

A Final Though

For the better part of 14 years as your pastor, I had the privilege of writing in this publication *The Crossroads*. Often, I would share what was rolling through my head and heart that week and then I'd put it in this column under the simple title "*Just a Thought*." It was never anything profound and sometimes I wrote just a few "nuts and bolts" about various pieces of the Old St. Pat's Mission that I felt was important for me to emphasize and for you to know. And to be perfectly honest, a lot of times it was written so 'last minute' because of my procrastination, that our communication directors throughout the years put me in the proverbial doghouse for going over the printer's deadline!

When I prayerfully decided that it was time to return to ministry, I knew in my heart that I wanted to write something to you, my loving and wonderful family of Old St. Pat's. Like all the other columns throughout the years, the grammar may not be perfect and this might just sound like a stream of consciousness without any well-organized logical flow.

So here's the first and most important thing: **THANK YOU!** If I said nothing else in this column or on the altar this weekend, the biggest message that needs to be sent is my deep, abiding gratitude. THANK YOU for allowing me the privilege of being your priest these past 24 years (6 years as a weekend associate, 4 years as the full-time associate, 14 years as the pastor). Old St. Pat's is the finest church in the Catholic landscape and thus far, it has been the greatest blessing of my priestly life. I love this place and YOU, the church/the people who come from near and far to make it happen.

The next thing I'd like to say is *seek help and take care of yourself*. I stepped away from Old St. Pat's and priestly ministry because my tank was on empty. An image that I used early on in explaining where I found myself internally is that, in the fall of 2019, I felt my wheels were coming loose and my internal vending machine was showing nothing but Red lights, which means: I was drained. I will never ever be able to thank my family especially my sister Terri, my spiritual director, and my doctor for helping with their guidance and love. Standing before you on livestream last March 21, 2021 was the hardest thing I ever had to do. I never imagined stepping away from Old St. Pat's in that fashion (or active ministry for that matter) but I was one broken guy and my spirit needed renewing. Take care of yourself and don't apologize for it.

Another thought I'd like to share has to do with this time of transition. Before I came to Old St. Pat's full time, I was driving in a car with Fr. Jack Wall, my predecessor. This was probably back in the summer of 2002. We were driving up to Lake Geneva to meet Fr. John Cusick and Fr. Paul Novak for golf. He proposed the idea of me becoming the next pastor of Old St. Pat's. I told him he was nuts and that there was no way any one could follow him. He vehemently disagreed. Jack said to me emphatically: "if no one can follow me, then I've screwed the whole thing up. It's not about me. It's about the Mission!" Words I will never forget.

Ladies and Gentlemen of Old St. Pat's, I can't tell you how thrilled I am that another familiar face is becoming the next Pastor with Fr. Pat McGrath SJ. Pat is insightful, bright, loving, inspirational, funny (though not as funny as me), and a truly wonderful priest! He will be a GREAT leader and pastor for this special church. But remember the words Jack Wall spoke in that car ride: it's not about me! It's about the MISSION. Friends, it's not about me either. It's not about Pat. It has to be about the MISSION of the Gospel and how WE together are going to be true to the Welcoming, Inclusive, Merciful, Understanding, Loving, Generous, Others-Centered, Eucharistic, Mission Driven Church that's focused on the Risen Christ, NOT on us as individuals. Yes, pastors have to do the leading and we need (desperately) good pastors. You are blessed with an EXCELLENT pastor in Pat McGrath and the many other "pastors" who make up the staff and leadership of Old St. Pat's. KEEP IT GOING!!!!!! Put your arms firmly around Pat and the staff!!!! But remember: it takes ALL OF US!!!!

If you've been away from Old St. Pat's, COME BACK and KEEP THIS MISSION STRONG. I pray we are on the back end of this awful pandemic. It's caused a lot of pain and suffering in countless ways, as we all know. The City and the Church of Chicago needs Old St. Pat's to keep setting the example of what church life can and should be like. Don't just maintain this place. Keep it bold, energetic, and exemplary! Please, my prayer for Old St. Pat's is that this Mission will keep strengthening and getting better at what we're good at: Outreach, Liturgy & Music, our relationship and support of the best grammar school around, Frances Xavier Warde, the Kinship Initiative, Family life, Teen life, Young adults, Social Justice, the wisdom figures of Encore, hospitality, provocative adult formation, preaching, special events that bring people together, and our significant role of leadership in the city.

One last thing I need to share: I'm sorry. Though I tried to do my best, no one ever achieves it. I know I've messed up several times with staff and with the people. I was never trained as a manager and quite often it showed. I vividly remember times during my years here when I was not at my best. I said things from the altar that I regret to this day and I know there were occasions when my words hurt people. I'm really sorry for any of those times when our theologies, politics, or attempts at humor didn't line up.

