



Getting what you asked for at Christmas?

"What time is the midnight Mass?" Back in the day, a long time ago, when I was a newly ordained priest and answering the rectory phone on Christmas Eve, this question drove me crazy. The answer, back in the day, was "Midnight." I confess taking some frustrated delight in simply giving that one word answer. St. Michael's in Orland Park was the largest parish in the Archdiocese at the time. We celebrated a dozen masses in three locations on a normal weekend. I cannot recall how many (more) we had for Christmas! I was only a few years into parish Christmas chaos, but I found myself longing for a 'quiet' Christmas Eve. That is what I wanted for Christmas. And since there was no promise of that happening in the midst of St Mike's, the desire grew.

Pretty quickly, I was moved to my second assignment to be on the faculty at the college seminary. This allowed me to serve at Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Glenview saying Mass on the weekends. That first Christmas I was asked to celebrate the 4:00 pm Mass on Christmas Eve. As many people have experienced, the early Christmas Eve masses can be a bit chaotic. But I was pretty well seasoned in such things and I actually enjoy "the kids' Mass" on Christmas Eve. It went well: no one was injured, and the mystery of the Incarnation was proclaimed and celebrated, remembering that the birth of Jesus was probably not the Silent Night we have sung into our imagination.

So, that was it. No other assignments, Masses or responsibilities. Not one question about the timing of the Midnight Mass. My family was out of town. I would be part of a celebration with friends the next day.

I had dinner with a friend after Mass. And then went back to my 'garden level' room in an empty dorm at the Seminary. I watched snippets of <u>It's a Wonderful Life</u>, which ran continuously on multiple TV channels back then. I listened to all of Handel's Messiah. I opened a couple of gifts that were under my three foot plastic tree. And that was it – I had gotten what I asked, hoped, and longed for: an eerily quiet Christmas Eve.

It took a bit to actually realize this. *OK*, this is what you wanted, now what? Eventually I turned to prayer and a bit of journaling. The gift of that one silent night was a question that rose in my heart and that I now ask every year.

"How will Jesus be born into your life this year?"

Of course we do not know the answer to that question, because we cannot predict the future. But what it does is recognize the coming of Christ into our / my life in the past, present and the future. It keeps our anticipation of the advent of the Lord alive always. And it echoes all the possibilities of where God longs to be present in the midst of our chaos and stillness. It embraces the truth of Christmas: that God shows up in unexpected, sometimes confoundingly powerful and beautiful ways.

Old St. Pat's strives to be an experience and a place where the question is answered in community, worship, and outreach. In my short time at Old St Pat's, I have come to appreciate how the ministry here goes both broad and deep. Offering something for everyone, but also respecting, in every encounter, each person's identity as beloved people of God.


As you read through this bulletin and all its opportunities to encounter the love and person of God, perhaps you will hear the answer to, "How will Jesus be born in your life this year?"

BEHOLD I BRING YOU TIDINGS OF GREAT JOY! by Bernadette Gibson December 19th and 25th, 2021

The meaning of Emmanuel, God with us, is best not to walk into casually, with little thought, or with little preparation. When given time, Advent enables us to consider, as best we can, what it means for God not only to be human, but also to serve us in the gift of new beginnings. This has been a specifically poignant year to seek Christmas Joy for my family. Christmas this year entails admitting some significant grief, for only in grief do we long for and deeply cherish the glad tidings of what Christmas is. Said differently, we need the darkness to see the light better. My husband Gary, my Father and my sister in-law Janice are battling cancer this year. Given the fear and pains of this disease, we have had to be real with ourselves and with who we are now in light of these challenges Perhaps this year, we as family understand, in part, the reason that the star above Bethlehem shined so brightly in the sky. The luminous star needed to light the way back to God amidst the shadow of doubt. We follow the light because we need a way out of the darkness. Christmas reminds us that God's anointed did not come in the daytime but in the black of night, not in the seats of power and not to the proud, but in the small town where God anointed a child to be King. I have spent a lot of time in self-examination on this journey and I have searched both the manger and the cross for meaning. Which is to say, I have searched where life is beginning and ending in me. This Christmas I ask you to look to the places where you know the least and fear the most. Look in the eyes of those you love more than love itself, and in the eyes of those whom you struggle to love. Look in the mirror; listen to the sound of your own voice; and consider the beating of your own heart. Then cast your gaze across the world and ponder the same love manifest in places marked by great sorrow and suffering. And like the angels, don't be afraid to let your heart break. Let your tears flow at the sorrow and the Joy of it all, the wonder of life and the mystery of love. For Christ comes to us in place of tears and the search for meaning.

