Anointing of the Sick and Communion to the homebound can be arranged by contacting our Parish Office.


Marriage ceremonies are scheduled only after the required preparation process has begun. Please contact our priest at least six (6) months prior to your desired wedding date to begin the process.

Sunday Stewardship Reflection Epiphany of the Lord

As our celebration of Christmas continues, today we observe the great feast of The Epiphany of the Lord. The word "epiphany" comes from Greek and means manifestation or appearance. The stewardship way of life is one in which we live in grateful response to God's countless manifestations in our lives.

Our Gospel passage, from Matthew, has much to teach us about stewardship, through the actions of the magi.

As good stewards, the magi were watching for manifestations of God's presence in their lives. "We have seen the star at its rising," they say. Good stewards are keenly aware of the "star" of God's presence and His gifts in their lives. It is this awareness that fills them with gratitude and the desire to both worship God and share His gifts with others.

The magi, upon seeing the manifestation of God's presence in their lives, "were overjoyed." Good stewards, who live with the awareness of God's presence and gifts to them, simply can't help but be filled with joy. Not necessarily the fleeting and superficial kind of joy the world promises through wealth or power, but rather the deep, unalterable joy only God can give.

Finally, the magi were so filled with awe upon encountering the newborn Jesus, they prostrated themselves before him and "opened their treasures and offered him gifts." This is precisely why good stewards generously share their material gifts — as a loving act of worship to an extravagantly loving God.

Let us rejoice in God's manifestations in our lives and be watchful for the new ways He is calling us to share ourselves and our gifts in gratitude to our King in the year ahead.

Epiphany of the Lord – Blessing of Homes

The Christmas season, and especially today's feast of the Epiphany, is a traditional time when homes may be blessed. And the "Book of Blessings" provides a beautiful prayer that may be recited by a lay minister or the head of each household. Consider reading the Gospel of Luke, Chapter 19, verses 1-9 together with your family, before reciting the following prayer of blessing:

"Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill them with the light of Christ, that their concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Lord."

And as circumstances suggest, the minister in silence may sprinkle those present and the home with holy water. During the sprinkling the minister may say:

"Let this water call to mind our baptism in Christ, who by his death and resurrection has redeemed us."

Finally, while I'm sure many of you are ready to take down the Christmas trees and may have already put away your Christmas ornaments, we still have another week of the Christmas season (until the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord on Sunday, January 9, 2022)!

I invite you to leave out at least one piece of your nativity scene, even throughout Ordinary Time, as a visible reminder that God is with us (Cf. Matthew 1:23).

Ask the Apologist

Dear Apologist, my nephew is saying the story of Jesus' birth must be mythical because the movement of the magi's star is impossible. What can I say?

The commonly received story of the Magi goes like this: "Three wise-men saw a new star rise in the sky and concluded a king had been born. They followed the star to Jerusalem and talked to the Jewish leaders. Then they followed the star again to Bethlehem and found a newborn Jesus in a manger outside an inn." People who are familiar with astronomy often have difficulty with this story because it describes movements which are impossible for a star. All stars (except those at the poles) travel across the sky during the night like the sun does during the day. One could not follow a star hanging stationary in the sky moving westward. This is made even more puzzling if they followed the star again going south.

Fortunately, that commonly received story is not at all accurate to Matthew's nativity account. What the text actually says is an unknown number of Magi saw the star and determined that it represented a new king of the Jews. They travelled to Jerusalem because that's where you'd expect to find a Jewish king. Then the Magi talked to the Jewish elders, who instructed them to go south to Bethlehem. The only time they used the star to navigate was when they were approaching Bethlehem. It says they were overjoyed to see the star hanging over the town as they approached, and it led them to the house of the toddler Jesus. [Matt 2:9-11]

Thus, you can tell your nephew the only thing the New Testament asks you to believe about the star is that some extraordinary celestial body passed over Bethlehem around 1BC.

20+C+M+B+22

Here is another idea of how you can celebrate the Epiphany at home with your families.

First, did you notice the initials above? There is a wonderful custom to inscribe the initials C (Casper), M (Melchior), and B (Balthazar) above your front door, or on the back of the door, with blessed chalk. The initials are enclosed by the year and connected by crosses (e.g., 20+C+M+B+22). In addition to representing the names of the Magi, these letters also represent the Latin phrase Christus mansionem benedicat (Christ bless this house).

The parish office has some blessed chalk, but we can also have one of the priests bless any chalk that you may have at home that you wish to use.
