I personally know the impact of Catholic education. From grade school to high school to college to seminary, I myself am a product of 22 years as a student in Catholic schools! I am so very grateful for all the ways that Catholic schools shaped me into who I am.

If you'd like to learn more about our outstanding St. Leonard School, please come to our Open House next weekend. It takes place next Sunday January 23 from 10am to 12:30pm in the school building. Come see the facilities, meet the teachers, parents and students, learn about our excellent programs, and ask any questions you have.

Our school offers small class sizes, many "buddy experiences" among Grades K3-8 classes, and half and full-day options for grades K3 and K4. Extended care is available for full-day students.

Some of the highlights of my week are teaching religion classes on Thursdays and our school Masses on Fridays. Our Catholic faith infuses everything we do at St. Leonard School.

A great school adds so much life to a parish! We aim to foster the growth of mind, body, and soul through excellence in faith formation, academics, leadership, the arts, and athletics. Our school has a very strong community spirit. Children in different grade levels get to know each other in their "faith family". Parents know the parents of the other children in their class.

Please do not let finances prevent you from considering St. Leonard School. We have financial aid available. We also participate in the Wisconsin School Choice Program.

Many people are not aware of a state tax deduction that makes Catholic education more affordable. Taxpayers can deduct up to \$4,000 for tuition paid for dependent children in grades kindergarten through eighth, and up to \$10,000 for high school students. The tuition and fees for a student at St. Leonard School are below that maximum amount. This means that St. Leonard School students' annual tuition and book fees are fully allowable as tax deductions.

This is a nice savings for parents of children already in Catholic schools, and hopefully this deduction will encourage more families to consider Catholic education as it becomes more affordable. A Catholic education is an investment in your family that pays dividends for generations. Please discuss with your tax planner how this deduction could affect your family's taxes.

I want to say a special thank you to all those who make our school great – our outstanding Principal Laura Bisher, our teachers and staff, and dedicated parents and other volunteers who go the extra mile. WINE IN ANCIENT ISRAEL

Our Gospel this weekend is the familiar scripture about the wedding feast at Cana where Jesus performs his first miracle: turning water into wine. Wine production in Israel began thousands of years ago in the triangle of the Black Sea, the Caspian Sea and the Sea of Galilee. winepresses and Egyptian tomb The vine then traveled south toward Egypt where wine's importance was first documented. On the way, it passed through Canaan and ancient Israel, which became one of the earliest of all wine-producing countries. However, the wines that were made during this time often tasted so bad that bottles shipped to Egypt were improved with anything that would add flavor. People tossed in everything from honey to berries, from pepper to salt. The wine was of such poor quality that when Arab tribes took over Israel in the Islamic Conquest of 636, putting a stop to local wine production for 1,200 years, there was not any widespread disappointment.

Wine plays a central role in the biblical narratives. According to the "Oxford Companion to Wine," the vine is mentioned more than any other plant. A study at Brigham Young University in Utah found that the word yayin, one of many ancient Hebrew words used for wine, is used 140 times in the Old Testament alone. Noah was the first recorded vine grower. He planted his vineyard where the ark came to rest on Mount Ararat. However, he overindulged and passed out in his tent (Gen 9:21). When the spies returned to Moses after scouting out the Promised Land, they carried a large bunch of grapes on a pole to illustrate that it was a land flowing with milk and honey (Num 13:23-24). King David had two wine officials: one to manage his vineyards and the other his cellars. Later, Jesus shows up at a wedding with his disciples. During the reception, the wedding party runs out of wine and Jesus performs his first miracle, turning water into wine and saving the newlyweds from an epic social disaster. Toward the

end of his life, Jesus transformed wine into his blood at the Last Supper.

People drank abundant amounts of wine because it was safer than the water. Wine was also used as a disinfectant for wounds, as a dyeing agent, as an aid for digestion and for religious rituals. Archeologists have found ancient paintings depicting the winemaking process along with notations in the writings of Pliny the Elder (AD 23/24 – 79). The winepress, (gat in Hebrew), was usually close to the vineyard because there was less waste and a greater opportunity to maintain control of the winemaking process. The whole family would be involved with the harvest. Grapes would be carried in baskets and laid on the floor of the winepress, and the men usually did the pressing. This was done by stomping on the grapes with bare feet. To avoid slipping, they would hold on to ropes attached to the roof. It was common practice to add the must, which contained some extra natural sugar, to the new wine so that it would overwhelm the yeast, stopping fermentation before the wine entered the vinegar stage. The must was also mixed with water for fruit juice for women and children who were not allowed to drink wine.

Wine to the ancients was in most cases more of a survival product than a luxury, although the wealthy were said to make good wine that could last a few years. To the commoner, wine needed to last through to the next harvest, and without the technology we have today, they had to make sure the new wine didn't ferment for too long or it would turn to vinegar. If the couple getting married in Canaan were wealthy, then Jesus and his Apostles were probably drinking new wine that was diluted just right so that it was smooth and fruity, with just the right amount of sweetness, for the wedding guests to proclaim that it was the best around.

NEW MEMBERS

MARRIAGE

Engaged couples, planning on getting married through St Leonard parish, need to meet with the priest at least 6 months in advance. Please note that no date can be finalized for the wedding until after this initial meeting takes place. At least one of the couple must be a registered member of the parish. Please call the Parish Office to make an appointment.

MINISTRY TO SICK & SHUT-INS

If you are confined at home and unable to attend Mass, to receive Communion please call the parish office for a visit from the Pastoral Associate. The extended care facilities in our area are gradually reopening and our nursing home ministers are resuming Communion services per facility direction. Because of federal privacy laws, if you wish a visit from the priest or Pastoral Associate while in the hospital, you or your family must call the parish and inform us that you are a patient and request a visit.

"NEW BEGINNINGS"

Our Gospel reading today recounts the wedding at Cana, where Jesus performs His first "sign." Weddings are an oft-used

metaphor in both the Old and New Testaments to symbolize the relationship between God and His people, as we hear Isaiah say in our first reading, "As a bridegroom rejoices in his bride, so shall your God rejoice in you." We see this relationship in the wedding at Cana as well when Jesus steps in to "save" the wedding from running out of wine (which has also been used to symbolize God's love for us). By performing His first public sign, Jesus begins to reveal His identity to those closest to Him and begins His life of ministry that will eventually lead to His death and the salvation of mankind. We celebrate this new beginning today by singing Dan Schutte's "City of God," where we acknowledge "A new day is dawning for all those who weep" and "The Lord of our longing has conquered the night!" After Jesus's first miracle, the Disciples' lives were never the same, and by extension, our lives would never be the same. Our God is one of new beginnings and we are called to be a people of hope who build the City of God and believe that newness is possible because He has "turned the night into day."


SERIOUSLY, GOD BOOK TALK
