

### FROM THE PAROCHIAL VICAR'S DESK



### Looking to Easter and Beyond

Lent is a very important season. It is important that each year we take a more intentional effort at examining our spiritual life. However, the challenges or penitential practices of Lent are

not meant just to do something hard; they are meant to prepare us for what lies ahead.

Interestingly enough, we can lose sight of the big picture. Most people correctly group Lent and Easter together, as Easter happens right after the end of Lent. Sometimes we celebrate briefly, "Jesus is risen! Praise God! Jesus has conquered death!" Then, we have our Easter celebrations-we gather together, maybe hunt some Easter eggs, and finally eat some sweets and desserts that we gave up for Lent. Once the weekend or the Easter Octave is over, we go back to normal life. However, even Easter is not the final goal. Yes, Jesus conquered death and showed his love for us in an extraordinary way, but Jesus did not die only to show us an example of love or his power over death. Jesus became man, walked among us, suffered, died, rose from the dead, and ascended into heaven so he could give us his very Spirit, the Holy Spirit. The deeper fulfillment of everything Jesus does actually happens on Pentecost. Jesus wanted us to be filled with his very Life, the Love between the Father and Son. When we have the Holy Spirit we can experience true love, joy, and peace. We become temples of God. God's love is not something we have to muster up, but it is actually a gift; the Holy Spirit is the love of God poured into our hearts.

You might be thinking, "This all sounds great, but I think I am covered. I have been baptized, received Communion, and been confirmed. I have the Holy Spirit." However, if we look around, we don't always see those who have received their sacraments living like the early disciples did after they received the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. We have received the Holy Spirit in the sacraments, but we have to stir up the gift we have

received. The common analogy you may have heard is chocolate syrup being poured into milk. You have to stir the syrup in order for it to become chocolate milk. Many people have received the sacraments, but never "stirred up" the Holy Spirit.

How do we stir up the Holy Spirit that lives inside of us? That is the key question. Whenever we make more of an effort to pray, engage our faith, and share our faith, we are stirring up the Holy Spirit within us. However, many of us do try to pray, be engaged in our faith, and share our faith, but our experience is still far different from the early apostles and disciples and saints of history. The early Church exploded with new converts and believers, yet in our time we see our numbers dwindling slowly with each coming year. What is the answer to renewal in the Church? The answer to renewal in the beginning is the same answer now—more of the Holy Spirit.

One of the most powerful ways to stir up the Holy Spirit in our lives is by attending some form of a Life in the Spirit Seminar. The Life in the Spirit Seminar is not a silver bullet to fix all the problems in the Church, but it does provide an opportunity to learn more about the Holy Spirit, gather together with other believers, and provide an opportunity to pray for a deeper Baptism in the Holy Spirit. We can receive more of the Spirit anywhere, but the principal way we receive more is by coming together in faith and vulnerability, praying for more of the Holy Spirit. I think the single most important thing we can do to bring life and renewal to the Church is for all of us to be baptized in the Spirit. Baptism in the Spirit is not a new sacrament. It is a deeper outpouring of the Holy Spirit and a stirring up of the Spirit we have already received in the sacraments. I cannot fathom where I would be as a believer (and priest!) without the grace of Baptism in the Spirit. I encourage you to attend our upcoming Life in the Spirit seminar starting Thursday, April 21st at 7pm. More info is here in the bulletin! There is also the Upper Cenacle Prayer Group which meets a couple Tuesdays a month as well!

### LITURGICAL LIFE



"he suffered death and was buried."

Nihilism is defined by Merriam Webster as "a viewpoint that traditional values and beliefs are unfounded and that existence is senseless and useless." For a nihilist, the majority, if not all, of this

life lacks real purpose. One of the primary reasons people try to hold this worldview is the reality of death. Someone could ask, "What is the point of growing in virtue, building a civilized world, or even being good, if at any point I could die and lose it all?" Questions like these, if unanswered, can drive people mad and lead them to see the world through the lens of nihilism.

This threatening worldview should not enter into the experience of a Christian. For many believers, however, different forms of it find hold in their hearts and minds. Why is this? There are many reasons, to be sure, but one is that it can be a temptation to lose sight of what Jesus did on earth, and the significance of his death. Not only do we lose sight intellectually of what Jesus did for us, and the meaning of his life and death, but in small ways we cease to live as though his death had meaning for us.

