THE SERVANT OF GOD ON ADVENT



Advent is in two weeks. It is a time of waiting, of expectation, of silence. Waiting for our Lord to be born. A pregnant woman is so happy, so content. She lives in such a garment of silence, and it is as though she were listening to hear the stir of life within her. One always hears the stirring compared to the rustling of a bird in the hand. But the intentness with which one awaits such stirring is like nothing so much as a blanket of silence. Be still. Did I hear something? Be still, and see that I am God.

Zundel, in *Our Lady of Wisdom*, has come beautiful passages on silence:

“Do we understand at last that action must be born in silence and abide in silence, and issue in silence, and that its power must be an emanation and the radiation of silence, since its sole aim is to make men capable of hearing the Word that silently reverberates in their souls?”

“All speech and reasoning, all eloquence and science, all methods and all psychologies, all slogans and suggestions are not worth a minute of silence in which the soul, completely open, yields itself to the embrace of the Spirit.

“In solitude Christ speaks to the heart, as a modest lover who embraces not His beloved before all the world.”

In silence we hear so much that is beautiful. The other day I saw a young mother who said, “The happiest hour of the day is that early morning hour when I lie and listen to the baby practicing sounds and words. She has such a gentle little voice.”

St. James says, “If any man offend not in word, the same is a perfect man.” And how much more women need this gift of silence. It is something to be prayed for. Our Lady certainly had it. How little of her there is in the Gospel, and yet all generations have called her blessed.

“Behold, how small a fire, how great a forest it kindles. And the tongue is a fire, the very world of iniquity. The tongue is

placed among our members, defiling the whole body, and setting on fire the course of our life, being itself set on fire by hell. For every kind of beast and bird and serpent and the rest is tamed and has been tamed by mankind. But the tongue no man can tame – it is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. “With it we bless God the Father; and with it we curse men, who have been made in God’s image and likeness.” [James 3:5-9]

To love with understanding and without understanding. To love blindly, and to folly. To see only what is lovable. To think only on these things. To see the best in everyone, their virtues rather than their faults. To see Christ in them.

Many people think an examination of conscience is a morbid affair. Péguy has some verses which Donald Gallagher read to me once in the St. Louis House of Hospitality. They were about examination of conscience. There is a place for it, he said, at the beginning of the Mass. “I have sinned in thought, word, and deed through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault.” But after you get done with it, don’t go on brooding about it; don’t keep thinking of it. You wipe your feet at the door of the church as you go in, and you do not keep contemplating your dirty feet.



Here is my examination at the beginning of Advent, at the beginning of a new year. Lack of charity, criticism of superiors, of neighbors, of friends and enemies. Idle talk, impatience, lack of self-control and mortification towards self, and of love towards others. Pride and presumption. (It is good to have visitors – one’s faults stand out in the company of others.) Self-will, desire not to be corrected, to have one’s own way. The desire in turn to correct others, impatience in thought and speech. Meanness about giving time to others and wasting it myself. Constant desire for comfort. The remedy is recollection and silence.

The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ’s second coming at the end of time and to the anniversary of Our Lord’s birth on Christmas. Our Advent readings call us to be alert and ready, not weighted down and distracted by the cares of this world (Lk 21:34-36). Like Lent, the liturgical color for Advent is purple since both are seasons that prepare us for great feast days. Advent also includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting, and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas. —USCCB

Cover Art: *Adoration of the Magi*, 1423, The Uffizi, Florence.

At the end of a long journey, the Magi arrive before the newly born Messiah, guided by a star, and they kneel before the Holy Family, offering their precious gifts. The three wise men are dressed in extraordinarily rich, fashionable garments and are accompanied by a multi-ethnic procession that also includes exotic animals, to emphasize their coming from the Far East. The painting was commissioned by banker and refined art lover, Palla Strozzi, for the family chapel in the sacristy of the Church of Santa Trinita in Florence. The panel, which is signed by the artist, and dated 1423, is Gentile's finest work and has been recognized the most important example of International Gothic painting in Italy. It reflects cultural and aesthetic elements that would flourish in the Renaissance.

2021 CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

INVESTING IN OUR MISSION

Q: “Why are we doing a campaign?”

A: To raise the funds needed to complete major improvements and additions to our facilities in order to update and enhance them so that we can be more effective in carrying out our mission. After over a decade of summer projects, we are now at the final step of a campus-wide renovation process. The Finance Council and I believe that this effort is best tackled as a single major project that will guarantee the shortest possible disruption of students and staff. Each of the items we hope to accomplish addresses a need that our parish and school leadership have identified after several years of study.

Q: “What about the 2021 Annual Diocesan Appeal?”

A: The “*Honoring the Past, Opening New Doors 2021*” Campaign will ask for your commitment/pledge over a two year period. The 2021 Annual Diocesan Appeal is included in the campaign.

Q: “Specifically what are we hoping to accomplish?”

A: The bulletin once again provides an overview of the various projects for the parish and school. In the overall scheme there are three major priorities on the school side:

- Creating a space for the 3rd Level of Catechesis of the Good Shepherd—our school’s religion program since 2015, based on a blend of Montessori and our Catholic faith. Children are exposed in a way that they are not only taught, but immersed in our faith. The central presentation, and name of this faith formation program, is the Good Shepherd. The parable of the Good Shepherd reveals what it means to be in a relationship, in communion, with God.
- Building security is critical. A significant part of the project is to reconfigure the entry to the Junior High building to provide several layers of security protecting our children. Every entry door of the school will have a double set of doors; triple for the main entry to the Elementary Building and Junior High.
- Our students are being readied for challenging scientific, technological and engineering challenges in subsequent education and employment. Creating a space in the junior high for a state of the art science/technology facility will help us maintain our leadership role in preparing our boys and girls for the challenges to come.

