



As we celebrated, or are still celebrating, Christmas with a fire in the fireplace, gifts under the tree, and plenty of food for all, please remember those less fortunate in our community who are struggling. We continue to get many calls from people with problems that do not have simple answers. People are



being evicted because they have lost jobs and have no income. Women are having difficult pregnancies that force them to be unable to work – or they are having babies and the fathers have gone to jail or have left for some other reason. People are missing work and sometimes losing jobs because of medical problems. In this season of "peace on earth, goodwill to all", landlords still expect to receive their rent. Shelters are often at capacity and there are long waiting lists for subsidized housing. Although we cannot always help financially, we try to provide a listening ear and a compassionate attitude as we listen to their problems. Sometimes it helps just to know that someone cares.

We know that the most wonderful gift of all at Christmas is the gift of Jesus, but let's think for a minute about a more practical, yet symbolic, gift that we might give to another or might have received ourselves – socks. Socks are an important accessory, especially in this season of cold weather, so they are a very practical gift. In fact, if you see a (homeless) person with a sign asking for help this winter, rather than ignoring him/her, or giving money that might get spent inappropriately, consider giving that person a pair of socks to help warm their feet.

Socks are also a very symbolic gift. When we are hesitating or nervous about doing something that seems out of our comfort zone, we might say that we get "cold feet". With "cold feet" we might not speak out for justice and we might not walk with those who are lonely or lingering on the fringes of society. With "cold feet" we might not be willing to serve the poor and downtrodden and share God's love. With "cold feet" we might not have the courage to spread the Good News. Each morning as we put on our socks, we can thank God for their warmth in these cold days of winter, but we might also use them as a symbolic reminder to pass the *warmth* of God's love on to others in a world that often seems cold.

Thank you so much for supporting our St Vincent de Paul Society in a variety of ways during this past year. We so appreciate your prayers, your financial contributions and your donations of needed food and household items that can be such a blessing to those we visit. Without you, we can't be effective. May you feel abundantly blessed by God's great love during this Christmas season!





Saint of the Week

The Acts of the Apostles tells the story of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr. A man filled with grace and power, he worked great wonders among the people. Some Jews debated with St. Stephen but could not match his wisdom and spirit. Eventually, a charge of blasphemy was brought up against him, and the local population demanded that he be tried and sentenced. He was seized and carried before the Sanhedrin.

Despite the danger he faced, in front of the Sanhedrin and his accusers, St. Stephen gave a long speech about the history of Israel and the blessings that God had given upon His chosen people. He talked about how Israel had become disobedient despite God's abundant mercy. This enraged his accusers, and eventually the crowd dragged him out of the city and stoned him to death.

Even in his final moments, St. Stephen displayed great forgiveness and even asked God not to hold the sins of his attackers against them. Hundreds of years after his death, he is still a role model for us to follow.
