

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Archbishop Fulton Sheen said, "It takes three to make love, not two: you, your spouse, and God." Apart from the incarnation of God in Jesus Christ, nothing speaks better of God's incarnate love than marriage. God designed it this way. We place great value on love and rightly so. What we fail to realize, however, is that love, its very presence and place in our lives, is not simply part of the human package deal. Love comes from God. It is one of God's greatest gifts to human beings. When we begin to realize that our very ability to love is sacred, it changes up how we see the essence of life, and purpose and sanctity of marriage.

God is love. It stands to reason then that if we follow the path of unconditional, self-emptying love we will then stumble upon God. It is precisely this intimate wedding of God with love that gives such eloquence and honor to the love between husband and wife. As a living sign of Christ's love for the Church and for humanity, husbands and wives speak volumes of God's unconditional incarnate love for all of his children! The Divine power that brings unity and life to marriage is so strong that once joined, it really cannot be separated.

Admittedly, marriage covenants can be extremely difficult to negotiate and, at times, very painful to experience. God's perfect divinity always meets our broken and imperfect humanity. God is okay with this setup as he created it this way. Our loving is never as unconditional as God's and often tainted by our own imperfections, needs, memories, hurts, sinfulness, and weakness. All of this baggage negatively impacts even the most well-intentioned marriages, causing them to be hurtful and empty. We are love works in progress. God can succeed in perfecting our love only if we keep our eyes fixed on him as the source of that love. That's why marriage is always about three and not just two.

The Divine intimacy at the heart of marriage is what can make them celebrations of great union and happiness. Couples who are still madly in love with each other after many years, still looking at each other with that timeless twinkle in their eyes, best tell the story of God's oneness with humanity. Honor, celebrate, and support those who have accepted a vocation to marriage. Living in a world that easily pulls relationships apart, may they find hope and inspiration from their faith companions who are on the same journey!

ST. JOHN'S 180TH ANNIVERSARY—A CELEBRATION OF OUR HISTORY

The following is an excerpt from a publication celebrating St. John's 150th Anniversary in 1991. It gives an abbreviated history of our parish founding, and church building history...

Our journey of faith began on August 2, 1841, when three young men, having immigrated from their German homeland, arrived on the banks of the Fox River. They had left their families behind in Chicago as they searched for a place to settle that had adequate land for raising crops and where they could establish their homes.

Jacob Schmitt, Nicolaus Adams, and Nicolaus Frett found themselves surrounded by a countryside that was lush and green, virtually untouched. They agreed that this place would be where they would settle.

Soon there were others who would join them: the first was Johann Baptist Mueller, followed by more families from the Coblenz and Eiffel regions of Germany. The community they formed was first called Miller's settlement, possibly named for Johann Mueller. One year later, the first St. John the Baptist Catholic Church was constructed under the direction of Fr. Portman on the site of the present church. The church was built of logs and measured 20' x 28' in size.

As more families joined the parish, it became necessary, in 1850, to construct a larger 33' x 75' frame church building. In 1851 Bishop Van de Velde, bishop of Chicago, blessed St. John the Baptist Roman Catholic Church. He also confirmed 63 people during the ceremony. Later that year, 33 people were confirmed into the Roman Catholic faith. Until 1852, visiting priests minister to the people of Miller's settlement but, as the community grew, resident pastors became part of St. John the Baptist Parish.

In 1867, during the pastorate of Rev. Clemens Venn, the third St. John the Baptist church building was begun...a larger brick building of Gothic architecture (50' x 133' in size) like that remembered by those from their German homeland. It was completed 20 years later, during the pastorate of Rev. Henry Mehring, at a final cost of \$45,000.

On February 18, 1900...during the time Father Mehring was in residence...the church was destroyed by fire of such proportion that it burned the entire building. Only a few statues and a small organ were retrieved before the building was consumed. Although the parishioners were saddened by the event, they were very grateful to God that there were no deaths or serious injuries as the fire started during a Sunday morning High Mass when the church was filled.