The good news for you and me as we gather this Christmas - is that the baby of Bethlehem grew up, and one of the chief elements of his ministry was healing. God's power of life dwelt in him and he was able to continue the work of creating by reaching out and healing so many. It is a power of healing we can continue to count on today. O God, we are Your manger this Christmas, every single one of us. Help us to grow large enough inside to hold You, to hold everything: the mystery of love, the sorrow of a broken heart, the miracle of our beating hearts. We are still here. We welcome Your love knocking sideways all that holds us back, so that Your light shines through us, Your love flows through us, with tears of sadness, tears of joy, and tears of love. We are invited into God's story;



one here our hearts exponentially expand with the possibility that is already with us. In this story: HOPE overrides despondency; JOY overwhelms sorrow; PEACE overcomes hostility; and even with humble beginnings, LOVE overpowers all. Christmas JOY will always exceed our expectations. Jesus is the "good news of great joy that will be for all the people". ALL the people. Not just kings and high-ranking officials, but blue-collar shepherds. Not just Jews, but Gentiles - even astrologers like the magi. Black and white. Women and men. Laywomen and clergy. This is no tribal joy, but for all kinds of people, in every place, at every time. This is not a small joy quarantined in Jerusalem, but a great joy extended and offered to all the nations. God is already in the midst of humanity, building a kingdom of justice and love and peace. You and I are invited into that amazing mystery, first, to experience something of God's love in a way that actually matters, and then to embody - to incarnate - that love for someone else.

As we appreciate the twinkling lights of the holidays, let them remind us of the real meaning of the season. God is with us, Emmanuel, whether we are with others or by ourselves, when our faith brings us together or in those special moments of prayer when our faith moves us to draw apart for just awhile. This Christmas, make time to know the light and the joy that Jesus brings! The One who was born has given new birth to us all. May God fill your heart with his love this Christmas, and may that love overcome your fears and set you free to accept the gifts God came to bring to each of us, gifts of light and hope, peace and tidings of great Joy!

Evenings with Encore welcomes Fr. Pat McGrath in January of 2022



Born in Chicago and raised in the south suburbs, Fr. Patrick McGrath, S.J. entered the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) in 2000 and was ordained a priest in 2006. In addition to serving in various roles in Jesuit secondary education for more than 20 years, he is a popular retreat leader and homilist. Fr. McGrath uses storytelling, scripture, wisdom from the Catholic tradition and the spirituality of St. Ignatius Loyola to help others reflect and experience God in all things. Fr. McGrath currently serves as the President of Loyola Academy in Wilmette, Illinois. Founded in 1909, Loyola is the largest Jesuit high school in the United States. Loyola students come from all over the Chicago metropolitan area representing more than 90 different zip codes. The mission of Loyola Academy is to form women and men for meaningful lives of leadership and service in imitation of Jesus Christ through a college preparatory education in the Jesuit, Catholic tradition.

In June 2021, Cardinal Blase Cupich announced that Fr. McGrath will become the next pastor of Old St. Patrick's Church in Chicago starting summer 2022. Fr. McGrath was ordained at Old St. Patrick's

(2006) and has served as a weekend presider there ever since. Fr. McGrath holds a B.A. from Notre Dame ('88), a M.Div. from the Jesuit School of Theology and a M.S. from Northwestern. He currently serves on the boards of Loyola Academy and Marquette University.






Hope House (pictured right)






Encore members had fun participating in the Chicago Marathon with friends and family!

