

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

Up to the Job

Have you ever had a job for which you didn't feel qualified? I think we all have, whether it was a paying gig or not. A lot of us parents often feel in awe of the magnitude of that role and lose sleep worrying that we made the wrong decision in one situation or a bad call in another. Some of us feel intimidated by what our communities need from us, on the parish level or in our personal relationships. Or maybe we are simply dreading a task that seems too big, too overwhelming — that necessary basement cleanout, or the weekly organization of family schedules.

When we don't feel qualified, we don't want to do the work. We get stuck in our own fear. That's the birthplace of procrastination, self-doubt and bitterness. When we look inward at our own abilities, we can only see all the traits that aren't there. The intelligence, the dexterity, the ambition — whatever it is we lack, we get stuck on it.

I've got good news and bad news. I'll start with the bad news: none of us are qualified for the call of discipleship. We simply aren't. We don't have the love or grace or strength to get the job done.

Now I'll give you the good news: God knows this, and He doesn't care. Stewardship does not insist that we possess every good quality — no, as a way of life, stewardship recognizes that we lack *so many* qualities. But it shows us where to find the love and grace and strength we need. Stewardship does not demand that we know every answer; it merely reminds us who to ask when we don't.

Blessings to all as we celebrate the Feast of the Most Holy

Trinity! The picture on the front of our bulletin today is the famous icon by the Russian artist Andrei Rublev. The Trinity depicts the three angels who visited Abraham at the Oak of Mamre (Genesis 18:1-8), but the painting is full of symbolism and is interpreted as an icon of the Holy Trinity. The icon displays the hospitality of Abraham and Sarah given to the three strangers receiving them as guests. May we all reflect this same hospitality of the Holy Trinity as we welcome the stranger in our lives-- whether it be new parishioners, students, tourists, visitors from other parishes, other faith traditions, racial backgrounds and orientations, our Afghan or Ukrainian refugees, immigrants, and our Hispanic neighbors. The list goes on and on! God's love is all encompassing and, as his children, he bids us to always follow his example of love and welcome to others.

Much has happened since my last bulletin entry. The three Sponsor Circles for the three households of an extended Afghan family held a **Welcome Dinner** for them at the Newman Center two weeks ago. The Sponsor Circles are from three faith communities in Carbondale: our neighbor, the First Presbyterian Church, Carbondale Unitarian Fellowship, and our parish of Saint Francis Xavier. Another sponsor circle has been formed and is waiting for a match for their sponsorship. Presently, we have seven refugees, with a baby due shortly. The Carbondale Area Interfaith Refugee Support (CAIRS) has been the group overseeing this program. CAIRS is also hoping to sponsor eight more members of the family our community is sponsoring since they are also in harms way. The family CAIRS has helped sponsor has already had several family members who were killed trying to leave Afghanistan. Please pray that we can assist these remaining refugees and provide them welcome as well.

Our annual **Feast of the Ascension ecumenical evening prayer service** was another fine experience. Members of Saint Andrew Episcopal Church, Epiphany Lutheran Church, and Saint Francis Xavier Catholic Church and the Newman Center gathered at Saint Andrew for a beautiful service. We are grateful for our ecumenical ties to these congregations and the many more we associate with in our Carbondale community.

As you all know, **Bishop Michael McGovern** was at our parish for the Feast of the Visitation on May 31st. Parishes in our diocese were all informed of his visit to promote the Respect for Life at all stages from the moment of conception until natural death. About 150 people were present for the liturgy and there was great local publicity on the front page of The Southern and by WSIL Channel 3 television. The Mass was live streamed and can be found on the Newman Center's website.

The ordination of Father Thomas Lugge was held this past Saturday at the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Belleville. A nearly full cathedral church celebrated his ordination which was a festive occasion. Thomas had served an internship at the Newman Center and Saint Joseph Parish in Cobden four years ago. We will have four of our six diocesan seminarians in Murphysboro and Marion this summer. Our next priesthood ordination of one of them will be in two years. Two priests are retiring this summer including former pastor Fr. Carl Scherrer, which is after three priest retirements six months ago due to health reasons. Please continue to pray for and encourage vocations to the priesthood, religious life, diaconate, and lay ecclesial ministry!

Thank you for the congratulations extended for my 49^{th} anniversary of priestly ordination on June 2^{nd} . Next year my 50^{th} Golden Jubilee will be on the Feast of the Most Holy Trinity on June 4^{th} , 2023.

The Spirit of God Is a Wild Thing

"The Holy Spirit, God's energizing presence among us, the life force that drives us beyond ourselves, that whispers us into the great quest within, that makes life alive with a purpose not seen but deeply, consciously, stubbornly felt even in the midst of chaos, even at the edge of despair, sounds the truth in us that we are more than we seem to be.

Do I believe in the Holy Spirit? You bet I do. Nothing else makes sense. Either the Spirit of God who created us is with us still, either the presence of Christ who is the Way abides in us in spirit, or the God of Creation and the Redeemer of souls have never been with us at all. God's spirit does not abandon us, cannot abandon us, if God is really God.

The Spirit of God moves us to new heights of understanding, to new types of witness, to new dimensions of life needed in the here and now. The static dies under the impulse of the Spirit of a creating God. We do not live in the past. We are not blind beggars on a dark road groping our separate ways toward God. There is a magnet in each of us, a gift for God, that repels deceit and impels us toward good. The gifts are mutual, mitered to fit into one another for strength and surety.

We are, in other words, in the most refreshingly trite, most obviously astounding way, all in this together—equally adult, equally full members, equally responsible for the church. Nor does any one dimension of the church, then, have a monopoly on insight, on grace, on the promptings of God in this place at this time. The Spirit of God is a wild thing, breathing where it will, moving as it pleases, settling on women and men alike."


