#### 10 AMAZING Facts for the 4th of July

- 1. Benjamin Franklin wanted the turkey to be the national animal but was out-voted when John Adams and Thomas Jefferson chose the bald eagle.
- 2. The stars on the original American flag were arranged in a circle to ensure that all colonies were represented equally.
- 3. John Hancock was the only person to actually sign the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. The other 55 signers did not sign it until later.
- 4. Thomas Jefferson and John Adams died on the day, July 4, 1826, the fiftieth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.
- History's first submarine attack took place in New York Harbor in 1776.
- There were no fireworks on July 4, 1776, but there were one year later. This was 6 years before Americans knew whether the new nation would survive the war.
- 7. George Washington was the best spymaster in American History! He ran espionage rings in British-held areas and he was a genius at misinformation. He constantly befuddled the British by leaking through double agents, inflated reports of the strength of his army.
- 8. Washington was a robust man with a seeming immunity to disease and bullets. In one encounter in the French and Indian War, he absorbed 4 bullets in his coat and hat and had 2 horses shot from under him without any injury to himself.
- 9. The United States of America won its independence despite the fact that the British Army was established, experienced, disciplined, and trained and the American army was not. In addition to this, the British Army had ample quantities of powder, guns, and clothing and the American Army was not well supplied.
- 10. The song "Yankee Doodle" was sung originally by British officers making fun of backwoods Americans.

### Thoughts FROM... Terry

This week in the readings, I feel a sense of joy and energy that Jesus Christ is our lord! Sometimes when I'm on a spiritual retreat focused on growth in the faith, I think the same way. I called those moments in life "Jesus high" moments. However, just like a "high," those moments due not last forever. During my busy life throughout the week, I sometimes forget the greatness of Christ and do not share that message through my actions and words. The readings this week are there to help us even through the most difficult and far away times in our faith. That love that Mary has for her son and all of us is truly beautiful. That is the love we are called to share with others, just like Mary to the people who love us and those who hate us. Once we can do this, we will see the blessing in a greater detail that the Lord has for us. like in Isaiah.

In the Gospel of Luke, we hear that Jesus appointed seventy-two of his disciples to preach to every town and village, "The Kingdom of God is at hand for you." Jesus makes it clear that this journey is not easy just because many people will oppose those words they are speaking, but also because Jesus tells them to bring no money, sack, or even sandals for their feet. For us, in the 21st century, that command by Christ might seem crazy and very dangerous. During the 1st century, it also was very dangerous. Instead of thinking about all the challenges, the seventy-two went out and fulfilled their mission from the Lord. We hear when they get back the joy and love that is in their hearts for how they were able to help others. Let's go forward into the world this week and have the energy of the disciples when we go to work, the pool, or a friend's house to look out for others. There is much division in our country today and what I think we need is that calling from Christ and the energy to respond to that call. The call we get each week starts with the Eucharist a gift that is more valuable than anything else in the world we can receive. Let's take the gift of the Eucharist to all we meet and show as Catholics our actions are ones of love and care.


