



Liturgical Notes for the Week

Today celebrates The Epiphany of the Lord. This day's scriptures present a news worthy breaking idea and images of light, visitors, gifts and a STAR. The Gentiles are co-heirs, members of the same body and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel writes Paul and affirms us — non born Jews being here rejoicing in the revelation made known to all the world this day As we absorb this profound truth in our pondering as the chosen texts are proclaimed. May these words about light, visitors, gifts and a star add to this weeks remembrance of some very special saints. In the stillness of a silent night in Bethlehem, a light announced the birth of our savior. A star appeared in the east and shone with awesome brilliance on a humble stable. A star whose radiance was so dazzling that shepherds left their flocks to seek and adore the newborn king. A star whose rays ignited the sky and beckoned wise men from foreign lands, who knelt at the crib of the Christ Child. A star whose beams were so intense, they shattered the darkness of the earth and announce the ling-awaited Messiah: the savior not only of the Jews but of the world. A star whose light made all the difference. And today, Lord Jesus, we await we await your coming again. We yearn for your comfort and consolation. In a world fraught with violence and war, poverty and prejudice, we ling for your peace and justice, your power and glory, your goodness and light to shine in our hearts and in our lives. Maranatha! Blessing of the Home

It's the customary day to bless the home for the new year, although this blessing is fitting whenever you can gather the household in January. You can bless your home simply, praying the blessing below as part of mealtime grace. Or you can embellish this blessing by writing with chalk above the front door: "20+C+M+B+22" (the initials of the three holy kings Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar). Then everyone walks from room to room sprinkling the home with water, a sign of the River Jordan.

Prayer: God of Bethlehem and of Cana, God of Jordan's leaping waters, in baptism you bring us into your family. You wed us, embracing us as your beloved. May we fill this home we have made with kindness to one another, with hospitality to guests, and with abundant care for every stranger. By the gentle light of a star, guide home all who seek you on paths of faith, hope and love, where in heaven and peace on earth, now and for ever. Amen.

If there had been three wise women instead of three wise men, the story would've been a bit different.


- The women would have asked for directions instead of trying to follow a light in the sky.

Scripture Reflection

In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and selfabsorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being." Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important. We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure - but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life. One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals - Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?" That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it. The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. Why Do We Do That? Catholic Life Explained Question: What happens to a consecrated host if it accidentally falls to the ground?

Answer: This a very practical question because, as we all know, accidents happen, even during the most careful celebration of the liturgy. The short answer to this question is that nothing happens to the consecrated host. The Real Presence of Jesus remains in the consecrated host or any consecrated wine that might accidentally be spilled. Another question we might ask is: How should the ministers respond if the Eucharist is dropped or spilled? If this happens, the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion should immediately pick up the dropped host and consume it. If it is a case of the Precious Blood being spilled, the minister would use the purificator (and additional purificators if needed) to clean the spill and then the area should be reverently washed as soon as the Mass is over and the water poured into the sacrarium (a special sink that is located in church sacristies for reverently disposing of holy water, the water used to clean sacred vessels, etc.).

Question Of The Week

First Reading:

The prophet Isaiah foresaw a time of great joy for Israel when nations and kings would come to Israel praising the Lord. How do you show gratitude to the Lord for the great joys of your life?

Second Reading:

It was revealed to Paul that God intended to save all people (Jews and Gentiles) through his Son, Jesus Christ. Paul tried to convey the significance of this revelation to the Ephesians by using the language of "coheirs" and "copartners." What does this language signal to you?

Gospel:

The visit of the magi is one of the most well-known stories from the Gospel infancy narratives. It was an event that manifested God's revelation of His newborn Son to the world. It also foreshadowed the threat that some would experience because of Jesus. How does Jesus challenge the status quo even today?


Church Decoration Volunteers
