Drawing Closer to Jesus Transform Us

In our profession of faith, we say that Jesus is true Man and true God. Last Sunday's gospel told how, as a human, he was tempted by the devil for forty days. In today's gospel, his divinity is shown through the transfiguration. Our Lord's transfiguration strengthens us in our quest for union with God. Today we need to ask ourselves: in which area of our lives do we need to be transformed?

In his book, "The Ascent of Mount Carmel," St. John of the Cross compares our desire for union with God to the rays of sunlight shining upon a smudgy window. The smudges prevent the sun from illuminating the window completely. It would be different if the window were cleaned and polished; then the sunlight would give the window clarity and transparency. We can apply this image to our desire for union with God. For, just as our Lord was transfigured, he invites us to deal with those attitudes, events and situations that prevent the Lord's light from shining in and through us. Recall the gospel from Ash Wednesday about going into our inner room to converse with God about what we want to change, and what we want to become.

Due to our human nature, we fall again and again even after promising God that we are going to change. Sometimes we think we have overcome our weaknesses or our sinful ways, and other times we find ourselves back in the same mess. Our faith is often like a roller coaster; it has ups and downs, mountains and valleys.

In other words, there are times when our faith burns bright, and other times when it flickers and nearly dies out. In today's gospel, the faith of Peter, James and John is bright and strong. But in a short time, their faith will flicker and almost fail when Jesus takes them to the garden of Gethsemane. When "a large crowd armed with swords and clubs" came looking for Jesus, the three disciples, whose faith was so strong in today's gospel, panicked and ran for their lives. Worse yet, Peter later denied he knew Jesus.

My brothers and sisters, we are not exceptions; we are also tested the same way the prophets and even Abraham were tested. This is where we come to realize our need to clean the smudges off the windows of our faith as our Lord sends rays of light into our conscious awareness, moving us toward repentance. Therefore, we should never lose hope or be discouraged from becoming what God wants us to be.

Reflections on this Sunday's Readings

The reading this week always challenges me. I've struggled with the story of Abraham and Isaac since I was a little boy. Of course, we know how the story ends. God stops the sacrifice of Isaac, but until that moment, it is very tense. As a father, I struggle even more with this story. I struggle with the idea of God asking someone to sacrifice their own child. Of course, this is not the whole story. When I take a step back and look at the big picture, I realize that God never intended to harm Isaac, but rather to engage Abraham in a level of commitment that was deep and meaningful. God was trying to show Abraham that the covenant they had together was stronger than anything, and Abraham's commitment was unwavering.

In light of this, we now turn to the gospel looking at Jesus' transfiguration. It is just as intense as the Abraham and Isaac story. The transfiguration gives us a peak behind the curtain. It gives us insight into the true nature God. The transfiguration literally shows Jesus radiant with light. In his transfiguration, we see an anticipation of the glory of Jesus' Resurrection. We as the reader are awe-struck by the powerful image. Both of these readings leave us shaken with a strong impression of the presence and power of God.

Parish Use of Federal Funds

PPP funds were used to pay 2.5 month of our employees' compensation while they were not working. Our employees are not eligible for State Unemployment because of our church status. We pay into a different church program that would not have paid furloughed or laid-off employees. We wanted to be sure to support our employees during this time, and PPP allowed us to do that. We continued to pay our part-time and full-time employees who worked in the daycare program, school and parish employees. In addition, the daycare program received a subsidy of \$45,000 to keep paying childcare workers during the months of April, May and June. The daycare program pre-COVID, had been more than self-sufficient and provided a needed service to the community. The PPP 1 and PPP 2 loans have helped fund the program during the months after the daycare returned to operations in August. We hope that when this pandemic is over, the program will again be vibrant.
