


Gathering Song

Parish Life

More "Blah, Blah, Blah" from Msgr. Mark

Composing this column is a regular part of my Tuesday agenda, and while I <u>had</u> a topic in mind already for this

week's edition, that has been pre-empted by an item that I came across in today's (that is last Tuesday's) *National Public Radio* newsfeed. The piece covered President Biden's Monday declaration that hospitals "must" provide abortion services **if the life of the mother is at risk**. With the daily drumbeat of abortion stories since the Supreme Court's June 24 decision, your eyes may glaze over at my saying I have something to add to the story. So if you will want to skip my column this week I will understand, but perhaps you might welcome some clarification to the president's declaration.

The result of the Court's decision last month, again, was to return the question of the access to abortion to the legislators of each state and, presumably, the people who elect them. Where some states have already imposed significant legal restrictions, others have passed laws to guarantee abortion access. There being fifty states, I can't speak for all of them, but I do want to chase away one confusion (from the Catholic Church's view on the matter).

To be a Catholic is to be part of a discussion about God and the Truth that's been going on for a long time. The wisdom of our tradition has always been that both lives—the mother's and the unborn child's—are of inestimable value. As a consequence, when the life of a pregnant woman is threatened it is always a moral choice to intervene medically for her welfare ... even if that intervention could lead to the undesired death of the unborn child. For any moral nerds out there, this is what we call the Principle of Double Effect. What we want to do is respond to the mother's health crisis (after all, her life is at risk). What comes along as the regrettable side effect is the death of the unborn. At the same time, it would also be a moral choice for the mother to forego the treatment, and risk her own life for the sake of bringing her child to full term, if she chooses. This would be the woman's difficult (and prayerful) decision to make. [By the way, if you would like to read the story of one woman, an Italian physician, who made that hard heroic choice, look up St. Gianna Beretta Molla.]

I am not sure who President Biden had in mind in his Monday order that medical treatment be available when the mother's life is threatened (including things that may regrettably include the loss of an unborn child) ... but informed Catholics and Catholic personnel are already ahead of him on this point.. What the President is calling for has been a part of our Church's moral toolbox since St. Thomas Aquinas in the 13th century.

We need to engage in the work of a thoughtful discussion about abortion and the protection of the mother and the unborn in our state, but the first step is to be clear what we are talking about. It's not helpful to link the difficult circumstances of women enduring the complications of pregnancy loss, ectopic pregnancy, or other threats to their life, with the very different matter of abortion. As we listen and learn and discuss, please be careful not to swallow "whole" every statement made by celebrities, influencers, and even (dare I say it) politicians.

Readings for the 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time July 29

Genesis 18:20-32; Colossians 2:12-14; Luke 11:1-13

Today's readings explore the dynamics of prayer. As Jews, the disciples would likely already have been exposed to a great deal about how to pray (check out the Book of Psalms). But they wanted to know a particular insight to prayer <u>as Jesus prayed</u>. First, he tells them, turn to God in humility: "Father, hallowed be your name." Begin from the place that knows you are not in control, that you need God. Only then, does he teach them to name the things we need (bread, pardon, protection). Does your prayer time look like Jesus' model prayer—first asking to know God's will ... then bending our desire to His? What words of the Our Father are most meaningful to you at this



 At the other three Masses, the pews second from the front and second from the back in each seating section will remain as "buffers" for those who would welcome a little more separation from others.