St. Athanasius, an early Father of the Church, wrote of Christ's defeat of death, and the hope it brings to the Christian. He states, "For of old, before the divine sojourn of the Saviour took place, even to the saints death was terrible, and all wept for the dead as though they perished. But now that the Saviour has raised His body, death is no longer terrible; for all who believe in Christ tread [death] under as nought, and choose rather to die than to deny their faith in Christ. For they verily know that when they die they are not destroyed, but actually [begin to] live, and become incorruptible through the Resurrection" (On the Incarnation 27.2).

Death will not separate us from the love of Christ (Romans 8). By his death, Jesus has redeemed the world. For this reason, we proudly profess faith in his death, and unite every suffering, or seemingly meaningless part of our lives, to his death, firmly believing that he will raise us up on the last day. He will turn our sorrow to joy.



#### **5th Sunday of Lent**

We love to make examples out of those who have erred and done wrong. Publicly

punishing others serves as a means of demonstrating the consequences for what is deemed inappropriate or wrongful behavior. While this may appear an effective way of achieving conformity to established rules, it runs the real risk of distorting motivation. Obviously, we want people to do what is right and pursue healthy, virtuous behaviors and ideals. But is fear of punishment ever the best motivation for avoiding one action in favor of another?

Doing something out of fear is never healthy. Focusing exclusively on our behavior and what others expect or think, leads to living life with a self-focused superficiality. We become more concerned about protecting ourselves from something negative and unpleasant, than investing ourselves in the freedom, wonder and awe of being human! We can still find our way to the unacceptable or inappropriate behavior as long as we do not get caught! Being a whole, focused, and God-centered human being requires more. It demands an investment of the heart. Virtuous, moral, and mature lifestyles reflective of the Gospel necessitate love.

When we experience and recognize love, God's unconditional love, in the depth of our soul, we fall in love with what we have found. We then find ourselves leaving destructive and sinful actions behind in search of something more holy, dignified, true, integral, and loving. This is really "mercy realized." God's tremendous, loving, eternal forgiveness and willingness to bring us back to something more real and tender is transformational.

The respect for myself that I receive from God is so life changing that it causes me to run quickly away from anything sinful and self-destructive to things that are whole and holy.

There are many people who want nothing more than to judge or criticize us. What would actually stoning the woman caught in adultery really accomplish? Nothing more than the inflation of the already self-righteous egos of a few men who think they have power. They have no power because they are sinners too, just like everyone else. What all of us have is the humble ability to express sorrow for pursuing destructive thoughts and actions and receive the power of God's mercy. Then, Jesus' request to "go and sin no more" will be one we proudly heed and follow.

### Flowing from the teaching of the Catholic Church

Last week I wrote about Melissa Lucio of Texas who is scheduled to be executed on April 27, 2022 for a crime she did not commit. She was convicted and sentenced to be executed for killing her two year old daughter who accidentally fell down steps in her home and died. That means that all who are working to stop her execution have only 30 days to share Melissa's story, take action, and push Gov. Greg Abbott and the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles to stop her execution. The Death Penalty Action members have been in Texas for weeks protesting the execution and promoting Melissa Lucio's innocence.

Melissa Lucio was convicted of murder in 2008 for the death of her 2 yr. old daughter, Mariah, which she and her family claim was instead a tragic accident. Her defense team has filed motions to withdraw Melissa's execution date based on claims of innocence as well as other grounds, including the prosecution's use of a false confession made the night her daughter died. After hours of maintaining her innocence in the face of aggressive and leading questioning, she finally acquiesced and said, "I'm responsible for it." Her statement was said to have been made under duress. The state prosecutors provided no physical evidence, eyewitnesses or prior history of violence. The Child Protective Services records show that Melissa was not violent, but struggling to provide for her children.

What can we do? Pray for justice for Melissa that her execution be withdrawn; watch the documentary -"The State of Texas vs. Melissa" on Hulu or go to the "Death Penalty Action" website to view it and sign the petition there to stop Melissa Lucio's execution. Thank you for taking action.

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
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
