There is a famous quote by Will Durant that I like a lot. He paraphrases an idea of the philosopher Aristotle saying, “We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, then, is not an act, but a habit”.

It may seem unchristian to pursue excellence, but many saints aspired to greatness and excellence, although not a worldly kind of excellence. Many saints aspired to be in total love with God and totally conformed to his will. If we want to be saints, then it is important to realize how incredibly crucial habits are. Habits enable us to pursue our goals with ease. When a habit is formed in our minds, then it requires much less motivation and energy. Think about the habit of brushing your teeth or taking a shower. Do those things really require us to muster up motivation? Do they tire us out at all? No, they do not. They are natural to us. In fact, because they are established habits, it is in a sense easier for us to do them than to not do them. That is the beautiful thing about habits.

Our lives can be improved by really focusing on cultivating good habits that we desire, and getting ready for bad habits that do not help us. However, it is important to realize that this does not simply apply to those who are trying to shed a couple extra pounds or become healthier. Habits also shape our spiritual lives. Imagine someone who has the habit of praying with the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John) for 10-15 minutes a day. Compared to someone who does not do that at all, it may not seem like much of a difference. However, imagine if each person lived this daily habit for

the rest of their life. In a year, the person who did have the habit of praying would have spent 60-90 hours in a year praying with the Gospels. The person who did not have the habit would have zero hours of prayer with the Gospels. Ten years later, the person with the habit of prayer would now have 600-900 hours of time spent in prayer.

The person who has the habit of praying with the Gospels 10-15 minutes a day will do so quite easily. Once done for a while, a prayerful reading of Scripture becomes something natural; it becomes part of one’s identity. When we are developing new spiritual habits, it really is ideal to find something to do daily. That way it can truly form into a habit. Here are some examples of spiritual habits we can form: 10 minutes of spiritual reading a day, 10-20 minutes of reading and praying with the Gospels, a rosary or even a decade of the rosary, praying a Divine Mercy Chaplet on a drive (it only takes about 7 minutes), praying before meals, having a 5-10 minute prayer routine when you wake up or before you go to bed, or going for a short walk and focus on gratitude towards God.

The important thing in forming a new habit is making it something concrete and specific. A bad example of a spiritual habit would be, “I want to be more holy. I want to pray more.” They are not bad aspirations, but they are too vague and too general. How do you want to become more holy? When do you want to pray? How long do you want to pray? What will you do in prayer? A better goal would be specific, concrete, and even tied to another daily habit. A good example of a spiritual habit would be, “For 10 minutes before lunch (or breakfast or dinner), I am going to read and reflect on one of the four Gospels.”

Habits are required by athletes to be great. Let us strive to be great saints and cultivate the habits that help us to become spiritually great!



PRE-PLANNING YOUR FUNERAL



It was a normal day by all accounts, but John just wasn't feeling himself. He was a little lightheaded and out of sorts. Later in

the afternoon, he experienced a sharp pain in his chest and arm. Quick thinking and action brought John to the emergency department with a diagnosis of a significant heart attack.

Surviving this ordeal, he found himself face to face with his cardiologist, having an honest conversation about things that needed to change. "I came close to death," John found himself thinking. Then came the remorse. He was a young man with a loving wife and children who were very close to facing life without him. John found himself with intense sorrow for living an unchecked and self-indulgent life that almost brought him to his demise. He wanted to change.

We all have our wake-up calls. We have experiences and encounters that force us to really think twice about choices we have made and directions we have taken. Often, we find ourselves looking at those we have hurt square in the eye and wallowing in our foolishness. We regrettably realize that we have allowed our needs to lure us into making some cruel mistakes. We impulsively say things and flippantly do things that reveal our unredeemed and unhealed self. It is a self we stumble over and try to tame but can't quite seem to master and control. Help!

We spin our wheels, naively thinking that we will somehow, perhaps through persistence, get ourselves unstuck. But, we don't. We just get out of the car, feeling very helpless, and ignorantly look at the mess we got ourselves into. Did we ever think to ask someone for help? Or, taken the advice of One who is wiser and avoid this route altogether? "Come after me," are words that Jesus says to all of us. In order to heed his invitation, we must leave our ego-self behind and follow.

When we really see and understand the freedom, peace, justice, and love he offers, we find ourselves with such sorrow in our hearts for how foolish and silly we have been. All the misguided choices and sinful actions come full view and we see how risky our random impassioned behaviors really have been. Repentance is beautiful. When done with a sincere and contrite heart, it directs us to the glory that can be ours, ignites us with the challenge of living a life in service of others and reminds us that all is well.©LP

From July to December 2020, we supported our Guatemala Sister Parish with \$3900, which provided them with one-fifth of their operating budget. Pretty remarkable, please continue to help support our Sister Parish each month.

SOCIAL JUSTICE NEWS

Flowing from the teaching of the Catholic Church | Last week the Illinois Legislature passed the Predatory Loan Prevention Act (SB 1792) that caps All consumer loans at or below 36% APR. This bill finally takes care of predatory car title and payday loans in Illinois that for so many years had interest rates above 250%. Payday and car title "loans" victimized tens of thousands of working families with high cost, long term debt every year. The bill was part of the Illinois Black Caucus omnibus economic package. One Springfield resident had a car title "loan" which was over 300% APR on a \$500 loan that resulted in a payback of over \$3,000. Over 60,000 working families every year fell victim to car title loans and over 200,000 to payday loans.

Using "People Power," the Illinois Peoples Action organization has fought against predatory lending since the year, 2000, with countless direct actions on loan shark storefronts in Peoria, Springfield, Decatur, Bloomington and Champaign. The Decatur Chapter of Illinois Peoples Action includes several OLOL/St. Thomas Social Justice Committee members who were active in lobbying their legislators in Springfield to pass the 36% Cap on all loans. They also protested at several payday lending and car title loan stores in Decatur; helped pass restrictive zoning laws and city council resolutions to limit the number of loan stores. It took 20 yrs. of work by Illinois Peoples Action and other organizations to get this accomplished. The results: Justice for many in the future.



Question: Do Catholics always need to receive communion in wafer form, or can it be different kinds of bread?

Answer:

In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the most common form for the eucharistic bread is the small white communion “wafer” that is a ubiquitous part of the Catholic Mass. The instructions of the Church have been very specific regarding the make-up of the bread used in the Mass: “The bread used in the celebration of the Most Holy Eucharistic Sacrifice must be unleavened, purely of wheat, and recently made ... it follows therefore that bread made from another substance, even if it is grain, or if it is mixed with another substance different from wheat to such an extent that it would not commonly be considered wheat bread, does not constitute valid matter for confecting the Sacrifice and the Eucharistic Sacrament” (see *Redemptionis Sacramentum* by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, no. 48).

The Church’s tradition of using a wheat-based bread is based on the bread that Jesus would have used at the Last Supper and is considered to be an essential part of the “matter” of the Sacrament of the Eucharist.

As we consider the question of whether a “wafer” — which is properly called a “host” — should be used, we also must keep in mind that in the Eastern Rites of the Catholic Church, leavened (i.e. “raised”) bread is more often used. And so, while the thin, white “wafer” is most commonly used in the Roman Rite of the Church, the full expression of the Catholic tradition does allow for a more substantial form of bread to be used, but the tradition of using a simple wheat bread with no other additions or additives is considered essential.©LP