Our Pastoral team is working to meet the spiritual needs of our people now more than ever as we find ourselves increasingly separated from one another. We are inspired by the essentiality of pastoral care. We understand that the recent landscape of healthcare identifies challenges and opportunities for delivering spiritual care & sharing resources for spiritual communion in new and creative ways. We as a pastoral team have been committed to providing holistic care through technology, personal calls, letters and zoom gatherings and to help those in distress to feel less isolated in these strange days.

Spirituality is a vital part of our mission and plays an important role in the healing process. Understanding this, our mission is to assist our families as they face the emotional and spiritual impact of illness and loss. Our Pastoral Care ministers help our members deal with issues of fear, loneliness, questions of meaning, and finding hope at life's changing thresholds.

Parish Counselor

The mission of the parish counselor is to bring healing, hope, and wholeness to individuals and couples through psychologically informed counseling. Sarah Thompson, the parish counselor at Old St. Pat's integrates client values and religious beliefs into the counseling process. She works with individuals and couples as they seek to understand and grow through various challenges life brings. Sarah draws from various therapeutic approaches, focusing on the mind-body- spirit connection, to illuminate underlying issues, free up blocks, and improve your well-being and emotional health.

Her goal is to support you in your efforts to discover and become more fully the person you were created to be, focusing on restoring dignity, strengths, and God-given talents. Sarah Thompson is available for counseling, presently remotely through teletherapy until OSP offices re-open. Prayer Ministry

Prayer Ministry means journeying with another. It means remaining open to problems that are not always solvable, listening to one another and acknowledging the reality of experience from which we voice our expectations, concerns, sorrows, celebrations, and stories.

On the second Tuesday of every month, members of the Ministry of Prayer gather on Zoom to attend to the prayers of our membership. Together, they pray for and send cards to those experiencing a need at any one of life's thresholds.

Grief Support Ministry, HealingTogether@Home

Because we are not meeting in-person for our regular Old St. Pat's Grief Support Group, Companions on the Journey, we have created a grief support group that meets remotely utilizing the Zoom meeting platform. HealingTogether@Home has been organized for those who are grieving the death of a loved one: parent, spouse, partner, sibling, family member, friend... It hurts!



You may be experiencing some of the most powerful and painful feelings of your life. The many feelings of grief may seem uncomfortable and threatening to you. And, sadly, there are too few people who want to talk to you about this pain. Support groups provide an opportunity for grieving persons to better understand the wide range of feelings and behaviors associated with grief. More importantly, support groups offer a safe place where people can come together for mutual support, and to learn that their feelings are normal and that one need not be alone.

Our program is offered free of charge over the course of seven consecutive weeks. Our groups are small by design so that they are comfortable and informal. We plan to schedule the next program on Wednesday, January 26th and end on March 16th (with March 2nd excluded due to Ash Wednesday) from 6:30pm to 8:00pm.

IMMIGRANT AND REFUGEES: A Faith Journey Sunday, December 19, 2021 Light three purple candles and one pink candle. LOVE

"Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled." -Lk 1:45

Blessed are immigrants and refugees who believe in the promises spoken to them by God: You are mine; you deserve dignity, safety, and security. They are loved by God. Read stories of their journeys so you too can hear God's promise to them: www. kinoborderinitiative.org/category/migrant-stories/

Today's first reading reminds us that Love - Emmanuel - grows from those who follow God's will. If immigrants and refugees follow God's will, then they are bearers of God's love. Do they find a welcome and fertile ground in us? Reflect on how you can prepare your heart for them.

The second reading reveals that Love grows from sacrifice of self for others. God does not look for sacrifices of materialism and convenience; giving out of our excess is not a sacrifice. Jesus showed us how to make a sacrifice of our lives and our hearts to help others. Use this resource and the links to determine what sacrifices you can make so that love grows for immigrants and refugees.

Finally, we close with a Gospel reflection: What does a world filled with the Love of Christ look like, when God's dream becomes a reality? Elizabeth saw that God's promise was alive in her cousin, Mary. Her excitement and faith in this reality were unable to be contained. May we recognize this same Hope in the faces of immigrants and refugees as we act in faith to welcome them - KBI Actions to Take (www.kinoborderinitiative.org/act/) or use this USCCB Sample Letter (bit.ly/USCCBSampleLetter) to send a letter to your editor.

