

PRAY TO PROTECT HUMAN LIFE!

Three years ago, Pope Francis asked us to mark this Third Sunday in Ordinary Time (today) as the **Sunday of the Word of God**. It is a day to reflect on the central importance of scripture in our life of prayer and action.

In focusing on the Word of God, we recognize that the scriptures help us strengthen our bonds with the Jewish people and to pray for Christian unity.



The Word of God is a primary way in which God speaks to us. So often we say that we can't hear God. Yet, what is scripture if not God's voice speaking to us.

In order to hear God, we need to regularly listen to His voice in the scriptures. Our Catholic faith is so rich in ways of praying with the bible. Every day of the year, there are scripture readings for the Mass of that day. Begin with the gospel reading for the coming Sunday. Spend a few minutes praying with it before coming to Mass, so that you are already familiar with it, and so God can speak more deeply to you at Mass. The **Word Among Us** is available in the gathering space each month. It contains the Mass readings, as well as a reflection, for each day. Take one home and pray with it.

The Mass itself if filled with scriptural references. As we become more familiar with the bible, we recognize phrases and images at Mass that are drawn from the pages of scripture.

The rosary is a way of praying with the mysteries of the life of Christ and His mother. The Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory Be prayers are all rooted in scripture.

If you are ambitious, I invite you to pray the Bible in a Year with Fr. Mike Schmitz. It is available as an app that gives daily readings and a reflection. In about 20 minutes a day, over the course of a year you will have heard and reflected on the whole Bible.

For me, the scriptures have been one of the main ways in which God speaks to me. It is not about reading a lot of words, but about finding those phrases and verses which speak to my heart on a given day. God's word is alive and active. God wants to talk to us, but we need to listen!

Let's take some time today to recommit to listen to God speak to us through the scriptures.


The night will also include fun activities such as free-throw competitions and the dance team will also make a special performance!

### **Reflecting on the Scriptures**

As a body is one, though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit. Now the body is not a single part, but many. You are Christ's body, and individually parts of it.

Christmas appears to be over. Or is it?

Christmas is a wonderful celebration of God's coming to earth in the incarnation of Jesus, and so we celebrate His birth. While here on earth, Jesus healed, loved, exorcised demons, raised Lazarus, changed water into wine, always caring, and loving, especially those on the outside of mainstream society. At the end of his time here on earth, Jesus commissioned those closest to Him to love as He loved. He told them that they would do greater works than He. (John 14:12)

So how will all this loving, care, transformation, and care of the poor, those on the fringes of society continue? After all, Jesus has ascended. Yet the incarnation was not just for Jesus' life while on earth. The incarnation continues---how can that possibly be?

The ascension of Jesus does not end the incarnation. God continues still to have real flesh on earth. St. Paul explains, *"Now you are Christ's body, and individually parts of it"*. To clarify, Scripture uses "the Body of Christ" to mean three things: 1) Jesus, the incarnate Son of God, who walked this earth for 33 years; 2) the Eucharist, and 3) the body/community of believers.

While Jesus walked this earth, he transformed it with His love in action for others. So who is to love and care for people at this time in history, in this place? It is you and I who are the hands, the feet, the head, heart, lips, and ears of Christ.

Which part of the body am I? Am I the *ears* who listens well to others in pain, in struggle, in loneliness, in joy, and in grief? Am I the *head* who can plan, organize, schedule, be a leader? Am I the person who can cook, care for, clean, etc., using my *hands* to love and serve others? Am I the *feet*, who run the errands, chauffeur others, mow the lawn, or visits those who cannot get out? Or am I the *mouthpiece* of God who teaches, makes others smile, sings, prophesies to the truth? Am I the *eyes* who sees the needs, recognizes the pain, and looks with love on others? Am I the *heart* who has empathy that translates into prayer and action? What part of the body of Christ am I? Whom am I called to?

