



MEETING WITH JEWISH COMMUNITY



The Pope in Slovakia last weekend

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Good evening! I thank you for your kind words of welcome and for the testimonies you have offered. I have come as a pilgrim, to visit this place and be moved by it. This Square is a highly meaningful place for your community. It keeps alive the memory of a rich history. For centuries it was part of the Jewish quarter. Here the celebrated rabbi Chatham Sofer labored. Here a synagogue stood alongside the Cathedral of the Coronation. The architectural setting, as we heard, was an expression of the peaceful coexistence of the two communities, an unusual and evocative symbol, and a striking sign of unity in the name of the God of our fathers. Here, like so many of them, I too feel the desire to “remove my sandals” in a place blessed by human fraternity in the name of the Most High.

In later times, however, God’s name was dishonored: in a frenzy of hatred, during the Second World War more than a hundred thousand Slovak Jews were killed. In an effort to eradicate every trace of the community, the synagogue was demolished. It is written: “You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain” (Ex 20:7). The divine Name, the Lord himself, is blasphemed whenever the unique and distinctive dignity of the human person, created in his image, is violated. Here, in this place, the Name of God was dishonored, for the worst form of blasphemy is to exploit it for our own purposes, refusing to respect and love others. Here, reflecting on the history of the Jewish people marked by this tragic affront to the Most High, we admit with shame how often his ineffable Name has been used for unspeakable acts of inhumanity! How many oppressors have said: “God is with us”; yet it was they, who were not with God!

Dear brothers and sisters, your history is our history, your sufferings are our sufferings. For some of you, this Memorial of the Shoah is the only place where you can honor the memory of your loved ones. I join with you in this. The word “zechor” –

God’s name was dishonored: in a frenzy of hatred, during the Second World War more than a hundred thousand Slovak Jews were killed. In an effort to eradicate every trace of the community, the synagogue was demolished.

“Remember!” – is inscribed in Hebrew on this Memorial. Memory cannot and must not give way to forgetfulness, for there will be no lasting dawn of fraternity unless we have first shared and dispelled the darkness of the night. For us too, the prophet’s question echoes: “Watchman, what of the night?” (Is 21:11). Now is the time when the image of God shining forth in humanity must not be obscured. Let us help one another in this effort. For in our day too, so many empty and false idols dishonor the Name of the Most High: the idols of power and money that prevail over human dignity; a spirit of indifference that looks the other way; and forms of manipulation that would exploit religion in the service of power or else reduce it to irrelevance. But also forgetfulness of the past, ignorance prepared to justify anything, anger and hatred. I repeat: let us unite in condemning all violence and every form of anti-Semitism, and in working to ensure that God’s image, present in the humanity he created, will never be profaned.

This Square, dear brothers and sisters, is also a place where the light of hope shines forth. Each year you come here during Hanukkah to light the first lamp on the menorah. Darkness is dispelled by the message that destruction and death do not have the last word, but rather renewal and life. Though the synagogue on this site was torn down, the community remains present. A community alive and open to dialogue. In this place, our histories meet once more. Here let us affirm together before God our willingness to persevere on the path of rapprochement and friendship.

I have vivid memories of my 2017 meeting in Rome with representatives of your Jewish and Christian communities. I am pleased to say that afterwards a Commission for dialogue with the Catholic Church was established and that together you have published several significant documents. It is good to share and make known the things that unite us. And it is good to advance, in truth and honesty, along the fraternal path of a purification of memory, to heal past wounds and to remember the good received and offered. According to the Talmud, whoever destroys a single individual destroys the whole world, while whoever saves a single individual saves the whole world. Every individual matters, and what you are doing through your important exchanges matters greatly. I thank you for the doors you have opened on both sides.

Our world needs open doors. They are signs of blessing for humanity. God said to Father Abraham: “By you all the families of the earth shall bless themselves” (Gen 12:3). This is a recurring theme throughout the lives of the Patriarchs (cf. Gen 18:18; 22:18; 26:4). To Jacob, Israel, God said: “Your descendants shall be like the dust of the earth, and you shall spread abroad to the west and to the east and to the north and to the south; and by you and your descendants shall all the families of the earth bless themselves” (Gen 28:14). ... May the Almighty bless you, so that, amid all the discord that defiles our world, you may always be, together, witnesses of peace. Shalom! Thank you.

NEW TEXAS ABORTION LAW



Abortion is integral to upholding systems that oppress women. That's why I support the new Texas law.

Years ago, an older lady with gray hair walked up to me and whispered in my ear that 40 years ago she had an abortion.

I had just spoken at a parish about the Catholic Church's teaching on abortion. I spoke about the Lord's

mercy and forgiveness, the power of the sacrament of reconciliation and hope after abortion. She told me I was the only person she had ever told about her abortion since that day four decades ago. We hugged each other. I gave her the contact information for Project Rachel, a post-abortion healing ministry. She left. I never saw her again.

Since I am a woman and I also talk about the circumstances that may lead to abortion, similar encounters have become

more commonplace over the years.

Abortion is integral to upholding systems that oppress women. Imagine the law, businesses, educational institutions, the military, the economy, the very structure of our society not having abortion as a buttress.

