

From The Pastor's Desk

Ordination Season

Spring is a busy time of year. Once the weather warms up we all come out of our houses and get outside to enjoy the first nice weather of the year. I never see so many people outside as I do on those first nice days! Spring is also a big season for celebrations. There are baptisms, confirmations and gradua-

tions to attend. Spring used to be the season for weddings but in recent years that seems to have switched to fall (or at least it splits it with fall now; probably the more stable weather in fall has prompted this change). Spring is also the season for ordinations. Dioceses throughout the country will be celebrating ordinations to the diaconate and priesthood in the next two months.

On Saturday, April 23, the Archdiocese of Milwaukee celebrated the Ordination of five men to the Transitional Diaconate. There are two types of deacons, permanent and transitional. Permanent deacons are ordained to the diaconate with the understanding that they will remain deacons. They can be married as long as they are married before receiving the Sacrament of Holy Orders. They are unable to remarry after the death of their spouse. Deacons Ted and Jim are permanent deacons, and we thank them for their presence in our community!

Transitional Deacons are those who are ordained deacons with the understanding that they will be ordained priests soon (usually 6 months to a year after being ordained deacons). The five men ordained this year will be ordained to the Presbyterate (priesthood) next spring.

All priests and bishops are first ordained deacons, no exceptions. The diaconate was created in the early Church (it's in Acts of the Apostles) because the disciples needed their help in serving the poor of the Church. To this day, the diaconate serves the bishops and aids them in their ministry. This includes parish ministry, and I am very grateful to have deacons in our parish.

Please pray for the five men ordained to the diaconate for this archdiocese this year, their names are: Rvan Ackmann, Kenneth Anvanwu, Michael Courchaine, Joseph Heit and Kevin Tanel. Please also pray for the 5 deacons to be ordained priests for the archdiocese on May 21. Their names are: Deacon Matthew Ferch, Deacon Kevin Harmon, Deacon Matthew Kirk, Deacon Tonny Kizza, Deacon Ariel Orozco, and Deacon Pedro Ruiz.

*******Please note that Fr. Patrick and myself (along with most of the priests of the Archdiocese) will be away from the parish this Monday, Tuesday, and most of Wednesday attending the Spring Assembly of Priests. The first one we have had in three years. The morning Mass on Wednesday, May 4, will be at 7:00 a.m. instead of an 8:00 a.m. school Mass.*******




Saint Of The Week

St. Rose Venerini | May 7

The story of St. Rose of Venerini (February 9, 1656 – May 7, 1728) is one of having faith in God and his calling in your life. Born in Italy in 1656, she was the daughter of a doctor. Following the death of her fiancé, she entered a convent in the hopes of becoming a nun, but soon returned home to care for her mother after the death of her father. In an effort to keep up her spiritual side, St. Rose invited women of the neighborhood to recite the rosary in her home, and together they formed a sodality.

Unsure of where her life was headed, she sought the spiritual guidance of a Jesuit priest. After much contemplation, she admitted to feeling called to be a teacher in the world, rather than a nun in a convent. Eventually, she moved ahead and opened a free school for girls in 1685. Eventually, she was invited to oversee the training of teachers and the administration of schools in the Diocese of Montefiascone, which then led to being called upon to organize schools in many parts of Italy, including Rome.

Saint Rose died in Rome in 1728, amid a number of miracles that many credit to her. The group of women she first prayed with in her home eventually became known as the Venerini Sisters, found in the United States and working among Italian immigrants. Saint Rose was beatified in 1952, and canonized in 2006.

What is a Synod?



A Synod is a prayerful gathering that helps the Church walk forward in the same direction. Synods were common in the first centuries of Christianity, giving bishops opportunities to meet and discuss issues of importance for the life of the early Church.

In 1965, Pope Paul VI instituted the Synod of Bishops on the universal level of the Church, continuing the fraternal exchange that happened at the Second Vatican Council, 1962 - 1965. Ever since, synods have been held every two to three years, drawing together bishops from across the globe, along with experts and other delegates, to talk about issues such as the Eucharist, the family, the New Evangelization, and young people. Our 2023 focus is *"communion, participation, and mission."*

What is happening in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee?

Here in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, we have a rich tradition of gathering, listening and consulting. In 2014, Archbishop Listecki held an archdiocesan synod with over 15,000 participants. In 2022, we began a process of consultation for the 2021-2023 International Synod on Synodality, with opportunities to submit feedback by June 1.

In August, after our local consultation process is finished, feedback will be compiled and a report written and submitted to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. The USCCB will then compile a synthesis of responses, and submit it to the Vatican's General Secretariat of the Synod of Bishops.

What happens at a Synod?

Synod gatherings always begin with a prayer to the Holy Spirit, begging for guidance. Synods involve a process of listening, discussing and consultation. In 2023, when the Synod of Bishops gathers, they will vote on a final document. Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, may then write his own text, called an *"apostolic exhortation,"* to open up and shed new light on what was discussed at the Synod; to speak to the Church and to the world.

May our prayer be: "O Holy Spirit, with You alone to guide us, make Yourself at home in our hearts; teach us the way we must go and how we are to pursue it..." (--Prayer for the Synod on Synodality)
