DEAR PARISHIONERS,

Eddie Hanzlin is an eight-year-old boy from Davenport, IA who made national news. He noticed that Clifford Boyson, an elderly tenant and his neighbor in the next apartment was very sad. You see when Clifford and his siblings were very young they got split up and placed in foster homes in the Chicago area never to be reunited. It turns out that Clifford had been searching for his sister for nearly sixty years and he wasn't having any luck locating her. Clifford asked his 8-year-old neighbor, Eddie Hanzlin, to look online for his sister. Within a week the child found her on Facebook. She was living in Florissant, MO. Eddie initially arranged that they speak to each other through Skype. Clifford and his sister, Betty, finally reunited in Davenport.

It is a very sweet story but it is also a great example of Individual Stewardship.

The Hoover brand is a household name as it is usually associated with the vacuum cleaner that is stored in the hallway closet. After keeping homes clean for more than 100 years, Hoover has announced a new commitment to support the "Cleaning For A Reason Foundation", which is the national organization devoted to helping women with cancer have clean homes. The nation's leading home cleaning brand is teaming with "Cleaning For A Reason" to provide funding and equipment to local maid services or cleaning crews across the country to provide professional cleaning at no cost to area cancer patient participants. Founder Debbie Sardone says, "We focus on the home so women can focus on their health. With Hoover's help, we can help even more women in communities across the country."

What a great form of outreach but also what a great example of Corporate Stewardship.

In 1994, Congress passed the King Holiday and Service Act, which transformed Martin Luther King Jr. Day (the third Monday in January) into a day dedicated to volunteer service in honor of Dr. King's legacy. It is the only Federal Holiday designated as a national day of service to encourage all Americans to volunteer to improve their communities. AmeriCorps has been charged with leading this effort for the past quarter century. The foundation of the "MLK Day" rests upon the famous words of Dr. King as he said, "Everybody can be great…because anybody can serve. You don't have to have a college degree to serve. You don't have to make your subject and verb agree to serve. You only need a heart full of grace, a soul generated by love."

And so, on a grand scale, what a great effort to inspire acts of service in our country but also what a great example of **National Stewardship**.

You see, whether you are a little kid from Davenport, IA or a major corporation based out of Ohio or the United States of America being one of the greatest nations in the world – each entity has an innate ability (and I would hope – a deep desire) to be of service and practice faithful stewardship with its gifts.

St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians launches into a discourse on the varieties of functions with the Christian community. He speaks of gifts, ministries and works. "Gifts" here refers to operations of the Spirit. "Ministry" was service within the community. "Works" were feats of great energy or divine power. Since all these gifts or ministries or works were manifestations of the Spirit, no one was to be considered superior to the other and all were given for the benefit of the entire community.

Next weekend we will hear St. Paul remind us that we are but one body with many parts. In the body, each part has its own unique functions, but all parts work for the good of the whole. This figure of speech characterizes several aspects of the ideal Christian community. It portrays unity in diversity; it underscores the absence of competition among members, since no one activity is elevated above the others; it heightens the interdependence that exists within the community.

As we consider our gift of faith what does it mean in our lives? How does it change us, motivate us or inspire us? Sadly, many of us may not have an answer to these questions. Faith is something we leave forgotten on a shelf until a time of sorrow, fear or need prompts us to take it down, brush away the dust and say, "What would I do without my faith?"

This is the time that we are asked to take our faith off the shelf and put it into action. We are called to stop saying, "What would I do without my faith?" and start asking ourselves "What am I doing with my faith?" The goal of these efforts is for all of us to rediscover the joy of living our faith. Since living requires action, true faith must lead us to actions. And, faith in action is the essence of stewardship.

Stewardship is not always a popular word. Many of us think that stewardship is just an appeal for more time, talent and treasure. However, true stewardship is not solely a fundraising or volunteer recruitment program. True stewardship is a way of life. It is a spirituality that calls us to deepen our relationship with God in trust, truly live the Gospel and realign the priorities of our lives.

Do you have stories of stewardship in your life? Do you know of someone else who has inspired you by practicing good stewardship – putting their faith in action – on an individual, local, corporate or national level? Please take some time now and write those stories down and relish in them. Let them inspire you to become more steeped in the reality of your faith. Share those stories with others so that they may be inspired to love and serve the Lord in unique and meaningful ways.




