

Parish Life

More "Blah, Blah, Blah" from Msgr. Mark

I guess they call it "news" for a reason, and it may have as much to do with our short attention spans as anything else, but the print and electronic media

have a hard time struggling to sustain the thread of a current event for very long. Be it the latest on a political front or about a natural disaster, the editorial departments tend to hit a story hard for a few days ... and then let it drop as they reach for the next shiny thing.

I want to bring back a narrative from some months back. It was before Christmas that central Wisconsin began to welcome Afghan refugees into the area. These men and their families had become associated with our servicemen and women during the long years of the United States presence in their country ... and by that association they now bear a stigma in the eyes of the new Taliban leadership. The story of their escape from Afghanistan with family members after the pullout of the Western nations was all over the news, and then there were some stories about the Afghans at Fort McCoy, and then as some of them reached Wausau. But by March the screen sort of went dark on the matter. Well, a new chapter of the local story is again being written, and the Eastside Parishes have a part in it. Last Tuesday a handful of members of St. Michael and Resurrection Parishes gathered at Mosinee airport to welcome Ziauddin and Hamidullah, two unrelated Afghan men whom we are helping find a footing in the USA.

The U.S. Department of State has asked the Ethiopian Community Development Council (ECDC), an independent agency which has thirty years' experience (primarily settling African refugees) organizing this type of work. A member of their staff that I knew from a former life reached out to me in February. You may remember Fr. Joe and I making an appeal at our Sunday Masses early in Lent to see if there was enough interest in growing what ECDC calls a "Co-Sponsoring Group" in the parishes. I was very pleased with the interest and especially that a leader/organizer/cheerleader, Jim Peksa, also stepped up. The group received training and then identified interest areas (housing, finance, education, cultural adjustment, health, transportation, etc.). And then we waited ... until with all of 36 hours' notice (!) the arrival of Z. and H. was announced.

Ours is a yearlong responsibility to befriend these two gentlemen, especially in the first months. The State Department and ECDC cover the big picture items (like housing). Our work is mainly about showing them how we get on with life here. If you have travelled outside the U.S. much or been lucky enough to study abroad, you can appreciate the hundreds of differences in every culture. In the Jewish areas of Israel you never order a sandwich with meat <u>and</u> cheese. In most parts of Germany, you are generally expected to leave your shoes at the door when entering a home. Throughout the Middle East you should avoid using your left hand in eating or greeting another. You may think we Midwesterners are just "plain people," but we have our own customs, too.

If you missed the earlier recruiting announcements, there is still time for you to join the Parish Co-Sponsoring Group. One area where I know help would be appreciated in the next two months will be transportation, as we connect Ziauddin and Hamidullah with North Central Technical to begin English as a Second Language Classes, a check-up at the Bridge Street Clinic, grocery shopping, and such. A chauffeur's license is not required, but you will need to have your own vehicle and insurance. If this is you, call 715-842-4283 and leave your contact information at the parish office.

Readings for the Fifth Sunday of Easter May 15

Acts 14:21-27; Psalm 145:8-13; Revelation 21:1-5a; John 13:31-33a, 34-35

The language of divine glory is central to the theology of the Gospel of John. In the Old Testament, God's glory is typically a "brilliant" supernatural quality. There, illumination depicts God's presence and power. But John relates glory to Jesus' death on the cross—that it is <u>there</u> that he become most transparent and allows the divine light to shine through. This is a stunning and ironic revision of what the Gospel writer inherited from Judaism. For John, Jesus is exalted on the cross. What looks to be a humiliating death became a means of revelation greater than the words of the prophets or God's gift of the law on Mt. Sinai. *What do you find glorious about the cross in your life?*

- Dues will not be collected this year.