Thank you for having me back here today. Old St. Pat's will forever be one of the most sacred places my life has ever encountered.

As for what's next with me..... I'm going to be at Marist High School (my alma mater) full-time, serving as the Vice President for Advancement and Ministry, doing some fundraising and celebrating masses, etc... LIVE THE LITURGY

Everyone wants to experience peace. When we look to the world to provide this for us, we can easily get disappointed. We associate peace with an absence of war and conflict, good relationships between neighbors and coworkers, the achievement of success and even the absence of noise! While all of these are worthy endeavors, pursuing them exclusively as a path to experiencing peace sets us up for failure. When we look for peace outside of ourselves, it will never be found. True and lasting peace is something that comes from within and not something we can produce on our own or receive from others. Peace is discovered when we experience an inner wholeness and harmony. It is born of a sense of connectedness with a God who is larger and greater than ourselves, gifting us with His presence. It is only the peace offered by the Risen Christ that can settle our hearts and calm our fears. Regardless of the degree of turmoil around us, this sense of completeness that Jesus gives anchors our boats and prevents us from sinking.

INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Jesus tells his disciples, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you." The peace that Jesus gives is far different than the kind that comes from the absence of war, conflict, or affliction. The peace that God offers is found alongside suffering and hardship, not necessarily in their absence. St. Teresa of Avila offers us a bit of wisdom regarding peace: "May today there be peace within. May you trust God that you are exactly where you are meant to be. May you not forget the infinite possibilities that are born of faith. May you not forget the infinite possibilities that are born of faith. May you use those gifts that you have received and pass on the love that has been given to you. May you be content knowing you are a child of God. Let this presence settle into your bones and allow your soul the freedom to sing, dance, praise, and love. It is there for each and every one of us."

In order for us to experience the divine peace that Jesus offers, we have to allow God's presence to settle into our bones!

It is only when this happens that we can be truly taught by the Holy Spirit to discern the true path to peace and find ourselves with untroubled hearts. The world and our lives are so unpredictable and changeable. If we look for a source of lasting and real peace only there, our search will never be satisfied. Something will always unsettle and disturb us. The Jewish disciples could really relate to what Jesus was saying about peace (shalom). They already knew that it was more a matter of achieving wholeness and wellbeing than anything else.

Wholeness and wellbeing are precisely what is uncovered when we begin to really see and know the height, depth, and breadth of God's presence and promise. The elegance of God's Divine life flows through our blood and the marrow in our bones. It is that close and deep. As we breathe in and exhale God's life, peace becomes what we know within and what is exhaled out. This remains in the midst of intense conflict, persecution, suffering, rejection, and even death.





Green Notes from OSP Green Team: Sustainable Gardening with Native Plants

"The more different types of plants we can restore, the more different kinds of birds, butterflies, and small mammals can live on the land. And the more different kinds of lifeforms we can keep with us on this planet, the better the chance that we, our children, and their children, will not only survive, but thrive in a balanced and beautiful world."

There's a growing movement in this country toward more sustainable gardens. People are looking for eco-friendly practices that reduce pollution, save time and money, and create beautiful home spaces. Decreasing the size of your lawn is an effective first step in creating a more sustainable yard. Extensive areas of mowed grass have no food for pollinators. Rainwater runoff from lawns treated with herbicides and synthetic fertilizers can adversely impact aquatic life in our streams, rivers, and lakes. A lawnmower driven for an hour puts out as much pollution as a car driven for 350 miles; lawn equipment is responsible for 10% of all smog producing pollution.

Replacing lawns with native wildflowers, grasses & shrubs is an important step in making a more sustainable yard. Native wildflowers and shrubs with a mix of plant heights and flowering times attract pollinators, provide food for birds, and add color throughout the growing season. Native ground covers and perennials are key players in a sustainable garden.



Saint Rita of Cascia Saint of the Day for May 22, 2022

Like Elizabeth Ann Seton, Rita of Cascia was a wife, mother, widow, and member of a religious community. Her holiness was reflected in each phase of her life.

Born at Roccaporena in central Italy, Rita wanted to become a nun but was pressured at a young age into marrying a harsh and cruel man. During her 18-year marriage, she bore and raised two sons. After her husband was killed in a brawl and her sons had died, Rita tried to join the Augustinian nuns in Cascia. Unsuccessful at first because she was a widow, Rita eventually succeeded.

Over the years, her austerity, prayerfulness, and charity became legendary. When she developed wounds on her forehead, people quickly associated them with the wounds from Christ's crown of thorns. She meditated frequently on Christ's passion. Her care for the sick nuns was especially loving. She also counseled lay people who came to her monastery.

Beatified in 1626, Rita was not canonized until 1900. She has acquired the reputation, together with Saint Jude, as a saint of impossible cases. Many people visit her tomb each year.


