

## CALMING THE STORM WITHIN


In the gospel today, we find the apostles in a boat on the sea with Jesus. All of a sudden, a violent storm erupts. They were afraid for their lives. What seemed to bother the apostles maybe more than the storm was that Jesus was sleeping through it.

For a long time, this passage has been a metaphor for the spiritual life. We may not go through violent storms at sea, but we have other kinds of storms in our lives—such as emotional issues, health problems, financial worries, anxiety, and even a pandemic. And at times, even though we know Jesus is in the boat with us, we often yell out in prayer, “Don’t you care?” He’s there, but asleep.

In the first reading, it’s Job who experiences it. In the midst of his own storm of suffering he wants answers to why he has to go through what’s he’s been through. In his usual way, God doesn’t directly answer but instead points to a reality: God creates the universe, but it is a mysterious work of creation that’s intricate and involves things we’ll never truly know. God the Son is able to tap into the work of creation, and even control it, but as human beings we’re left to something else that God plants in our very being: the ability to trust.

Jesus says “Do not be afraid” more than any other phrase in the gospels. In the midst of storms, he may seem asleep but he’s still there. Sometimes we may mistake his silence as absence, but what Jesus is urging us to tap into is his presence.

The pandemic has been a storm for us on top of other very difficult things many have had to endure. It’s been rough sailing at different points; we find ourselves wondering why, and like Job, seeking answers and insights. That’s why I value being part of the Church and especially being here at Saint Hubert during these difficult storms. The church at Saint Hubert was designed to feel like we’re inside Peter’s fishing boat. And it’s been a powerful reflective point for me during the past year. What’s getting us through is having Jesus in the boat with us. We’re in it together, with him, and together we’ll get through.



### Welcome Bishop Jeffrey Grob!

Auxiliary Bishop Jeffrey Grob, who was ordained just this past November, is presiding today at the 10 AM Mass! Bishop Grob is the head of the Church in Vicariate 1, which encompasses northwest Cook County and all of Lake County. He is coming to introduce himself as he gets to know all of us in the Vicariate a little bit better. It will be a joyful welcome, especially because we can sing again!

### Home Again

Last Sunday was an incredible moment. We no longer have to limit the number of people who can be inside at Mass, which means we don’t have to sign up ahead of time either, we just have to show up. Many parishioners came to me after Mass with tears in their eyes saying they can’t believe how good it is to be there. They say it feels like being home again. We know for some it may take some time to feel comfortable to come back. Please know we’re here when you’re ready.

As we go through the months ahead, the storm of the pandemic seems to be calming a bit, but we know there’s still a leg of the journey left, much of it unknown. So, we continue to go forward together, in the same boat, allowing God’s grace and peace to fill us with his presence.

As we look at our lives and world events, do we ever find ourselves wondering if God is sleeping? After all, maybe God’s patient, unconditional love has run its course and He is finally fed up with humanity’s reluctance to accept the truth about who we are. God really can’t be that patient! All throughout human history, many have prayed to God for intervention or for particular needs. Because their prayers were not answered in the way they wanted or anticipated, they felt that God may have abandoned them. Were they right? It seems that we are continuing, at a rapid rate, down a path of destruction. Do you not care, God, that we may be perishing? When the boats of our lives are rocking and the seas tumultuous, we want to know that we have God’s attention. Even more so, we want God’s intervention.

Maybe the storms and the waves are necessary. If we listen, they can teach us valuable lessons. Without them, we would never learn that we have the strength to endure, understand the uselessness of fear and worry, or develop the ability to really trust. If God immediately rushed in and simply calmed things down before they got difficult, what good would that really be? We would miss opportunities to learn how to drink more deeply of life, treasure its complexity, irony, and beauty and fully engage ourselves in surrendering to the love of our Creator. It is easy to walk on the surface of life without immersing ourselves in its

messiness. Life has to burn its way through us in order to bring us to a place of secure trust. It’s unfortunate that some prefer a shallower journey.

That’s the balancing act that comes with faith. It is not God’s job to prevent us from encountering the torrential rains and winds of life. Many believe that if faith is done the right way, that God will provide for smooth sailing. That’s not how it works. God permits us to ride out the difficult stuff knowing that the storm will eventually be calmed. Do we not have faith that God will do this? True faith trusts in the steadfastness of God’s love when the seas are calm and when they are choppy. God’s unconditional loving presence shines through all of it and endures forever. Knowing this allows us to put our boats out into uncharted waters without hesitation. Knowing that we prefer the comfort and safety of what we know to be still waters, how do we feel when Jesus says, “Let us cross to the other side”?

## The Storm on the Lake

Several years ago I attended a seminar on religious experience where a woman shared this story:

A few years before this incident occurred her life had been rather settled. She had been happily married, her children were grown and on their own, and she and her husband were running a successful business together. Then it all fell apart. Her husband, a recovering alcoholic, began to drink. Within two years, they had lost everything, including each other. Their business went bankrupt, they lost their house, and their marriage fell apart. She moved to a new city and took a new job, but the pain of what she had lost lingered and she found herself constantly depressed and joyless as she sought to sink new roots, meet new people, and begin over again in mid-life.

Her frustration culminated one evening when, having worked late, she was driving home and stopped for a red light. While waiting for the light to change she was hit from behind by a drunken driver. (The irony wasn't lost on her.) Her car was badly damaged and she, suffering from whiplash and a series of cuts and bruises, was taken to hospital by ambulance. After several hours of x-rays, examinations, and medical treatment, near midnight, she was released, to be driven home by a policeman. As they drove up to her townhouse she noticed that the front door was wide open. Getting out of the car she realized that her home had been ransacked and vandalized. It was the last straw: All that penned up frustration, anger, loss, and grief finally burst, she lost control, began to scream hysterically, and ran across the lawn shouting curses at God and life in general - the policeman chasing her.