IMMIGRANT & REFUGEE MINISTRY

2021 Comings & Goings ...

EMILE AND GASPIRA, two brothers who were born in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, but grew up in a refugee camp in Rwanda before emigrating to the U.S. and settling in Chicago with some help from Old St. Pat's. Both brothers have moved on to Louisville, KY this year for both a better economic and weather climate. We wish them both well.

OUR NEW HONDURAN FAMILY (mom, dad and two sons, ages 18 & 12) is settling in nicely. They still have the status of asylum seekers, which precludes them from finding employment, however, they have found housing on the SW side of Chicago and no longer live in a local church. The younger son is enrolled in CPS and has made the honor roll. The family will also welcome a new baby in February. IRM helped them find furnishings through Chicago Furniture Bank and is assisting with their rent.

OUR NEW AFGHAN FAMILY of five (mom, dad and three daughters, ages 21, 19 and seven) have settled into an apartment on the NW side of Chicago, found by Catholic Charities. The three adults are waiting for their Social Security cards so they can begin to find jobs. They are now participating in job readiness and ESL classes. Their two younger daughters are attending Chicago Public Schools.

Here's an update on our diverse group of families, who are accompanied by IRM on their journeys to success in the US:

THE ALREFAAI FAMILY, originally from Syria, they spent a number of years in Jordan, before arriving in Chicago on Christmas Eve five years ago. The family—mom, dad and children, Tarek, Amar, Mohammed and Rama--moved from



Chicago's Rogers Park neighborhood to Skokie in 2020. The four older children are enrolled in three different local schools, doing well and so happy to have returned to in-person classes. You may have seen mom, Dalya, who "starred" in a Catholic Relief Services Lenten Rice Bowl fundraiser, Dalya's Syrian Kitchen, earlier this year. Dalya also gave birth in late November to a beautiful, healthy baby boy, Ameer Ziad. They are working on American Citizenship papers.

THE ANUAR FAMILY, who emigrated

Myanmar (formerly Burma) as refugees several years ago, is a great success story. Mom and dad, Azimah and Norhan, still miss their parents, but are blessed to have two of their siblings nearby as well as cousins for their son, Azimi, to enjoy. Now that Azimi enrolled in a local Chicago public school and doing well, mom Azimah is looking forward to being able to work outside the home. Norhan is doing well at his job and hopes better his position.





THE RAMOS FAMILY, originally from Colombia in South America, continues to do well in adapting to life in the US, despite the Pandemic. Their son, Luis, especially enjoys the social aspects of returning to in-person school after the prior year of learning remotely. Isabella is now an active and curious toddler. Maria and Ferney, modeling our contemporary culture, have switched roles--with mom recently taking a job in a paper factory and dad, parenting and running the household, while he is currently also seeking employment at O'Hare.

The Immigration & Refugee Ministry (IRM) is so grateful to Old St. Pat's members for their generous, ongoing support of our efforts—a sincere thanks to all. The need is great.

This New Year's I Resolve....

A New Year's resolution is a commitment by a person to change a way or thinking or acting, to accomplish a goal, or to make some other positive life change. The practice of making resolutions at the beginning of a new year is found in both Western and Eastern cultures. This custom started as a religious tradition. In ancient times, the Babylonians promised their gods at the beginning of each year to pay their debts and to return anything they had borrowed, while the Romans began each year by making promises to Janus, the god for whom January is named. In the Middle Ages, knights took vows at the end of the Christmas season reaffirming their commitment to chivalry. During Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, Jews reflect on wrongful acts committed in the past year, and seek and offer forgiveness for wrong doing. In modern times, the New Year's resolution has become secularized, but remains popular; an estimated 40-50% of Americans make New Year's Resolutions.

In 2019, 2,000 Americans were surveyed about their New Year's resolutions. Five of the 10 most popular resolutions related to health and wellness, and included resolves to eat healthier, exercise more, and stop smoking. Other resolutions related to self-improvement: read more, learn something new, and find a better job.

