<u>Steve's Notes (1) on Scripture</u> **The "Marriage" of Wine**

"As a young man marries a virgin, your Builder shall marry you; and as a bridegroom rejoices in his bride so shall your God rejoice in you." -Isaiah 62:5

In reflecting on the story of the Wedding Feast at Cana, I have normally been tempted to think about, on a literal level, the large amount of water that Jesus makes into a large amount of wine — the best wine. But this story is rich in symbolic meaning far beyond the literal or historical. Why is it that the first "sign" Jesus performs is to make wine from water at a wedding feast? Why not a miracle of healing or raising from the dead?

What this story is really about is the marriage of divinity with humanity: in the person of Jesus, God is wedded to humanity, made one in an irrevocable bond. And water becoming wine? When the water, the symbol of humanity is infused with the power of God's creative love, it is transformed into wine. This action of Jesus evokes the story of creation: the spirit of God hovering over the waters, the formless void; and when God speaks his Word and the power of God penetrates the waters, the world and everything in it is created.

This is the story of the fulfillment of the promises of God: the initiation of the Kingdom, the New Covenant. It foretells the birth of the Church at Pentecost, the rebirth of all creation, of the Holy Spirit making all things new, filling all with the power of God's love, joy, peace — LIFE.

We are meant also to see that Jesus, the Bridegroom of the great wedding banquet — the Eucharist — is himself the Cup of our Salvation, the Wine of Peace. Just as Christ enters into the bread and wine and it becomes his Body and Blood, when we eat and drink it, we, too, are changed substantially, joined forever to him in an unbreakable bond of love. And so this love shall increase and multiply. Our cup shall "runneth over" until the whole world is re-born in love and peace.

...Water "marriaged" into wine. And not just any wine: the *best* wine.

Pope Francis: World Day of Peace

(Continued from last week)

In every age, peace is both a gift from on high and the fruit of a shared commitment. Indeed, we can speak of an "architecture" of peace, to which different institutions of society contribute, and an "art" of peace that directly involves each one of us. All can work together to build a more peaceful world, starting from the hearts of individuals and relationships in the family, then within society and with the environment, and all the way up to relationships between peoples and nations.

Here I wish to propose three paths for building a lasting peace. First, dialogue between generations as the basis for the realization of shared projects. Second, education as a factor of freedom, responsibility and development. Finally, labour as a means for the full realization of human dignity. These are three indispensable elements for "making possible the creation of a social covenant", without which every project of peace turns out to be insubstantial.

2. Dialogue between generations to build peace

In a world still gripped by the pandemic that has created untold problems, "some people attempt to flee from reality, taking refuge in their own little world; others react to it with destructive violence. Yet between selfish indifference and violent protest there is always another possible option: that of dialogue. Dialogue between generations".

All honest dialogue, in addition to a correct and positive exchange of views, demands basic trust between the participants. We need to learn how to regain this mutual trust. The current health crisis has increased our sense of isolation and a tendency to self-absorption. The loneliness of the elderly is matched in the young by a sense of helplessness and a lack of a shared vision about the future. The crisis has indeed been painful, but it has also helped to bring out the best in people. Indeed, during the pandemic we encountered generous examples of compassion, sharing and solidarity in every part of the world.

Dialogue entails listening to one another, sharing different views, coming to agreement and walking together. Promoting such dialogue between generations involves breaking up the hard and barren soil of conflict and indifference in order to sow the seeds of a lasting and shared peace.

Although technological and economic development has tended to create a divide between generations, our current crises show the urgent need for an intergenerational partnership. Young people need the wisdom and experience of the elderly, while those who are older need the support, affection, creativity and dynamism of the young.

In Sunday's Gospel, Jesus' performs his first miracle—turning water into wine at a wedding in Cana. We learn that Jesus is completely obedient to his mother, Mary. We are reminded to listen to her words to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you."

Jesus gathers us in joy. In the Gospel, Jesus trans-



forms the wedding feast at Cana. Without Jesus the bride and groom run out of wine. Their

celebration could have ended in an embarrassing way. But Jesus doesn't just change a little water into wine—he changes six huge jars of water into wine. This is a huge amount of wine—more than 120 gallons. This is a sign that Jesus has enough wine for people in every time. This sign tells us that Jesus comes to gather people together in love and joy. Jesus is the new and best wine who gives us joy and gathers all who wish into his new community. Let us think together about ways that we keep Christian community alive today in our world and, like Jesus, gather people together in love.

The Church is the bride of Christ. Notice that when people go up the aisle to receive Holy Communion, they are like a bride going up the aisle to marry her beloved.

Questions of the Week

How can you know what it is Jesus wants you to do?

When have you experienced the Holy Spirit poured out in you or your Christian community?

How has Jesus supplied your lack in time of need?

Think about your own sacramental journey.

How does Jesus gather with his followers and celebrate today?

Jesus, help us to be obedient, just like you were to your mother. Help us to do what you teach us. Amen. Pax.





SACRAMENTS

Baptisms \sim Please contact the Parish Office for registration information. Prior to baptism, parents are required to attend a baptism -preparation session. Parents may attend this before their child is born.

Penance ~ Saturdays at 1:00 p.m. at St. James and 2:30 p.m. at St. Jerome or by appointment. Communal services are celebrated during Advent and Lent.

Marriage ~ If you are considering marriage, a minimum of six months is required for preparation. A wedding date cannot be set until after the first meeting with the pastor. At that time, the diocesan and parish guidelines will be explained.

Anointing of the Sick ~ Parishioners who are seriously or critically ill, or having surgery, should contact the pastor for the celebration of the sacrament.

Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults ~ The R.C.I.A. is an ongoing formation process for adults who are interested in becoming a Catholic and would like to receive the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and First Eucharist. Call the Parish Office for additional information.