As she recalled this, she told us that she remembered exactly what was running through her mind as she ran across that lawn at midnight, hysterical, cursing, a policeman giving chase. Her anger and her questions were about God: "Where is God in all of this? Why is God letting this happen? Why is God asleep?" Then, just as she heard her own curses as an answer, suddenly, in one instant, everything became calm. She ceased running, stopped shouting, because she felt inside of herself a flood of calm and a peace such as she had never experienced in her life before. No magic lights went on, no divine voices were heard, and she made no claims of "miracle" afterwards, but, for one second she realized that, no matter the storm, no matter the loss, and no matter death itself, God is still in charge of this universe. One second of realization was all it took. Calm returned. She sent the policeman home and began cleaning up her house. She has essentially remained in that calm since.

The Synoptic gospels record the story of Jesus calming the waters during a storm on the lake. As Mark has it: With the coming of evening that same day, Jesus said to them, "Let us cross over to the other side". And leaving the crowd behind they took him, just as he was, in the boat; and there were other boats with him. Then it began to blow a gale and the waves were breaking into the boat so that it was almost swamped. But he was in the stern, his head on a cushion, asleep. They woke him and said to him, "Master do you not care? We are going down!" And he woke up and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, "Quiet now! Be calm!" And the wind dropped, and all was calm again. Then he said to them, "Why are you so frightened? How is it that you have no faith?" They were filled with awe and said to one another: "Who can this be? Even the wind and sea obey him." (Mark 4, 35-41).

The parallel between these two stories is clear. The deeper lessons contained within them though are perhaps less obvious, at least during the more stormy moments in our lives. In essence, both stories tell us that God is still in charge of this universe, every counter-indication notwithstanding. The first Christian creeds had only one line: Jesus is Lord! Ultimately that says enough, says it all. God still rules, even in death and darkness. But, as these stories also make clear, during the stormy moments of life, when our very souls are in fear of drowning, it will seem like God is asleep, comfortable, his head on cushion. But, and this is the real challenge of these stories, calm is only a second of realization away. What calms the storm in life is not that all of our problems suddenly disappear but that, within them, we realize that, because God is still in charge, all will be well - whiplash, bruises, ransacked houses, alcoholic spouses, lost houses, lost jobs, loneliness, and the shadow of death itself notwithstanding. All will be well because, even asleep with his head on a cushion, God is still lord.

## Entering Phase 5 Brings Some Changes

As the State enters Phase 5 of its Recovery Plan, the Archdiocese of Chicago has allowed for some significant changes. Here's a summary of what to expect at Saint Hubert as we adjust and go forward:

**Capacity Limits are Lifted, Which Means There's No Need to Sign-Up Ahead of Time.** We are able to fully open our doors, so you won't have to sign-up to reserve a place at Mass, and there's **no need to check-in when you arrive.** We have a place for you...maybe you'll even be able to sit in your "always place" again!

You'll also see that we've removed the ropes from the pews, which allows for more seating capacity. For those who would like to stay socially distanced you can do so by sitting in the dark brown chairs just inside the church doors and in the narthex. We also left up the crosses on the pews to help judge distancing as well.

**It's Time to Sing Again!** We'll be able to finally sing out loud like we've longed to do for well over a year. We're looking forward to singing Alleluia. The cantors, musicians and choir members must also follow the new protocols in place for wearing masks. Musical instruments in addition to keyboards are allowed.

**Park & Enter on Either Side of the Church.** We'll re-open the North entrance and the North parking lot. Feel free to park wherever you'd like and to enter and exit the church building on either side.

**New Recommendations for Wearing Masks.** As with most other public spaces, wearing a mask for those who are fully vaccinated is now optional; otherwise it is highly recommended. There is no requirement to show proof of vaccination. Please also note that all Eucharistic Ministers--priests, deacons and lay ministers--will continue to wear masks during communion. Presiders will continue to wear masks during the Eucharistic Prayer while consecrating the hosts.

**Hand Sanitizing.** Hand sanitizer will be available at the entrances of the church and is still highly recommended. Some of our greeters will also be on hand to welcome you and to help with this.

**Communion.** We will be able to approach the altar similar to the way we did before the pandemic. Instead of section by section, we'll now be able to approach pew by pew. The priest and deacon will be located in the center aisle allowing for two lines. The ushers are able to provide hand sanitizer for those who would like to clean their hands prior to receiving. For those who would like to resume receiving the Eucharist on the tongue, for the time being we ask that you use the center aisles only. There are certain protocols the ministers need to follow. We also will continue to refrain from offering the cup until further notice.

**This Weekend:** We will be filling the baptismal font and blessing the water before Masses on June 20. Eventually we will begin passing the collection baskets again. In the meantime, donation boxes and baskets are located by the doors.

## One Step at a Time

As the seating limitations are lifted, we're looking forward to welcoming in more and more parishioners. Please know our doors are open when you feel comfortable and ready to return. For those unable to return just yet, we continue to offer our on-line Sunday Masses.

As we move forward, no one knows with certainty what lies ahead, so we'll keep adjusting and adapting taking it one step at a time. Thank you to everyone for your patience and your diligence in working together to make sure we all feel safe in this sacred space we call our house of prayer. Whether we come in person, or feel it's best to stay connected on-line, we find ourselves together on Sundays singing a new song to the Lord week after week.

May the peace of Christ be with us always! We hope to see you this weekend!

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
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