After more than 20 years of pro-life ministry, including counseling women outside of abortion clinics, I have heard many women and girls talk about why they aborted. Coercion, abuse, manipulation and hostility toward pregnancy are frequent themes.

I have heard and witnessed a variety of situations: a husband threatening to beat his wife to death if she dares to

remain pregnant; a mother or father forcing an abortion because they believe it is best for their daughter's future; a family threatening to expel the woman from the home if she does not abort; a boyfriend offering marriage in exchange for the abortion and then breaking up with her after the abortion; a private high school responding to pregnant girls with threats of expulsion; a college not offering practical resources for pregnant women; and a well-to-do husband preferring the expense of a new luxury car rather than welcoming a new child.

Aware of the harm done to women and the grave evil of abortion, I wondered how the new Texas Heartbeat Act addresses such women. So I read the complete text of the law.



Since our major parish-focused capital campaign in 2008, which raised **\$4,200,000 (\$5,300,000 in today's dollars)** our Parish and School have been working diligently behind the scenes to renovate the Elementary School building summer by summer, classroom by classroom, with the help of a local contractor. These summer projects were funded from our parish/school capital improvement budgets. We have spent about \$3,500,000 on these projects (2010 to the present).

We are now at the final step in this overall renovation process—principally, the Junior High building. After considering possible scenarios for accomplishing this task, the Finance Council and I believe that this effort is better tackled as one major project using a major contractor that will guarantee the shortest possible disruption of students and staff of the Junior High.

In addition, we hope this approach will save both time and money by completing the balance of our projects all at once. Please don't be startled by the figures at play. It's amazing what inflation has done in the 13 years since our



last campaign. Equally startling is what is happening now with inflation (as reported in the news).

It behooves the parish and school communities to attend to these major projects at this time. Delay will see even worse inflationary pressure than we have seen in the past 13 years.

- Renovation will permit us to continue to offer our school and CCD families a safe (a paramount concern), clean and exceptional learning environment for education and Catholic formation.
- Completing the renovation of our school facilities is a form of stewardship owed to generations of parishioners and school families who first laid our cornerstones and then built up our facilities over successive generations.
- Part of the project is to attend to parish maintenance and other needs that have surfaced in the twelve years since our Church renovation. This too is a form of stewardship to you and other donors over generations.


The goal of our 2021 Campaign is \$3,500,000 (\$2,750,000 in 2008 dollars).

Upon completion of this campus renewal plan, no other parish/school campaigns are anticipated for the foreseeable future.



First, the Texas law mandates that the physician determine whether the unborn child has a heartbeat, and if the child does, the physician is prohibited from performing or inducing an abortion.

Second, the act permits abortions for a medical emergency. The reason for the abortion must be noted in the pregnant woman's medical records and in the physician's notes.

Third, private citizens can bring a civil suit against the physician and anyone aiding or abetting abortions that are not medical emergencies. Citizens have six years from the date of the abortion to file suit. Defendants would be liable for damages of a minimum of \$10,000 for each abortion that violates the Texas Heartbeat Act.

Last but not least, the law "may not be construed to authorize the initiation of a cause of action against or the prosecution of a woman on whom an abortion is performed or induced or attempted to be performed or induced in violation of" the law.

In other words, the law does not impose any penalties on the woman who had an abortion.

While some view the law as sneaky and immoral because it allows private citizens to bring suit, I don't agree.

I believe this novel approach is reminiscent of the civil rights movement's tactics whereby private citizens acted to break the unjust Jim Crow system.

I believe the act is moral because none of its elements are evil.

Others assert that the Texas Heartbeat Act is unjust because rich women can secure abortions outside of Texas therefore only the poor, especially poor Black women, are "stuck" bearing children.

As Catholics, we do not believe abortion is a just action nor do we believe that being pregnant and giving birth are unjust actions.

We believe abortion violates the nature of women, that is, our natural power of becoming pregnant and giving birth. A law is not just if it runs counter to the nature of a thing, in this case, a woman. Abortion, then, also cannot be a right for those same reasons. We are not owed abortions because it is an act contrary to the nature of the female being. So, the Texas Heartbeat Act does not deprive women, rich or poor, of a natural right and as such it is not unjust.

Given my experience with women who have been coerced, manipulated and

abused because of abortion, I see the Texas Heartbeat Act as a means of justice for these women. This law centers a woman's abortion as grounds for civil action against her abusers. This is just. This is one step among many that can be taken to make abortion unthinkable in our culture.

Abortion is integral to upholding systems that oppress women. Imagine the law, businesses, educational institutions, the military, the economy, the very structure of our society not having abortion as a buttress. Imagine our world making way for women truly as we are and, in justice, giving us what we are due because of our womanhood. This is not just financial and material support but wholesale rethinking of our attitudes, practices and systems in our society and the church.

Gone is the idea of maleness as the model for human perfection. Rebuilding our world to embrace femaleness, our way of being, as the model of perfection for women would be just and right. Abortion thwarts this renewal.

In the latest episode of the "Gloria Purvis Podcast," Helen Alvaré and I discuss how society has made abortion integral to women's putative success, and yet the reason that many women choose abortion is because the system isn't working for them. They do not have the opportunity, the pay, the protection, the support systems needed. If we want to make abortion unthinkable, change the systems.
