Parish Life

More "Blah, Blah, Blah" from Msgr. Mark

I find myself agreeing more and more with those people who, when a community or a family has been struck by

tragedy, complain that something more than pledging, "We hold them in our prayers," is called for. Now I have great confidence in prayer, but the prophets long before Christ already warned how religious acts can sometimes be excuses for passing on to God what is within our control. Check Isaiah 58, for example. We are called to <u>do</u> something, not only for the wounded other but for ourselves as bystanders. Otherwise a certain helplessness, a sense that we are all victims, can set in. "I am just one person, and the problem is so big. What can I do?"

This paralysis is, in part, a consequence of our being so "connected." Photography, radio, television, and the internet bring manmade and natural tragedies into our living rooms daily. We can feel a responsibility that our forebears would never have known. It IS too big, too much ... but we can do something. Ukraine, for example, is far away but let me suggest two organizations that can make something of our small efforts.

The first has a local connection. Chalice of Mercy is the genius of a Ukrainian woman, now an American citizen, Valentyna Pavsyukova. Over the last fifteen years she has developed a network for moving money and goods to support the care for children through the Catholic communities in her native land. Valentyna would visit Chippewa Falls every January when I was there, reconnect with friends, and hosting a great fundraiser. She is bright, well-connected, and has quite a story to tell. Meet her at www.chaliceofmercy.org.

Then there are larger agencies. They are not as personable and flexible as Valentyna, but they also have a wider impact. The biggest religious response attending to the Ukrainian refugees flooding into Poland, Slovakia, and Hungary is the European Catholic aid group Caritas . and Caritas' sister organization is Catholic Relief Services (the folks who sponsor our Lenten Rice Bowl effort). I fear the situation is going to be a mess for a very long time, so something more than a once-anddone effort may be needed. Check their website at www.crs.org.

Do something ... but pray too. Here is an edited version of a text that Pope Francis used at a recent papal audience:

Forgive us for war, O Lord. ..

Lord Jesus, born in the shadows of bombs falling on Kviv, have mercy on us! Lord Jesus, who died in a mother's arms in a bunker in Kharkiv, have mercy on us! Lord Jesus, a 20-year-old sent to the frontlines, have mercy on us! Lord Jesus, who still behold armed hands in the shadow of your Cross, have mercy on us! Forgive us, if we are not satisfied with the nails with which we crucified Your hands, ... Forgive us, if these hands which You created to tend have been transformed into instruments of death. Forgive us, O Lord, if we continue to kill our brother; Forgive us, if we continue like Cain to pick up the stones of our fields to kill Abel. Forgive us, if we continue to justify our cruelty ... by our own past pain. Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, we implore You! Hold fast the hand of Cain! Illumine our consciences; may our will not be done; Abandon us not to our own actions! Stop us, O Lord, stop us! And when you have held back the hand of Cain, care also for him, for he is our brother. O Lord, put a halt to the violence! Stop us, O Lord! Amen.

Readings for the Fifth Sunday of Lent April 3

Isaiah 43:16-21; Philippians 3:8-14; John 8:1-11

As we approach the great celebration of our redemption through Christ's dying and rising, our scriptures raise hopeful images of new life. In the Gospel, the glimpse of newness is compassion and mercy offered to all. The woman caught in adultery has no reason to expect forgiveness. In the hands of religious leaders, she can only wait for the inevitable application of the law: death by stoning. But Jesus imagines a new order in which even accusers reflect upon and realize their failures. Jesus creates the conditions for change. What person, profoundly aware of their own sin, could dare condemn another? To the woman, Jesus offers no condemnation, but the path to embrace the new life God offers: "Go, and from now on do not sin anymore." *Is there anyone that you think is beyond forgiveness? How would Jesus see this person?*

COVID procedures at Sunday Masses
