




#### **Gathering Song**

# More "Blah, Blah, Blah" from Msgr. Mark

It's a struggle, finding a balanced news report. That is, of course, in part due to there usually being at least more than one side to an

issue. And, presuming our short attention spans and the cost of paper, ink, pixels, and on-air time, I'm guessing news editors beat into their writers the need for brevity. I don't think it serves us well. A case in point is the coverage this week of Pope Francis' trip to Canada. This will be the 175<sup>th</sup> foreign trip by a pope since the era of Paul VI, and so such things aren't big news anymore. I understand that. It's the **reason** he is there that matters. He went to apologize.

The residential school system in Canada was a network of boarding schools for indigenous students. Between 1863 and 1996, more than 150,000 children attended the schools, and while they were a project of the Canadian government, most of them were administered by religious groups, and more than half under Catholic auspices. Until 1948, attendance for many First Nations children was mandatory, and children were forcibly separated from their families to attend, with the aim often of stripping them from their language and culture. The independent Canadian 2015 Truth and Reconciliation final report spoke of a "cultural" genocide." What has caught the news media on this side of the 49<sup>th</sup> parallel are reports and individuals' memories of hundreds of deaths associated with the schools. The New York Post spoke of "mass graves" and "grisly discoveries." Sadly, it wouldn't be surprising that there would have been many deaths at the residential schools due to disease, malnutrition, mistreatment, accident, and suicide. Most of the real research here is yet to be done.

Tribal leaders have called on the Canadian government, the denominations, and religious communities to take responsibility for their share in systematic efforts to erase Native culture, and this has been going on for years. As part of that, in spring, a delegation of thirty Native leaders and residential school survivors travelled to Rome to receive an initial papal apology. This week's efforts were built on that. Here is part of Francis' words from Monday:

"I am deeply sorry. Sorry for the ways in which, regrettably, many Christians supported the colonizing mentality of the powers that oppressed the indigenous peoples. ... I ask forgiveness, in particular, for the ways in which many members of the Church and of religious communities cooperated, not least through their indifference, in projects of cultural destruction and forced assimilation promoted by the governments of that time, which culminated in the system of residential schools. Although Christian charity was not absent, and there were many outstanding instances of devotion and care for children, the overall effects of the policies linked to the residential schools were catastrophic. ... It is painful to think of how the firm soil of values, language, and culture that made up the authentic identity of your peoples was eroded, and that you have continued to pay the price of this. In the face of this deplorable evil, the Church kneels before God and implores his forgiveness for the sins of her children."

The capacity to apologize is almost a defining feature of the modern papacy. In the old days, being pope (or bishop, king, or boss) meant "never having to say you were sorry." Leaders (not to mention institutions) never admitted error. Yet since Pope Paul II, the apology has become a routine feature of papal discourse. Some think there has been too much of this, but I think it's worth reflecting on how far the papacy has come over the last sixty years — and, perhaps, how different John Paul's call to "let us forgive and ask forgiveness" (which his successors have taken to heart) feels from the heartless and merciless political and cultural temper of 2022.

#### Readings for the 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time August 7, 2022

Wisdom 18:6-9; Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19; Luke 12:32-48

Having dipped our toe in Paul's letter to the Colossians over the last weeks, we are on to a different New Testament letter, the one addressed "to the Hebrews." It is a long piece, and so we read a portion of it each year, starting today with—the catalog of faith heroes that is chapter 11. For example, Abraham and Sarah placed their lives in God's hands, trusting that He would lead them to a new land and make them the ancestors of countless believers. Who in your life has been an example of faithfulness? Express a prayer of gratitude for them.

Though it is not a holyday of obligation this year, celebrate the Assumption of Mary on Monday evening, August 15<sup>th</sup>, at 5:30 pm. In addition to our Lord's Day celebrations, there are other occasions in the Church calendar so



central to who we are that Catholics are asked to squeeze extra time out of their routines to come to worship. Mary, the Mother of God, is a template for God's designs for us all—and on Monday the 15<sup>th</sup> we will consider how God's care for her at the end of her life speaks of His intentions for us all. Falling on a Monday this year, there is no "obligation" to attend Mass, but please consider celebrating a bit of Easter held over into late summer at our usual 5:30 pm Monday worship time at Resurrection.


