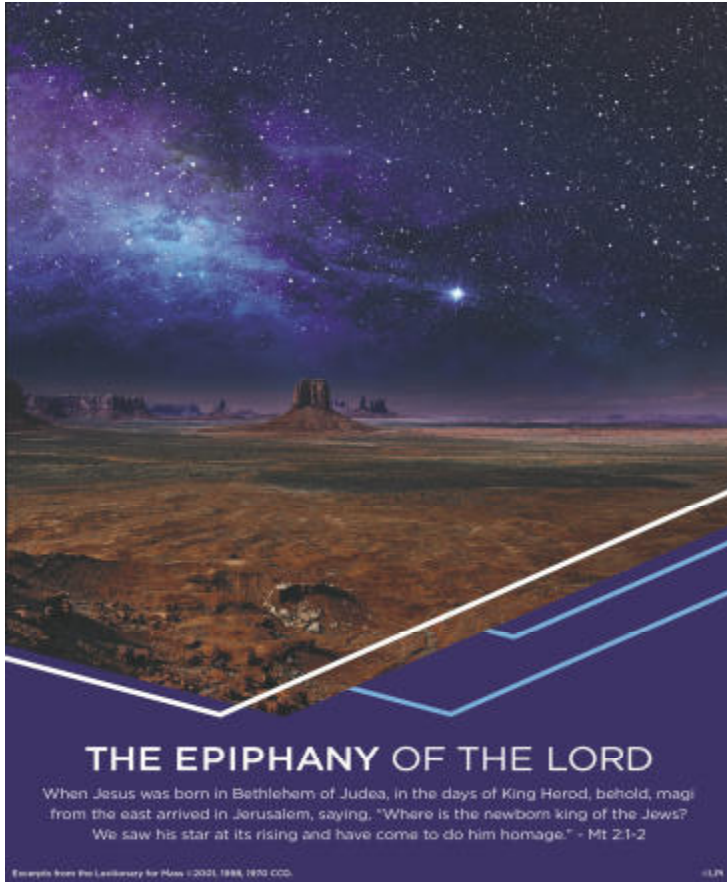

As we continue our journey into the sacred season of Christmas, I hope and pray that you are continuing to rejoice in the Lord's Birth and to ponder the mystery of the Incarnation of God. I urge you, as I did this past weekend, to continue celebrating Christmas through the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, January 10th. Though the secular world around us has largely already thrown out the Christmas decorations, we are Catholics and we should live differently than those around us, always giving witness to the tremendous mystery of Love made flesh. Such a mystery is simply too great to celebrate for only one day; this is why the Church continues to rejoice in Christmas.

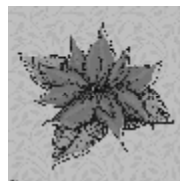
To help you continue to celebrate Christmas, you will find copies of Scott Hahn's book, *Joy to the World: How Christ's Coming Changed Everything (And Still Does)* available at the entrances to the church. If you have not yet picked one up, you are welcome to do so. If you want to take a few copies to give to family, friends, neighbors, coworkers, or even strangers, there are plenty of copies remaining for you to do so. This could be one simple way to continue celebrating Christmas, the continuous giving of gifts.

We celebrate this weekend the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, the mystery of the visit of the Magi from the East to the Christ Child. On this day, it is customary to bless our homes in honor of the Magi – Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar – with prayer, chalk, and holy water. Epiphany blessing kits were made available to you last year, and I hope to have them available to you again this year. I have bottles for the holy water and plenty of chalk, and hope they will arrive in time. You are welcome to take an Epiphany kit home with you. The kits include the text of the short prayer service and blessing, a bottle of holy water, and a piece of chalk.

The memory of Christmas Eve and of Christmas Day is still within my heart. I am deeply grateful to all those who helped to decorate our church and make it more beautiful for the Child of Bethlehem. I am also most appreciative for the many assurances of prayers and the many good wishes so many of you extended to me this Christmas. Please know that you are all very much in my prayers during these holy days.

As this weekend we celebrate the 9th and 10th day of Christmas, I wish you and yours a very merry and blessed Christmas!

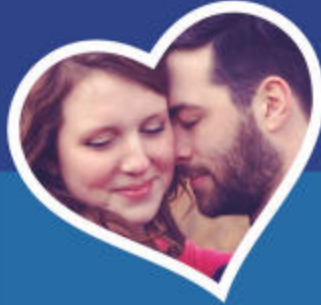