Parishioner Elisabeth Nichols, who was attending the mass with her brother and her father, Martin Schmidt, gave this account of the tragic event:

"Father Mehring had just begun his sermon when some of the faithful noticed smoke swirling around the Everlasting Light, which was hung near the Communion Rail. Soon flames and smoke were rampant along the entire ceiling. In an effort to evacuate the burning building as quickly as possible, many people became panic stricken, causing crushing and fainting. Many people climbed over pews. Some choir members fell down the stairs, and one even fell out a window on the staircase landing."

Undaunted by the catastrophe that would've overwhelmed others, the people of St. John's showed their spirit, their conviction, and their determination. Starting almost immediately

with the laying of a cornerstone, and using part of the foundation of their beloved church destroyed by the fire, they constructed a new church building. The church was completed in 1902 at a cost of nearly \$90,000.

That structure...the very church in which we worship today... was patterned after the north German Gothic architectural style. The floor of the church was laid out in the form of a cross with the room widening near the altar and narrowing at the front doors. ... The hand painted murals and stained glass inside the church were brought from Germany. The steeple of the church rises 159 feet above the ground. The three bells inside the bell tower were made in St. Louis, Missouri. The largest of these is 47 inches in diameter, forged of solid bronze, and weighs 3,500 pounds.

In 1927 the parish held a three day celebration on June 24th, 25th, and 26th to commemorate the 86th anniversary of the founding of the parish and the 25th anniversary of the present church. To celebrate the double Jubilee, during the pastor of Reverend Reverend William Weber, the church was redecorated at a cost of \$30,000. The elaborate decorating took eight months to complete as the work was done free-hand, with a large amount of gold leaf being used.

From the time of its completion in 1902 until 1975, the church building served its parishioners well. Maintenance repairs to the roof and redecoration of its interior were done as needed over the years, but not on a regular schedule. Because of this, through the years the building deteriorated; paint began to peel, plaster cracked, support pillars showed signs of aging, and the church lost the luster at once possessed. By 1975, major repairs were needed.

There were those who believed it should be torn down, replaced by a more modern structure that would be far more efficient and easier to maintain. But the spirit of their forefathers remained in the blood of the people...they resisted this notion. They had a vision, a vision of maintaining the heritage and beauty of the past with the needs of the present.

During the pastorate of Rev. Leo J. Bartel, a campaign was begun in late 1974 to save the church and restore it to its original beauty. Funding was raised, and the work begun. As the restoration proceeded, problems were incurred. Structural columns supporting the roof had serious dryrot, necessitating major and unanticipated repairs that required the raising of additional money to complete the restoration. Because of this, the parish was left with a debt of almost \$1,000,000 by the time the restoration was completed in 1978. But the spirit of the people again rose to the occasion. Through the efforts of the Winners' Circle they responded with their support so that the debt was completely paid in 1986 during the pastorate of Rev. John C. Holdren. In addition, and endowment of \$200,000 was established for the maintenance of the church building. The final restoration cost was \$1,241,000.

The decision to forgo the establishment of a new building later proved to be the correct decision as, in 1984, the church building received Landmark status. A plaque, presented by the McHenry County Historical Society, was placed to the left of the front entrance and commemoration of the event. The inscription on the plaque reads:




St. John the Baptist Church Throughout the Ages



The first chapel on the site of the present church was built of logs and measured 20'x 28' in size. It's construction was overseen by Fr. Portman. This first log cabin church also served as a school and meeting hall and served the community until 1850 when a larger frame church was built.

The first frame church was built in 1850 according to the testimony of old settlers and the diary of a Bishop Van de Belde: "May 1, 1850—visited new church (not finished, frame) of St. John the Baptist, in Miller settlement, three or four miles from McHenry town, (75' x 33'), well-designed; made arrangements to have a frame church 50' x 35', built at McHenry. A lot free, for the purpose was given by Mr. Brown, a protestant." "November 9, 1851—Blessed church of St. John the Baptist of the German congregation, near the village of McHenry..."






In 1867, under the pastorate of Rev. Clemens Venn, construction of a new church began, and was finished 20 years later by Rev. Henry Mehring.

