



Parish Life

More "Blah, Blah, Blah" from Msgr. Mark

For the last several weeks my columns have, once again, been of the long, theological, and serious type. It's time for a buffet of lighter fare.

- First, you are all invited to take a victory lap. Once again both parishes have met and surpassed their share in the Diocesan Annual Appeal. If you need a refresher, the Appeal is how we support the work of the Church that reaches beyond ourselves and our schools: things like the various labors of Catholic Charities, faith outreach to the public universities in our Diocese, the televised Sunday Mass, and (yes) the bureaucratic efforts of the Diocese, all get financial support from the Appeal. Resurrection Parish "went over the top" first, two months ago, with total pledges so far of \$79,575 surpassing this year's target of \$74,350. St. Michael's surpassed its slightly higher goal of \$77,485 at the start of April with \$83,087 committed to date. From chitchat with my peers, I know there are some parishes still beating the bushes for gifts to reach their share. I am so very grateful to you NOT to have to be doing that. If we all can manage to follow-through with out commitments (I am still working on mine), each parish will receive something over \$5,000 that will return to the church checkbooks for things close to home. I am sure we will find something to do with it.
- I really enjoy visiting folks in the hospital. First, Christ wants to be with us when we are ill or facing surgery, so I had better be there, too. Beyond that, a hospital is an amazing place where a great group of highly trained people come together to do some important and even miraculous work. Between Fr. Joe, myself, and our parish nurse, Pam Frary, we make at least three swings at our area hospitals each week, and yet I hear from people after the fact that they had been at Aspirus or Marshfield Medical Center in Weston for a week or more and somehow never appeared on the lists the hospitals provide us when we visit. Hmm. It's a puzzle. It could be that some of you would really rather not be visited. I understand that. A second possibility is that you think the hospitals know more about you then they do. It could also be that there is a glitch in the hospital's admittance procedures, where not all new patients get asked if they have a religious background and/or would welcome visits from their parish clergy. I'm waiting for COVID to be only an unhappy memory before having a sitdown with the appropriate parties at our hospitals on this admittedly small thing ... but, in the meantime, please listen for if the medical admitting people asks you about your "religious preference." And if it ever happens that you are there for several days and you haven't been visited by us, don't be shy about calling the parish offices. It's not a bother; it's my job.
- While I am heartened by the numbers of people who have been returning "live" to our Sunday and daily services in the last weeks, we do continue to post daily audio messages and the 8:30 am Sunday liturgy on our website. For someone who is as introverted as I am, that's a pretty "out there" thing to do ... but the pandemic pushed me in that direction, and I have become a believer. Without it going to my head, I am gratified to hear of folks listening/viewing from far away. For example, we received a very sweet note (with a financial gift) from a fellow in Missouri ... and, even stranger to tell, I have been in communication with a family in Taiwan who, in addition to their own parish worship, have made watching our Sunday Mass a habit. That's a little scary ... and a little wonderful too.

Readings for the Fourth Sunday of Easter May 8

Acts 13:14, 43-52; Revelation 7:9, 14b-17; John 10:27-30

At the founding of the Church, all of its members were Jewish. By the end of the 1st century, the Christian community was primarily Gentile. A significant moment in how that came about can be seen in Paul's statement in the first reading that the Jews needed to hear, and reject, the word of God before he and Barnabas could turn to the Gentiles. While there is evidence in some of the letters of Paul, the Acts of the Apostles, and the Gospel of John that the established Jewish authorities did harass the fledgling Christian community at times, since the first century it was the more dominant Christian community that caused the Jewish people to suffer. In the light of this history, the Second Vatican Council affirmed that the Catholic Church "deplores all hatreds, persecutions, and displays of anti-Semitism leveled at any time or from any source against the Jews" (Nostra Aetate 4). Where did you, as a Christian, learn your attitudes about the Jewish people? How have they changed (or need to change) over time?






