Fr. Glenn's Pen

This Weekend the Sunday after Christmas we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family. I recall Saint John Paul II's beautiful document, *Familiaris Consortio*, On the Family! A remarkable quote, "All of humanity passes by way of the family! I believe it was Sr. Lucia, one of the Fatima visionaries who was told that the family will be under attack. That is certainly the case. A family in the minds of many is seen as a group that decides to be a family, but this is not the case. At the heart of the family is a community of persons who bound together by a covenant which often in turn brings children into the world. A man and a woman love for each other often generates new life! Pope Francis in *Amoris Latitia*, states: *The couple that loves and begets life is a true, living icon – not an idol like those of stone or gold prohibited by the Decalogue – capable of revealing God the Creator and Saviour.*

The other ties of family life can be forged through foster parenting. In that case people take on the legal obligation of being seen as a real family. St. Joseph, for example, is the Foster Father of Jesus. A real father of Jesus even though he had no genetic ties.

At the core of human desire is to be a real member of a family. So many broken homes exist in our world as the result of misunderstanding of the value of the other! The so called Sexual *Revolution* has arguably done incalculable harm. Sexual relations have seemingly been reduced to mere recreation and lost their noble and sacred character. So many people have been conditioned to try this partner or another for a time to see if a commitment is possible. Think about what such an outlook implies, "I want to see if you are good enough for me now! The future may give ME a better partner!" This attitude is tragic on so many levels. At the heart of the family life that God intends is pure selfless love! Unlike the animals the procreative act in humans is not just reproducing, but has many levels. Animals are in heat, but not so with the human person. The core of any family is never driven by sexual desire, but the desire to make oneself a total gift to the other as God has given Himself to us through Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Family epitomizes this ideal. Mary and Joseph were so open to God that they had been invited to be the mother and earthly father to Jesus. They said yes! We had just concluded a year to St. Joseph who is a man of few words in the Bible but was described as "a just man". A *zedek*, or sometimes rendered, *zadok*. The root is associate with Melki-(zedek), the King of Salem or can be seen the king of righteousness. This term associates Joseph with the Priestly and kingly rule. A Zedek was known as a highly educated person which accounts for his ability to protect the Holy Family as they fled into Egypt. It is likely "zedeks" would have known multiple languages. Fathers at the heart are to be protectors. Joseph is such a great model for this. Mary is the perfect mother who is profoundly sensitive to the needs of her children, namely, that would be us!

Pope Frances also recounts the common understanding that the family is to be the domestic church! The Church is often portrayed as an ark that carries us to heaven. May our families forge intentional disciples for Christ and our world.
