Ask the Apologist

Dear Apologist, do children still need Godparents now that people are living longer?

It is commonly believed that the role of the Godparent is limited to raising the godchild in the faith should the parents die before the child reaches adulthood. As a consequence, people suppose that in our time of modern medicine and longer lifespans, the role becomes mostly perfunctory. This understanding, however, has the matter in reverse. Regarding the role of Godparents, the Code of Canon Law says they "together with the parents present an infant for baptism. A sponsor also helps the baptized person to lead a Christian life in keeping with baptism and to fulfill faithfully the obligations inherent in it" [CCL 872]. This echoed in the Baptismal liturgy, in which the Godparents make a solemn promise to assist the parents in training the child in the faith.

Thus, the role of a Catholic Godparent is to consistently teach the Catholic faith to a child by means of instruction and lived example throughout his or her whole life - regardless of whether the parents are living or dead. The expectation is this will inculcate a bond which is so strong that the Godparents become the natural choice for receiving the child into their care should the parents pass away. That is why a Godparent is required by Canon Law to be near adulthood and faithfully practicing the Catholic religion. [CCL 874

Just as a person should not enter into a marriage vow frivolously, no one should become a Godparent unless he or she is ready for the lifelong task ahead. If you are a Godparent, you might ask yourself what you have done over the past week, month, or year to fulfill the promises you made to the child, to the parents, to the Church, and to God.

How Can I Receive Holy Communion Better? Not infrequently, parishioners bring me parish bulletins from churches they visit, and occasionally an article or two jump out at me. Sometimes I share their ideas with our staff, other times I like to share other pastors' thoughts with our parishioners. The following advice is from Fr. Jonathan Meyer, the pastor of All Saints Parish, in Guilford, IN (Part 1 of 2).

"Approach with a clean soul – No one should receive Holy Communion with a mortal sin on their soul. Having a clean soul is important. Going to confession on a regular basis should go hand-in-hand with a regular reception of Holy Communion.

Approach with an empty stomach – Please recall that we are asked to fast one hour prior to reception of Holy Communion; if you have not, then do not receive (medication and food required to be eaten to take medication does not interfere).

Approach with an empty mouth – Gum, which should not be chewed during Mass at all, should NEVER be in your mouth as you approach Holy Communion. It should also not be stuck under the pew.

Approach with clean hands – If you are not receiving Communion on the tongue, please look at your hands and be sure they are prepared to have the Lord of all Creation placed upon them. If they are not clean, out of respect for our Lord, please receive on the tongue.

Approach with a reverent spirit - Walk up the aisle thinking about WHO you are preparing to receive – Jesus Christ our Lord and God. Bow to our Lord – after the person in front of you receives Holy Communion, please bow reverently. It would be most appropriate to fall completely down on the ground in worship; however, to speed up the process and aid the elderly, a nice bow is all that is required. Realize you are bowing to our Lord Jesus Christ – He is here!"

I look forward to sharing more of Fr. Jonathan's recommendations next week.
