DRIVING DIRECTIONS:

FROM BELLEVILLE:

Take Rt 15 East going through Marissa - (55 min-41mi)
In Marissa: Turn LEFT onto E. Lyons St
In 4.2 miles turn LEFT onto IL-13 E (toward Tilden)
In 6.5 miles turn RIGHT onto County Line Rd
In 2.3 miles turn LEFT onto Tulip Rd
In 1.2 miles turn LEFT to arrive at the farm
(The farm will be on your left. Turn in the second driveway by the mailbox)

FROM PINCKNEYVILLE:

In Pinckneyville: At the roundabout, take the first exit onto Kennedy Dr. - Route 13
In 11 miles turn LEFT onto Snapdragon Rd
In 1.7 miles turn RIGHT onto Tulip Rd
In 1.0 miles turn RIGHT to arrive at the farm

(The farm will be on your right. Turn in the first driveway by the mailbox)

"Farm Blessing" signs will guide you along the way. Those attending are invited to bring harvested grain, fruit, vegetables and garden produce in sealed, marked containers along with animals and farm machinery to be blessed. Non-perishable food items for the needy of the area will be collected. We look forward to having you join us!

Gospel Reflection

When I was a young boy, my parents told me about their wedding. Then a few years later, they showed me my mother's wedding dress and my dad's suit. It was astonishing to see and touch garments that connected me to the event that led to my existence. Of course, I already believed they were married based on their word. But these holy garments made the event real and tangible for me.

Something like this is at play when St. John reports encountering in Jesus' tomb, "the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place" (John 20:7). Those two separate cloths, for his head and for his body respectively, meant a great deal to St. John and to the early Christians. Some years after the resurrection, there surfaced reports of two cloths with unusual characteristics, one bearing the image of a crucified man's body, another smaller one with the image of a wounded man's face. Some call them the Shroud of Turin and the Veil of Manoppello; they both can be seen today.

These two cloths have a long and complicated history, and scholars debate aspects of them. If you're curious, I encourage you to read about them. To be clear, I believe in the resurrection of Jesus because of the testimony of eyewitnesses and the gift of faith in the Church. Nevertheless, seeing these two mysterious cloths have made the life-giving event of Jesus' resurrection more real and tangible for me. Maybe they will for you, too.

Thoughts FROM... Dawn

As a rule, I enjoy writing out my bulletin thoughts. It's a privilege to study passages of scripture and share how I think a given text could apply to our lives here and now. That is the purpose of Scripture, after all; it's the primary source for learning who God is and how He wants us to live our lives as his people. For us as Christians, Jesus is the ultimate revelation of God. In the gospels Jesus is quite forthcoming about what is required to be a disciple of Christ. What God and Jesus want of us has not changed in the past two thousand years.

That being said, the event of the resurrection magnifies the importance of our striving to live the way Jesus calls us to live. I have to tell you that writing a reflection for Easter, therefore, carries greater tension with it. Here we are celebrating the most important day in all of Christianity! How can I possibly add anything to all the great writings that commemorate this day which marks the resurrection? In truth, I don't have anything wildly elucidating to add. It was an amazing, confounding event.

I can relate to the confounding part, though. In particular, I can sympathize with the confusion Mary Magdalen, Peter, and the Beloved Disciple felt at the empty tomb! Had I been in their company that morning, I would not have been guessing Jesus had risen from the dead! Likewise, I can relate to the confusion felt by those to whom Jesus appeared after his resurrection. It's no wonder they didn't recognize him at first.

Today we take the reality of the resurrection for granted. We are Christians because of it. We celebrate Easter because of it. We expect to be resurrected ourselves someday. On the one hand, it is a gift to have this confidence. Nevertheless, I think we have all experienced moments of confusion, perhaps even disbelief. How, we wonder, is God working in some particular event in our lives (events much less momentous than raising us from the dead)? At moments like that we are lucky to have Mary Magdalen, Peter, and the Beloved Disciple to remind us to continue to trust in God and Jesus no matter how unbelievable or world-changing our circumstances might be. Their faith led them to carry the message of Jesus into the world. We are called to do the same.
