

There was an ancient, sprawling cherry tree in the backyard of Mrs. Slaboda's home, just two houses down from where I lived as a young boy. All the neighborhood children loved to climb onto its limbs that seemed to stretch over Mrs. Slaboda's entire backyard.

She was one of those kind old ladies who actually enjoyed kids climbing her tree. Perhaps she was free to do that because those were the days before parents would have ever thought of holding her liable for any nicks, cuts or broken arms that their children might have incurred from climbing or falling from her tree. If any one of us children ever were hurt from our antics in that tree, it was our fault and no one else's. That just went without saying.



And in the summer, the cherries on that tree were like no other cherries I had ever tasted. To eat a cherry pie with cherries from Mrs. Slaboda's tree was like dying and going to heaven.

But over the years the limbs began to break, the branches hung low, and the cherries weren't as good. What was once such a glorious tree, over time began to look rather shabby.

Then one day in late autumn I came home from school to observe in horror that the old cherry tree had been reduced to a trunk and a few short cut-off limbs. It looked so dead. It was barely more than a stump. It didn't even look like a tree.

But my father told me that day that someday in the future it would be a very handsome cherry tree again, with lots of limbs and branches and delicious cherries.

I didn't believe him. There was no way that grand old tree would be anything more than a bare, ugly trunk of a tree.

And the following spring I wanted to say to my father, "I told you so," when nothing much happened to the bare trunk and sawed off limbs. A few green leaves sprouted out of the ends of the limbs, but you could hardly count those. It still looked dead. But the second spring, a glorious thing happened. Long sprouts came out all over the place. You could even call them branches. After a while lots of leaves could be seen so that by mid-summer the old cheery tree was looking like a tree again. Nothing you could climb yet, but a tree all the same. And the third spring there were blossoms and cherries again.

Several years later, a college student by then, I returned home one spring break and happened to see a new generation of neighborhood children in the person of a little girl with pig tails and bib overalls climbing along one of the cherry tree's new sprawling branches. It wasn't yet a great old limb, but it was doing the job all the same.

My father had been right after all.

Our lives can be so much like that cherry tree. Where there once was a sense of peace and joy and optimism, there now seems to be worry, anxiety, sadness, loneliness, and fear. Where life was once graced with the fullness and beauty like that of a blossoming tree, there now seems only to be a lifeless stump. Perhaps it is a marriage which promised to dispel all loneliness and unhappiness that now has died or lies dormant; a business venture or job that would finally bring a sense of security that now has collapsed; children who would only be a source of untold joy, who now give untold heartache; a friendship that would remain true and faithful that has now been betrayed; a healthy strong body that would never fail that now lies motionless in a hospital bed.

We all have stumps in our lives. But the promise of God is that stumps can become full of life again.

What form that new life will take is not ours to determine, but God's. It is our task, however, to live with expectancy for what God will give, to cooperate with that new life, to nurture that new hope, wherever and whenever it appears. It is not our task to place expectations on how God must act in our lives, but to learn what it means to live with expectancy that indeed God will act.

Hope is open-ended. It is willing to be surprised by the end-results. Hope is not demanding, but believes in the goodness of the one in whom hope is placed.

When my father told me that Mrs. Slaboda's cherry tree would be a great cherry tree again, the only picture in my mind was the cherry tree whose limbs and branches I knew so well. But its new life was a cherry tree with a whole new shape. And so it is with our lives. From seemingly lifeless stumps will come new life that will have a shape and form and direction perhaps far different that what we may have expected. Hope always remains open to God's future.