But what would our resolutions look like if they reflected that we need one another, that we have a shared responsibility for others and the world, and that being good and decent is worth it?

Our relationships are a series of interconnected and sometimes overlapping circles. Family, friends, neighbors, co-workers, it is easy to recognize all these people as those we need and who need us. But when we step back and take a broader perspective, we come to know that these circles extend even further.



Fellow local citizens, countrymen, other North Americans, other inhabitants of our common home wherever they may live, all have connections to us. In our global economy, they grow much of our food, produce much of the clothing and goods we use every day, build parts of our cars, trains, and airplanes. We breathe the same air, feel the same rain on our skin, shelter from the same storms, swim in the same oceans that stretch between the continents. What resolutions should we make to reflect our deep connections to one another?

One of the main themes of <u>Laudato Si</u> is that our society often seems to value individualism and consumerism above caring for others and respecting limits. Our self-centeredness can prevent us from rejecting what market forces consistently present to us as desirable. Pope Frances calls for us to develop an "ecological citizenship" which sees through some of our contemporary economic myths, such as the market knows best and the best person always wins. What resolutions should we make as ecological citizens to grow in solidarity, responsibility and compassionate care for other people and our planet?

Formed September 2020, in response to the tragic death of George Floyd and the nation's watershed racial reckoning, Old St. Pat's Racial Equity & Justice Initiative (REJI) accepts the challenge and call of our Vision to be leaders in a movement of change in the church. We are committed to aiding the OSP community in living out our values of transformative kinship and radical inclusivity by promoting racial equality, justice, and change in big and small ways.

During the 2021 Lenten Season, we invited the community to educate, contemplate, and activate around the themes of racial equity with the help of our Lenten Racial Equity Resource.

Blessed Urban V Saint of the Day for December 19

In 1362, the man elected pope declined the office. When the cardinals could not find another person among them for that important office, they turned to a relative stranger: the holy person we honor

The new Pope Urban V proved a wise choice. A Benedictine monk and canon lawyer, he was deeply spiritual and brilliant. He lived simply and modestly, which did not always earn him friends among clergymen who had become used to comfort and privilege. Still, he pressed for reform, and saw to the restoration of churches and monasteries. Except for a brief period he spent most of his eight years as pope living away from Rome at Avignon, seat of the papacy from 1309, until shortly after his death.

Urban came close, but was not able to achieve one of his biggest goals—reuniting the Eastern and Western churches.

As pope, Urban continued to follow the Benedictine Rule. Shortly before his death in 1370, he asked to be moved from the papal palace to the nearby home of his brother, so he could say goodbye to the ordinary people he had so often

Saint of the Day for December 26

"As the number of disciples continued to grow, the Greek-speaking Christians complained against the Hebrew-speaking Christians, saying that their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution. So the Twelve called together the community of the disciples and said, 'It is not right for us to neglect the word of God to serve at table. Brothers, select from among you seven reputable men, filled with the Spirit and wisdom, whom we shall appoint to this task, whereas we shall devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word.' The proposal was acceptable to the whole community, so they chose Stephen, a man filled with faith and the Holy Spirit..." (Acts 6:1-5).

Acts of the Apostles says that Stephen was a man filled with grace and power, who worked great wonders among the people. Certain Jews, members of the Synagogue of Roman Freedmen, debated with Stephen, but proved no match for the wisdom and spirit with which he spoke. They persuaded others to make the charge of blasphemy against him. He was seized and carried before the Sanhedrin.

In his speech, Stephen recalled God's guidance through Israel's history, as well as Israel's idolatry and disobedience. He then claimed that his persecutors were showing this same spirit. "... you always oppose the holy Spirit; you are just like your ancestors" (Acts 7:51b).

Stephen's speech brought anger from the crowd. "But he, filled with the holy Spirit, looked up intently to heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God, and he said, 'Behold, I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God'.... They threw him out of the city, and began to stone him....As they were stoning Stephen, he called out, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit'...'Lord, do not hold this sin against them" (Acts 7:55-56, 58a, 59, 60b).