PASTORAL HISTORY

Up until 1852 the Johnsburg congregation was ministered to by visiting priests. The first priest visited the settlement in the fall of 1841 by accident. He was the Rev. Fr. Fisher, sent from Vincennes. Indiana to minister to the needs of Catholics in Northern Illinois and Wisconsin. Returning from the latter state, he had lost his way and was brought by Indians to Miller's Settlement, where he offered Mass next morning in Nick Frett's block house. The next priest who visited the settlement was the Rev. Plathe, who at intervals offered Mass in John Mueller's block house and once in Schmitt's chapel over the river. Another priest, Rev. Koch, remained with the people a fortnight. (Source: Parish Jubilee Publication from 1927)

HISTORICAL CONTRIBUTIONS TO ST. JOHN'S CEMETERY

It is very fitting that St. John the Baptist Cemetery is dedicated to the lasting memory of the first settlers who organized the parish. Plaqued in 1986, the inscription reads, in part:

"It is the resting place until the day of Resurrection for the bodies of the faithful departed, once temples of the Holy Spirit, whose souls are now with God. It is a final and continuing profession of faith in God and of membership in the Church by those who have chosen to be buried with fellow believers of "The Household of Faith."

While the parish had a cemetery from the very beginning of its organization, two pastors, in particular, were instrumental in beautifying the grounds, and evidence of their efforts is still visible today.



Rev. William Weber served as pastor from 1915 until 1930. One of the most memorable contributions to the parish was the Grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes, dedicated to the memory of Rev. Henry Mehring. The grotto is an exact reproduction of the original grotto in Lourdes, France... It is constructed from petrified stone which was shipped to Johnsburg from Erie County, Ohio.

Father Weber's successor, Rev. Anthony Vollman, authorized the building of the Via Dolorosa, "Road of Sorrows", with a beautiful garden, Stations of the Cross, ponds, and a chapel with housed an image of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. Thousands of people came annually to visit the inspirational and artistic church and to meditate while making their way through an equally impressive churchyard. By the year 1944, a guest book located in the cemetery contained names of people from every state.





The Crucifixion, located near the entrance of the cemetery, was dedicated on September 4, 1932. The statue was sculpted in Italy, and was shipped to Johnsburg in sections. The statue was then pieced together by Joseph and George Frett (descendants of Nicolaus Frett, one of the original pioneers to settle Johnsburg), and Frank Freund. These men also built the pedestal on which the statue rests as well as the chapel in honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. When the statue was completely assembled, it presented, as it still does, an object of rich beauty.

This excerpt taken in part from "Our Cemetery", an article appearing in the 1927 St. John's Parish Jubilee publication. Editor's Note: The following is an excerpt taken from the 1927 Parish Jubilee publication titled "History of the Parish" identifying the names of several of the first settlers and founders of our church.

Taken from the New World, Edition, Volume 8, No. 33, Chicago, Saturday, April 14, 1900, and from the History of the Diocese of Rockford, Illinois, 1924, and From the Parish Records, and from Tombstone's in the Cemetery

This is one of the oldest Catholic communities in the state of Illinois, exclusively German. There is a tradition that as early as 1838, Bishop Brutte of Vincennes, IN was in the neighborhood and baptized four children. The Germans, however, did not come until about three years later. The first German settlers at Johnsburg were Jacob Schmitt, Nicolaus Adams and John Bapt. Mueller, and they arrived at the place on August 2, 1841. In 1842 came Fred Schmitt, Nic Molitor, John P. Bell, Hy Thelen, John Shaefer, William Klein, Nic Hess, John Mueller, John Freund, M. Blamenser, Fred Laiken, Math Gerads, Stephen Baudes, Peter Sabel, Nic Wagner, Matthew Wagner, John Friedrick, Franz Schmitt, John Adam Bloedt, Math Blek, Ph. Blek, Peter Blek, Matthew Gilles, Nic Meurer, Math Lay, Michael Wenkel. In 1843 they were followed by George Scheit, Michael Mueller, John P. Schmitt and Hy Brefeld, and in 1844 by Bernard and Hy Kennebeck, John Fester, John Kretzgen, B. Becker, Fr. Rothaermel, John Adam Mueller and John Schang. All these people came from the Eiffel, Coblenz and vicinity (of Germany).