In John's Gospel, Jesus tells us that, as His disciples, we can do all the things that He does, and even greater things as the body of Christ. Like Jesus, we, too, can freely forgive, heal each other with touch and compassion, and reach through death in praying for our loved ones. The incarnation began when Jesus was born, and it continues today through you and through me. As the community of believers, we are *the mystical body of Christ*.

When you find yourself in the position to help someone, be happy and feel blessed because God is answering that person's prayer through you. Remember, our purpose on earth is not to get lost in the dark, but to be a light to others, to be the hands and feet of Christ so that they may begin to know Him through Christ in us.

In the words of St. Teresa of Avila---

Christ has no body now, but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which He looks, compassion on this world Yours are the feet with which he wants to do good Yours are the hands with which he blesses all the world.

Yours are the hands. Yours are the feet. Yours are the eyes. You are his body.

#### WORKING WITH THE SCRIPTURES

(Lk 1:1-4; 4:14-21)

A friend of mine had cataract surgery on his left eye a few months ago and was so delighted with the outcome that he immediately asked the doctor to do the other eye as well. He was like a kid with a new toy – seeing colors he hadn't been able to see before, reading road signs that had previously been only a blur until he was practically on top of them. Without his even realizing it his eyesight had been slowly deteriorating. He had forgotten how red a stop sign was or how many shades of green there were. Driving became fun again (and a lot safer for the rest of us!) and each ornament on his Christmas tree, no matter how old, looked shiny and new.

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me...to bring glad tidings to the poor...and recovery of sight to the blind..." doubt verv much that the ophthalmologist would ever claim that the Spirit of the Lord was upon him but I have seldom seen gladder tidings than the pronouncement that the surgery had gone well and my friend would indeed recover his sight! And it's not just my friend. This doctor does hundreds of these surgeries every vear - hundreds of minor miracles: hundreds of lives lifted from the poverty of lost vision to the glad tidings of color and light; hundreds of people oppressed by restrictions on driving and reading set free to travel and enjoy their morning newspaper or a good murder mystery.

Why is it so hard for us to believe that God can use our gifts? What does it take for us to recognize the Spirit of the Lord upon us? What miracles do we require? How many successful cataract surgeries? How many people liberated from blindness? "*Today* this Scripture passage is fulfilled in [our] hearing." God invites us to use *our* gifts to bring glad tidings to the poor – to proclaim liberty – to free the oppressed. How do we respond? Do we use the gifts the Spirit pours out on us? Or do we remain blind to the Spirit's presence in the work we do?

#### Oshkosh Area Food Collection

Thank you so much to all who brought donations for the OAFC collection last month. **916 pounds of food** was collected!



"The Bible in a Year" podcast by Fr. Mike Schmitz reached the top of the charts earlier this month. How much of the Bible do we hear read out loud at Mass? If you attend every Mass, on Sunday and on weekdays, for three years, you will have heard proclaimed 13.5% of the Old Testament and 71.5% of the New Testament (including 89.8% of the Gospels).

Believe it or not--and this is not necessarily a bad thing--but before the Lectionary (i.e., the book at Mass with all of the readings in it) was revamped in 1969, the Old Testament was never read on Sundays. It was only read on special vigils, such as the Easter Vigil and Pentecost Vigil, and on a handful of important weekdays. Therefore, only about 1% of the Old Testament was read.

Similarly, not too much of the New Testament, just 16.5%, was read. For example, the Letter of St. Jude, the Book of Revelation, and the two Letters to Timothy were not read at all. It just so happens that the feast of Ss. Timothy and Titus are coming up this Wednesday.

The goal of changing it was to more widely spiritually nourish the Church with the Word of God. Surely the level of interest Catholics have in studying Scripture has increased, and Catholics are now much more familiar with various Biblical stories. Some might argue that having a more clear focus was beneficial, too. It was in place since 1590, so it must have worked well. Yet, the Church does develop and grow, and the Holy Spirit is always at work to make that happen.
