

More "Blah, Blah, Blah" from Msgr. Mark

After last week's very full portfolio (and column), it's time for some lighter news bits:

- You surely recognize the line, "He who lives by the sword, dies by the sword." That's Jesus, speaking to Peter in the confusion of his arrest in the Garden of Gethsemane, as the latter pulls a weapon to defend his Master against the temple police. We had an Eastside Parish version of that late last week, focused not on sharp objects but technology. That is, if you live by technology, when things go wrong, they go very wrong. It began on Thursday when we had difficulty posting the daily audio message that Fr. Joe and I take turns recording. I logged the five-minute message on a SD card twice (with the second performance being even more stunning than the first), but "the production crew" had trouble posting it on the parish website. Oh, well. But then it happened again to me, on Sunday morning when our livestream of the 8:30 am Mass from Resurrection Parish for some reason failed. The correct button was pushed, but still we came up empty. The third glitch happened at 10:30 am Mass where the scheduled accompanist suffered a health issue just before Mass ... so the liturgy was suddenly a capella (that is, singing without accompaniment) Strictly speaking, that last happenstance wasn't a technology error, but it made me think how much I take things for granted. Flip a switch and there is light, turn the faucet and drinkable water flows, turn the key and the car starts up. Last week's events were a nudge for me to be more grateful.
- And here's another kind of technology story. It seems someone created an alternative email address for me and has been using it to pretend to be me asking for money. This is an old gimmick, and evidently must be successful. I suspect a clergyman is especially a ripe candidate for this sort of scam: a widely known personality, working for a non-profit, always with his hand out for money. If you were suckered in by it and responded to such an email, I am sorry. Happily, the person who warned me of it this time figured it couldn't be legitimate, as the "phony Fr. Mark" was asking for a few \$100 Google Play cards. For the uninitiated, these are gift cards with which you could purchase phone apps, movies, video games and the like ... and those who know me are aware that I am a card-carrying member of the Society of Luddites. I intentionally don't own a cellphone and would never make a request for something so techie. If you get such a message bearing my name, immediately hit the trash can icon. After all, if I really were asking for money, I'd be after a lot more than a few hundred dollars.
- Finally, I'd draw your attention to the new icon in the St. Michael Church sanctuary. Being a rendering of Jesus' crucifixion, it doesn't need much comment. To the left of the cross are the Blessed Mother and the other women the Gospels describe at the scene (see Mark 5:40). To the right is the Beloved Disciple and the soldier who pierced Jesus side (see John 19:34; in the tradition, he is named Longinus). I would draw your attention to the black space at the very bottom with a skull and some bones. It's a presentation of the "Tomb of Adam." I put that title in quote's because the space is more theological and spiritual than archeological. Notice how Christ's blood drips down the cross and over the bones. It's a pictorial way of saying that the debt of human sin and weakness we all share has been being made right by Christ's death. The debt is paid. I hope it helps your Lenten prayer.

Readings for the Fourth Sunday of Lent March 27

Joshua 5:9a, 10-12; 2 Corinthians 5:17-21; Luke 15:1-3, 11-32 Luke draws a detailed portrait of the height and depth of

reconciling mercy in Jesus' parable of a father and two sons. The younger son first offends by demanding his inheritance from a still-living father. He adds insult and shame to the family when he squanders the money and is reduced to feeding unclean animals. Even his planned return springs from self-interest: he is homeless and starving. The father displays almost mad joy in dashing out to meet his wayward son. (In Jesus' day, heads of household did not run in public). Further, the father showers a boy who had brought him shame and heartache with signs of a favored status: fine clothing, proper footwear, a ring. In response to this extravagant mercy, the younger son admits his sin with sorrow. But the seemingly faithful elder son reacts with anger and bitterness. How do you account for the difference? With which son do you most identify? For what reasons?





COVID procedures at **Sunday Masses at the Eastside Parishes**

Updated March 13, 2022 Here's a rundown of our current procedures at worship:

- For the unvaccinated, the wearing of face coverings and social distancing remain strongly recommended.
- The first and last pew in each section will continue to have a "buffer" row behind or in front of them for those who would welcome more space between them and others and, for the time being the 5:30 pm Saturday Mass at Resurrection will continue to require 6' distancing and the wearing of masks.
- We are not formally inviting the assembly to exchange the Sign of Peace beyond a verbal greeting. You are welcome to exchange it within your family/household grouping, but for now it might be best not to assume that those around you will welcome a handshake.
- Sanitizing of "high-touch" areas (pew tops, door handles, etc.) will continue per CDC recommendations.

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
