



DEACON'S DIALOGUE



Did you hear about the missionary doctor who treated a man for cataracts? Before the surgery, the man was blind. But after the treatment, he could see quite well. Well, the man was ecstatic, as you can imagine. There seemed to be no end to his gratitude. He freely shared his joy with other patients at the small mission clinic. And upon returning to his remote village, he told them all about his experience, then soon after, he left his home to travel to surrounding villages. After three months, he made his way back to the small mission clinic where he was treated originally. The missionary doctor was astonished to look out his window one day and see the man pulling a rope onto which 48 other people held tightly. The man had guided them through the countryside to this clinic. Besides the rope, the only other thing they had in common was their blindness. The grateful man had led them to the place where he had regained his sight.

In my opinion, this weekend's Gospel contains some of the most important images and words in all of Mark. We have the image of the blind man crying out, that is, shouting out, to Jesus to have pity on him. Now, I don't know about you, but for me, this is something that I do on a regular basis, at least internally. And while not physically blind, I know there are times when I am blind to Jesus, blind to God's presence in my life and in the world. And, especially blind - I am ashamed to admit - to God's presence in others. Now, this article isn't intended to be a "confession," so I'll stop there. I simply challenge all of us to recognize our blindness and ask to "see"...

What else is so striking to me is this: the blind man in the story is referred to by his name: Bartimaeus. It is a rare occurrence in the Gospels that a seemingly random blind man is called by name, so Mark must be emphasizing that we should pay special attention to what's happening. And did you notice how, at Jesus' call, Bartimaeus threw aside his cloak, which is most likely his ONLY possession and that of which he could least afford to let go? This should cause us to ponder if we are willing to do the same. What is it exactly that is most important to us? And are we willing to discard it to get to Jesus?

Then, for me, there are some of the most significant and beautiful words ever spoken. First, we hear: "Take courage ... Jesus is calling you." To know that Jesus is calling me—by name—and that He wants to know what he can do for me; it's overwhelming. And while it seems like there are so many things we could ask for, the question we need to answer is this: will whatever we ask for enable us to better see God's presence? Will these things strengthen and improve our ability to love God and others? Will these things reinforce and support our relationship with Jesus? Will these things enable and inspire us to lead others "to sight" like the man at the beginning of this story?

Then Jesus asks, "What do you want me to do for you?" Again ... how overwhelming to understand that Jesus loves us so much that He is willing to do anything for us in order to have our love in return. It seems strange, perhaps, and hard to believe the our God is asking this of us, when in all humility, we should be asking this of Him. Yes, why is it hard to believe when He has already shown us this by giving His life for us.

Finally, we hear, "... your faith has saved you." What comfort these words should bring no matter where we are in our lives or what trials we may face. And yes, I know this may sound trite or cliché, but our faith is a gift, like all things in life. Let me suggest that this should be our first request of Jesus if we don't have it—or if we have it but need more of it. And don't we all.

So as we face this week, let us always remember that Jesus will never stop calling us. And let us take courage.
