 2020 to end, as that was the year Covid took over our lives. 2021 has also brought about many challenges. Last year due to Covid we divided our Religious Education classes up to only meet every other week. This was done to reduce the number of students here on any given night. For a while we had to limit the number of people at Mass. "Social Distancing" became an everyday phrase. But 2021 also had many bright spots. Our students were able to get back on schedule to receive their Sacraments. Students returned to a great week at Extreme Faith Camp. The high school students were able to attend the annual Steubenville conference in Rochester, MN. We hosted a Totus Tuus team here at the end of June. We had one of the largest group of students in attendance that we have had in a number of years. The parish with the help of the Knights of Columbus hosted a summer block party. Now 2022 will bring some new opportunities. We are becoming a 4-parish cluster with Sacred Heart from Stetsonville joining our family of parishes. We will be looking to bring new opportunities to all four parishes in Religious Education in the coming months and years ahead. As we say good bye to 2021 we look forward with optimism that 2022 will be the beginning of an even bigger and stronger family of four parishes.


