# Parish Life

## More "Blah, Blah, Blah" from Msgr. Mark

I start most Monday mornings by creating a "to-do" list for the week. It makes every day into a contest. I think it's something people of my cohort did before the invention of

video games. When it comes to maintenance and repair, however, my "to-do" list means getting someone else to do it. Apart from painting, I am pretty "unhandy."

So, praise to Brian and Nao Lao, our maintenance guys, who are forever repairing, cleaning, hauling, and trimming things! Between the two parishes, we have lots of buildings, sidewalk, and landscaping, but there is also a lot of complicated equipment and structural matters that require us to call on all kinds of craftspeople and technicians. Here is a checklist of these bigger projects that are in the hopper for the summer:

- One item already checked off the "to-do" list is cement work at St. Michael's—the sidewalks in front of the school building, gathering area, offices, and the driveway by the rectory. This was supposed to be done last year but the contractor ran out of time. It's finished now, and they were up front enough to do the work at last year's bid price.
- Next on the outdoor agenda at St. Michael's is the repair, re-sealing, and re-painting of the parking lot. Here again we are on a waiting list, but we have been assured it will get finished before it gets too cold. In the same general area, the north end of the children's play area is going to be cleaned up and reseeded on the parish's dime, while Newman Catholic Schools will do the same for the day care play zone on the south end.
- Meanwhile, at Resurrection, what that has our attention is the church's towers. This is one of those situations where the discovery of some small initial repair (the failure of the plaster in the north tower) led to the discovery of another problem (water leaking through the bell tower louvers), which led to uncovering a third issue (water damage in the walls above the bathroom in the south tower), calling for an overall effort to assess and tackle some other external issues (the need for tuckpointing and better drainage in the towers). We've retained a local firm to assess and recommend the path for addressing <u>all</u> of these things. We are in the study phase now; decisions will happen in winter, and the repair work will be a spring 2023 matter.
- Out at St. Michael Cemetery on Grand Avenue, meanwhile, we have several piles of new granite awaiting the September arrival of a craftsman from SE Wisconsin who will replace the stained and disintegrating marble parts of the mausoleum. There will be some internal repairs first, and some painting and cleaning afterwards, to make it again a truly fit place for burying our dead.
- And, finally, even as I type this, we are having our more-powerfulthan-we-need internal phone system swapped out for a VoIP (Voice over Internet Protocol) set-up ... that is, a phone system delivered over the internet. You shouldn't see/hear any difference in our service, but it will cut our phone and technology bill by half. As part of that changeover, we've been warned that there will be a period lasting between a few minutes to a few hours before the end of the week where there will be no service at all. It's the price for progress.

Next week in this spot, I will share how it is that, after suddenly losing Fr. Joe Richards and being told there would be no replacement this year ... suddenly in a few weeks we will be welcoming Fr. Eric Mashak to Newman and Associate at the Eastside Parishes.

#### Readings for the 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time August 14, 2022

Jeremiah 38:4-6, 8-10; Hebrews 12:1-4; Luke 12:49-53

### Fr. Sebastian Kolodziejczyk • August 20 & 21

August is **National Immunization Awareness Month,** sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The goal is to highlight the importance of vaccinations for people of all ages.

Seasonal flu and COVID-19 variants are potentially serious diseases that can lead to hospitalization and sometimes even death. Each of these viral illnesses are extremely transmittable.

Every flu season is different and the COVID variants are different. Some variants emerge and disappear while others persist. Both the seasonal flu and COVID are transmitted as an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks. Droplets or tiny particles called aerosols carry the virus into the air from their nose or mouth. Anyone within 6 feet is exposed. People can be affected differently, but millions of people get the flu every year, and the statistics of Marathon County continue to show the current new case rate is HIGH for COVID. Recent confirmed cases are averaging 57 daily.

A flu vaccine is needed every year for two reasons. First, a person's immune protection from a vaccination declines over time. Second, because flu viruses are constantly changing, the composition of flu vaccines is reviewed annually. Thus it is best to get vaccinated before the influenza viruses start to spread in our community.

The same can be said for COVID vaccinations. New variants of the virus are expected to occur. Slowing the spread of the virus, by protecting yourself and others, can help slow the spread of new variants. The Omicron variant causes more infections and spreads faster than the original SARS-COV strain of the virus. Getting a vaccine reduces your risk of severe illness, hospitalization, and death from COVID-19. *Staying up-to-date on your COVID-19 vaccines and seasonal flu vaccines, which includes getting a booster when eligible, further improve your protection.* 

COVID-19 vaccines currently approved or authorized by the FDA are effective in preventing serious outcomes of coronavirus disease. mRNA COVID-19 vaccines (i.e. Moderna, Pfizer and Novavax) are recommended, including boosters. Recommendations for booster doses vary on age, primary series product, and immunocompetence. Efforts to increase the number of people in the United States who are up-to-date with their COVID-19 vaccines (and flu vaccines) remain critical to preventing illnesses, hospitalization, and deaths.

As flu season approaches consider keeping **ALL** your vaccines up-to-date.
