Parish Life

More "Blah, Blah, Blah" from Msgr. Mark

There's a clever one-liner that "Jesus educated grown-ups and played with children, while the contemporary Church

educates children and plays with adults" ... that is, we put a lot of emphasis on initial instruction for children (our schools, faith formation classes, sacramental preparation, etc.), while only gathering adults "to play" (socials, gaming, and raffles). It's not as true as it used to be. In the 19th century, except for a few professions, it was assumed that after grade school one would put the books down and work. They didn't think peoples' brains were full, it's just that, after adolescence, now was the time for labor. Few had the leisure for what we think of as "ongoing education." Now that's part of most of our employments ... and faith, too.

As the programming year begins and we send our kids and grandkids off for schooling, I aim to nudge the rest of you in the next few bulletin columns to consider where some growth in faith is called for by highlighting a job description for discipleship. Last week, I offered the first bit of my pattern for maturity in Christ, raising the question, "Do you know the story?" In a church tradition as large and rich as ours, there is no end to intellectual growth opportunities. As with human friendship, the better I understand God, the richer my love for God can be.

But that was last week. The second part of my job description for discipleship builds on that friendship analogy: **Do I have a worthy, personal prayer life?** I hear a lot of folks who struggle with prayer. They have the desire, but they stumble in the implementation. Some struggle because they continue to bring the expectations and practices of childhood lessons about prayer into their adulthood. The prayer forms I learned as a kid are still alive in me and useful, but I have adult questions and adult problems now. Perhaps something more will be demanded. Another problem is that we often find it very hard to make the time ... and so our prayer becomes occasional thoughts-about-God throughout the day without sitting down for a real "date." Again, nothing wrong in itself in "chatting with God" as we make our way throughout the day ... but there's more to a friendship than occasional quips.

What do you ask or expect of those you bless with the name "friend"? If you are like most people, you figure on spending time together by plan, not by chance. You hope for mutual sharing. You trust the other has your best interests in mind, and so let him or her in on your hurts and influence your decisions. These are the delights—and the price—of being "in relation" with another. Prayer for adults is not just "giving God a moment." If you know how to be a friend, you already know how to be a friend of God. He asks nothing more of us ... and nothing less. So, the second part of my discipleship job description would invite me to consider whether I treat God as a vending machine ... or as a friend? As with any friendship, have I set a time aside ... not chance meetings while driving, or emptying the dishwasher, but a regular, daily, scheduled appointment ... just God and me, one-on-one?

There. That's Item #2 on what could make us disciples of Jesus. Perhaps you have noticed that even as I am laying all of this on you, elsewhere in the bulletin I'm advertising Tuesday night "short courses." You don't suppose that's an accident, do you? Nudge, nudge.

Readings for the 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time September 25

(Amos 6:1a,4-7; 1 Timothy 6:11-16; Luke 16:19-31)

"Woe to the complacent ... they are not made ill by the collapse of Joseph!" Today's first reading, pointed at those with comfortable lives, might trigger a little unease in us all as we reflect on the comfort of our own lifestyles. Neither this phrase from the prophet Amos, nor Jesus' parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus, are about pain for pain's sake. They are concerned about the lack of awareness of others' plights. "Joseph," by the way, is a nickname for the northern tribes of Israel. In the Gospel, the poor man lies just outside the house of the rich man but is ignored. Jesus and Amos stand together in expecting concern for the powerless as an aspect of God's Law. The Rich Man may have, in other ways, been an admirable descendent of Abraham. For example, he does demonstrate concern for his family, but he failed to see beyond his door. Why do you think a righteous person would come to the aid of Lazarus? What mandates from Scripture do you have a hard time following?


