

# It all Started with a promise

Everyone seems to love Christmas music (except before Thanksgiving!). The popular songs can make us feel warm and cheerful, and the religious ones stir the soul and move the heart, especially as they illustrate the real beauty of the Incarnation and the birth of Jesus Christ.

It saddens me a bit, though, that the music and heavenly harmonies often seems to evaporate as quickly as one day after, before the egg nog has even turned – except in the Church, where the liturgical calendar distinguishes between the Advent and Christmas season. That's because the glorious wonder of the Incarnation ripples through time into eternity. The first lines of the Gloria we sing on Sundays at Mass echoes the multitude of angels singing above Bethlehem on that winter's night: "Glory to God in the highest, on earth peace to people of good will" (Luke 2:14). The power of Christmas lasts forever because the Word became flesh and has made His dwelling amongst us (Jn 1:14), and in the person of Jesus, Heaven and earth are united. After the Fall in the Garden of Eden, the heavenly paradise and humanity were separated. When the Archangel Gabriel came to the Virgin Mary and she said yes to God's plan, it began the fulfilment of His divine plan and promise. And those do not end on December 26<sup>th</sup>.

When music ceases and decorations are taken down so quickly, it gives the impression that the birth of Jesus was merely a moment in time – a special moment, yes, but still just a singular event. Nothing could be further from the truth. When Jesus is born all of creation is forever changed. Going forward, humanity will ever more have direct access to the grace of God through the Sacraments that Jesus instituted for the Church. But looking backwards in time, Jesus Christ is the fulfilment of God's promise. And with all of humanity afflicted by sin and death, the people of God needed a savior, because no human person could by themselves undo the spiritual damage inflicted upon creation.

Roughly 2,000 years before the first Christmas, God chose Abram – who later became known as Abraham – to be the father and patriarch of a great nation, that his descendants would number as the stars. Thus began the nation of Israel. And from that nation's royal lineage, "a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse" (Isaiah 11:1). This is a prophecy about the lineage that leads to Jesus – sometimes depicted in what is called a Jesse Tree... which adorns the cover of this bulletin.

Jesus fulfills God's promise to create from His chosen people a great nation with many descendants. Far greater still, in Christ all of humanity is invited to gather around the newborn King of Kings, and in the cave of the Nativity, discover the reunification of Heaven and earth, and therefore realize that all peoples and nations are meant to become brothers and sisters – one family – because of the providential promise and plan of the God of Abraham.


### Sacraments at St. Alphonsus


# Gospel Meditation

"He so loved us that for our sake He was made man in time, through Whom all times were made; was in the world less in years than His servants, though older than the world itself in His eternity; was made man, Who made man; was created of a mother, whom He created; was carried by hands which He formed; nursed at the breasts which He had filled; cried in the manger in wordless infancy, He the Word without Whom all human eloquence is mute (St. Augustine, Sermon 188)." The miracle of what happens at Christmas is truly an awesome mystery. Revealed in the silent ordinariness of life is God's intimate love for humanity and all that he made. The Word, existing for all time, comes and dwells among us. God kisses us. We can seek and soar with playful delight as a joy never known before fills our heart.

Joy is best expressed through dance. There is just something truly wonderful about the self-abandon a beautiful melodic dance reveals. If we are able to let go and really be free, it celebrates life in a way few other experiences really can. With the birth of Jesus Christ, God takes the Divine Dance to a deeper and more tangible level. We can now not only see what we believe but believe what we see! This most perfect dance is a call to beauty, innocence, truth, purpose, hope, faith, and love. Today we know, beyond doubt, that we are a necessary part of God's beautifully choreographed masterpiece of life and not just a random happening without real intent or purpose. 
#### **Big Questions and Catholic Scientists**

### Stewardship: Sharing in Parish Ministry

Conversations around stewardship can some- times be unpleasant or uncomfortable—especially financial stewardship. But what if we thought about financial stewardship differently? Instead, what if we viewed financial stewardship as a way that we par- ticipate with the vision and mission Jesus calls his Church to? This way of thinking about stewardship is the understanding that was instilled – frequently – in my upbringing as an Evangelical Christian.

Some parishioners may be surprised to learn that I am a convert to the Catholic Church. I began seminary studies at an Evangelical Christian seminary, but gradually came to recognize the historical and theological truth present in Catholicism. I entered full communion with the Catholic Church nearly five years ago. At the time I was in my final year of Divinity School, working part-time as a Protestant chaplain at a major university, and thinking about the future of ministry, vocation, and my own contributions to Christ's Church. A year and a half after being received into the Church I started working here, at St. Alphonsus, as a lay minister. Almost immediately I was struck by the vibrancy of our community, its many ministries and the volunteers that make them possible. However, at the same time I noticed the small staff for a parish of our size, the aging buildings, and the shoe-string operating and ministry budget.


Growing up in the evangelical world, a vibrant church of our size could financially support dedicated and fulltime ministers and staff for its various demographic needs (adult, young adult/college, youth, and children), funds for building upgrades and repairs, and money dedicated for various ministries. Evangelical communities roughly our size have double, if not triple, what we bring in for our weekly offertory collections. This is not because Evangelicals are somehow more generous than Catholics. Instead, in many Evangelical communities there is an emphasis placed on offertory as a form of ministry, as a way to participate in Jesus' mission here on earth, and as a way to honor God's benevolence to us by offering back at least 10% of what God has provided.

Some research suggests that of the 77% of people that contribute to evangelical churches, they contribute between 10-20% of their gross annual income. This research also indicates that Evangelicals tend to give a yearly average of \$1,705, while Catholics a yearly average of \$984. For our parish, that means that if every registered member (2,267 parishioners) gave, even at a minimum, \$20 a week, St. Alphonsus would close that denominational gap. More importantly, it would mean that we would have the necessary finances to support an appropriately sized staff to minister to our community, the needed funding for building repairs/upgrades, and the finances to cover most ministry costs.

This comparison is not meant to be critical – rather, it is an invitation to join us in ministry. To join us in furthering the Kingdom of God in the Lakeview neighborhood, in Chicago, and in the world!