Q: “Why are we doing this now—is this the best time to be undertaking a major campaign?”

A: We are still in an historic Pandemic. By now, however, we have each reached the conclusion that life must go on, and that there will always be factors that can negatively impact the outcome of a campaign. Given the current rate of inflation for the cost of construction, the longer we put off doing these things, the more they are going to cost us.

Q: “In order to raise \$3,500,000 how much money



will each family need to give?”

A: We have received a number of leadership gifts by families and individuals who have been blessed financially. We are well launched, thanks be to God. But do note: No campaign divides the goal by the number of constituents, because there is no such thing as an average gift because there is no such thing as an average giver. We are all blessed differently when it comes to financial resources. Some in our parish and school have the financial capacity to make a large commitment and others may only be able to make a smaller commitment. Consider what *you* can give; then we will have more than enough funds to address this final push to address our facility needs and move confidently into the future.

Q: “Why do you consider this the *conclusion* of our facilities renewal?”



A: Upon completion of the renovation scheme outlined in these pages, our parish-wide renewal endeavor begun in 2008 will come to an end. We believe that we will have given the parish and school a generation of relief from major capital projects.

Q: “What will happen if we fail to meet our goal?”

A: If through your generosity we exceed our goal, funds will be divided and deposited in our parish and school endowments. Expansive facilities such as ours will definitely benefit from the support that endowments can offer. However, if we fail to meet goal, the project will need to be prioritized. Our three major priorities have already been introduced. Other goals will have to be addressed piecemeal and will consequently cost more in the long run.

“I really only love God as much as I love the person I love the least.” — Servant of God Dorothy Day, born November 8, 1897.

Throughout the centuries, Christians have been ruminating on the Person and Gospel of Jesus Christ and summarizing his teaching in their own words and in their own lives and service. They and we take as one of our points of departure the incisive words of St. John, the Beloved. “Amen, I say to you, whatever *you did* for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me... Amen, I say to you, what *you did not do* for one of these least ones, you did not do for me.”

St. John 1:4:19-20, captures the Commandment of Love in this way: “We love because he first loved us. If anyone says, ‘I love

God,’ but hates his brother, he is a liar; for whoever does not love a brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen. This is the commandment we have from him: whoever loves God must also love his brother.”

The picture above is an evocative rendition of this spirituality. To the left is Dorothy Day and to the right is a poor, disheveled man receiving various forms of comfort. The iconography portrays him as Christ among us, distressed and relying...on you and me. The Greek letters mean (above in the halo): “God” and to the right: “Jesus Christ”.

Commemorating a Century of Honor

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, 1921-2021



“Here Rests In Honored Glory An American Soldier Known But To God.” — Dedicated by Warren Harding, November 11, 1921.

For 100 years, the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier has served as the heart of Arlington National Cemetery. As a sacred memorial site and the grave of three unknown American service members, the Tomb connects visitors with the legacy of the United States armed forces throughout the nation’s history. It stands as a people’s memorial that inspires reflection on service, valor, sacrifice and mourning. Since November 11, 1921, the Tomb has provided a final resting place for one of America’s unidentified World War I service members, and Unknowns from later wars were added in 1958 and 1984.


The service members were chosen randomly from unmarked graves at U.S. cemeteries, with final selections made by highly decorated veterans. Each of the unknowns has been ceremonially awarded the Medal of Honor and other decorations. Guards were first posted at the tomb in 1926 because of the casualness that had invaded the space. Those who guard the tomb (members of the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment, better known as "The Old Guard") exist to "pay respects to the un-

known Soldiers," said Staff Sgt. Kevin Gilliam, the 1st Relief commander at the tomb.

"To me, (the tomb) symbolizes the ultimate sacrifice," he continued. "Every time I look out there, I look at three guys who gave up everything. They lost not just their lives, but their identities. And also, what their families are sacrificing too, not having the peace of mind" of ever knowing where their loved ones are buried, after having given their all in service.

During our duty, "we take 21 steps across the mat, turn and face D.C. for 21 seconds, turn back, face down the mat, change shoulders and do that process over and over again. Twenty-one alludes to the 21-gun salute, which is the highest military honor. So we give them that salute as many times as we can during the hour or half hour," Gilliam explained.

The sentinels stand watch over the three unknown Soldiers 365 days a year, through pouring rain, blizzard-like snow and scorching heat.

HISTORY

ST. MARY'S HIGH SCHOOL

St. Mary's School was opened as a grade school in 1884, adding high school classes at a later date. The first graduates of St. Mary's came in 1889, which became tradition every year thru 1928 when a new building was opened across the street from St. Mary's and changed its name to Trinity in honor of the name of the Catholic Church located near the former St. Mary's.

TRINITY HIGH SCHOOL

Trinity High School opened in 1928 when the parish administration of Holy Trinity saw the need to open a new facility due to public demand for Catholic higher education

CENTRAL CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL

Trinity High School's name was changed to Central Catholic in 1967 when the Catholic Diocese of Peoria requested that Epiphany Parish of Normal and St. Patrick's Parish of Merna join Trinity, St. Mary's, and Historical St. Patrick's parishes in Bloomington in governing and subsidizing Catholic high school education in Bloomington-Normal. Central Catholic provided a sound education with plenty of religious training. The facility at 712 N. Center St. was torn down in 2005 after Central Catholic moved into a spacious location at 1201 Airport Road along Bloomington's east side in the fall of 2003.

The Central Catholic Saints Boys Soccer Team won third place in the IHSA 1-A State Tournament with a 3-2 win over Timothy Christian on October 30. The game was decided in overtime on penalty kicks.
