

Inspiration for the Week Pastoral Leadership— Like a Game of Chess



Day to day and week to week duties are important, especially in relation to the strategic vision of the church in the present quarter, over the year, and in the years to come. Some lessons can be learned from this (what is thought to be) 6th-century game. *"The game of chess is like a sword fight; you must think first before you move"* {Your friendly bulletin editor couldn't resist the in-joke... :) }

Although this article is geared towards pastoral leaders in the church, the ideas can also be utilized in many professional fields.

So let's call this strategy CHECKMATE:

Creativity: we need to come up with new plans, and without being creative, we cannot make new plans. *Hunt for Patterns*: when we can take notice of patterns, we are better equipped to predict the next best move and how to deal with them.

Embrace opportunities: if we are given any small or big opportunity, we should not let it pass by. We must pray about it, measure it, weigh the benefits, and if it's decided to proceed then stick with it.

Commitment: There are more times than not in our lives when we need to make quick decisions. We are able to do this when we are committed to the cause- the goal is always in mind so whether the decision needs to be a quick one or not, we can proceed with confidence.

Knowledge: how we translate larger visions into concrete details so that the team can evaluate whether the vision, timeframe, and methods are doable and affordable is key.

Moldability: we may need to change our plans. Things do not always go according to our plan and people surrounding us are unpredictable. Remaining flexible is an invaluable life lesson. The less rigid we are, the better we are able to handle situations thrown our way.

Abandon: Without sacrifice, we may never get what we truly want or what we really need. Sacrifice is a necessary part of life, and we see it exemplified throughout the Bible, so it shouldn't be a surprise when it's a decision that we must make for the betterment of the church.

Thinking outside the box: helps us find solutions to problems in ways that others may not think of. Calculating is not a bad thing- it's needed. If this then this or without this then this. It's critical thinking, after all.

Execution: not every plan will be successful or even when it is, there may be a hiccup or two along the way. From church events planning checklists to stressing the importance of why church volunteers need background checks, we need to give more importance to analyzing the mistakes and learning from them so that next time we can do it differently and more effectively.

Gospel Meditation

God delights in you. How do you feel when you hear that? Delight usually comes with an exuberant flow of joy that seemingly arises from one's toes with the expression of great glee. Reflecting upon the deep measure of joy God has in us can be a source of joy for ourselves. Delight is infectious. A very young brother and sister were playing on the beach when the all too familiar ice cream truck made its daily rounds. The boy shook with excitement and delight as he took his sister's hand and exclaimed, "The ice cream man is here, isn't it great!" As they ran off toward the truck, one could hear the girl reply, "Yeah, I can't wait!" The experience of a child's delight in something so simple as ice cream, lifts our spirits from our burdens and transports us to the lighter, more innocent side of life.

Life is not meant to be a burden. Believe it or not, God actually wants us to be happy! In fact, the wedding feast at Cana shows us that God even puts His blessing on our happiness. It is okay to celebrate the wonder of ourselves and others. Life is good. It is always interesting to note that Jesus saves the good wine until last. You would think it would be the other way around. The superb quality of Jesus' wine points to the superior quality of life we find in Christ. It is not a life of burdens but a life of wonder and delight! In Christ, we are lifted from the superficial and mundane to a life of purpose, hope, and love.

God is with us through the long haul, through the challenges and sorrows as well as the successes and accomplishments. In spite of the fact that we often wander from the path, God's celebratory delight in us remains. As spouses are asked to remain faithful to each other through whatever life brings, God remains faithful too. This promise remains through this life and into the next. All we have to do is take the advice of Jesus' mother to heart when she says, "Listen to him." This wisdom saves us from foolishly giving in to the illusion that we can make better wine than Jesus.

Misa de Señor de Esquipulas

Señor de Esquipulas Mass Sunday January 16 at 12:30 PM



The 12:30 PM Mass this Sunday Jan 16 will be a grand liturgical celebration to honor our Lord in a way that is particular to the people of Guatemala, yet also bears relevance for all of us, who, by virtue of their baptismal call, follow the way of Jesus. Therefore the invitation to participate is extended to all the Christian faithful.

The celebration of Señor de Esquipulas, a cultural devotion to the Black Christ of Esquipulas, therefore invites all the Christian faithful to participate, since we are all called to walk in the way of the Lord Jesus. Esquipulas is a city in Guatemala, and in 1594 an artist from Portugal carved a large crucifix there to help foster devotion among the natives, who found Jesus and the Catholic faith more relatable because of the dark color of the cross. (You may have seen the replica of the cross

which resides in the shrine next to the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe.) Down through the centuries, devotion to this image of our Lord has grown in Central America. The Cross is carried in processions each January, and it has become a powerful symbol offering hope, peace and justice to so many. While the procession at the start will happen, due to health concerns of the Omicron Covid-19 variant, the annual fiesta in the Festival Hall will not take place. When we worship at this Mass, let us pray to the Lord of Esqupulas to end this pandemic.

Church in Latin America



Next Sunday, there will be a special collection taken up in support of the Church in Latin America. After the conclusion of the Second Vatican Council, the bishops of the United States initiated the Collection for the Church in Latin America in the mid-1960s as a way of fostering unity and solidarity between our country and those in Central and South America and the Caribbean. Clumping Salt

Tired of your salt clumping together and getting hard inside the salt shaker? Here's a trick that restaurants use. Just add a few grains of rice. Rice is amazing at absorbing moisture, and will keep the salt dry. The rice grains are too large to get through the holes in the top of the salt shaker so you will not get hard rice on your food. This keeps the salt from clumping.

How to Offer a Mass Intention

Did you ever notice that every Mass said here at St. Alphonsus is offered for a special intention? The entire congregation prays for that intention during the petitions (Prayers of the Faithful) when we say,

You can *register in the parish* by coming to the rectory office or going online at *www.stalphonsuschicago.org*. The advantage to registering is that we know who you are and can better plan our programs by knowing whom we serve.

Want to find out what is happening in the young adult community? Join the St. Al's Young Adult Listserv. We send out monthly emails to let people know about our upcoming events. To register for the listserv, contact <u>stalphonsusyam@gmail.com</u> "For those who have died, and for the intention of this Mass: (named intention)"

<u>You can make a Mass Intention request here</u>. Masses are often offered for family, friends and relatives that have died. Praying for the dead is a Spiritual Work of Mercy. Offering a Mass for someone that has died is an especially comforting gesture to the family. Mass can also be offered to commemorate joyful occasions and to give thanks to God for blessings received.

The customary offering for a Mass here is \$15. However, any amount that you would like to offer is completely acceptable. You can request Masses by visiting the Parish Office during office hours or calling the Parish Office at (773) 525-0709.
