

Parish Life

More "Blah, Blah, Blah" from Msgr. Mark

I trust you are familiar with the concept of **an elevator speech** ... a brief, persuasive message meant to sell someone on an

organization, project, or idea. A good elevator pitch should last no longer than a short elevator ride of 20 to 30 seconds, hence the name. With the storm raised by the release of Justice Samuel Alito's majority opinion in the case of *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health*, which signals the end of the national protection of the right to abortion launched with the *Roe v.* Wade decision of 1973, I'd suggest you take the time to prepare a thoughtful statement on the question of abortion. If not in an elevator, it's inevitable that the subject is going to come up somewhere among your family and friends. And I want you to be ready.

As a young priest I was often asked questions about our faith, and often I stumbled in giving a coherent answer. There were matters I had never thought through. Having been asked once, it dawned on me I would likely be asked again, so I started doing some study and outlining "what I should have said" on an index card so I would be ready the next time. By working through the questions, I grew in my own understanding. While knowing our Tradition's opposition to abortion is a starter, it's better if you can show your reasons. It's like "showing your homework" in freshman algebra class. I would urge you to take out an index card (or two), do a little research, and sketch out <u>your</u> answer ... for I have a hunch the question is not going away. In sharing with others, more helpful than knowing the Church's stance is knowing how we come to our stance.

Justice Alito's judicial opinion is a DRAFT ... and so the final decision and reasoning of the majority decision could be different, but even if *Roe v. Wade* is overturned it won't end abortions in our country. The question of the legality of abortion will revert to the individual states. It seems that a dozen will allow abortions with few if any limitations (e.g., New York, Illinois, and California), and there will be another dozen or so that will outlaw abortions except when the woman's life is at risk (e.g., Oklahoma and Mississippi). But that will leave half of the states where the matter will need to be discussed, debated, and legislated, and I think that will be the case in Wisconsin.

So, here are a couple suggestions. The best arguments for protecting human life at all its stages are based <u>not on the Bible, but reason</u>. That way we can address all rational people, and not just Scripture readers. For example, ethicists and physicians argue about when human life begins "scientifically." Some say it's when there's evidence of brain waves (40-43 days), some at viability (so about 24 weeks), some at birth when the infant is no longer reliant on the mother for food and oxygen. As science and philosophy are divided on the question, wouldn't the best path be our Catholic Tradition's road of protecting life from the moment of conception?" After all, if you're hunting on someone's land and think you see a magnificent buck in the woods ahead ... or maybe it is farmer's red angus bull ... you really don't dare pull the trigger.

It's only one argument of many that can be made, but an example. And if you are asked a question that you aren't prepared for, know it's always appropriate to say, "Let me get back to you on that." And then do.

Readings for Sixth Sunday of Easter May 22

Acts 15:1-2, 22-29; Revelation 21:10-14, 22-23; John 14:23-29

The account of the meeting in our first reading (what we call "the Council of Jerusalem") describes the struggles the early church had over whether non-Jews attracted to Christianity had first to take on the practices of Judaism (circumcision for males, dietary laws, etc.). In the Acts the matter seems to get worked out rather quickly, but if you check Paul's version of the narrative in Galatians 2:11-14, you'll sense there was more to the story. But when people agree on the fundamentals, solutions come easier. Today's Gospel mentions one of the traditional bases that holds the Church together: our experience of the Spirit. When have you been aware of the Holy Spirit resolving a conflict in your life? How do you open yourself to the work of the Spirit? How do you know it is God, and not just your own desires and baggage doing the talking?

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
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
