

Jesus knows well that Peter and the others still have a long way to go to become his Apostles!

At that point, the Teacher turns to all those who were following Him, clearly presenting them the path to follow: "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (v. 24). Always, today too, the temptation is that of wanting to follow a Christ without the cross; like Peter: "No, no Lord! This shall never happen". But Jesus reminds us that his way is the way of love, and that there is no true love without self-sacrifice. We are called to not let ourselves be absorbed by the vision of this world, but to be ever more aware of the need and





Statute of Limitations on Forgiveness

A statute of limitations is a law that sets the maximum amount of time that a party may initiate legal proceedings from the date of an alleged offense. It varies from state to state, from three years to ten. If you believe you have been mistreated by a company in Illinois, let's say, you have ten years from the time of the offense to begin legal proceedings.

My coined phrase, "statute of limitations on forgiveness" works slightly differently. It differs not state by state but person by person. It's the amount of time we refuse to forgive an offense. It

can last anywhere from a few seconds to a lifetime. It depends on the nature of the offense and how

I've forgiven some offenses on the

deeply it wounds us.

spot. A friend inadvertently makes an unfair remark about me and immediately apologizes.

But there have been other remarks that the statute of limitations on forgiveness took decades to expire. In my seminary days, a friend made a sarcastic remark about me in front of other friends, and I was deeply hurt by it. Never told him so, but I also didn't let it go, not for many, many years.

The grudges we hold on to most firmly are generally grounded injustice. What the person said or did to us was, in fact, really wrong/rude/unfair/ hurtful/immoral/unjust. And thus we nurture the wound, picking at the scab whenever we think of the incident, causing it to bleed afresh. In many cases, we never bother to tell the offender what the offense was. And if we have told him or her, we refuse to talk with the offender to initiate reconciliation. Our statute of limitations on forgiveness is very much in effect.

Jesus in an uncomfortable example here. It isn't that he just forgives immediately *after* the offense. He actually forgives in the midst of the offense, while the greatest of all injustices (killing an innocent man, murdering God even) is underway: "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do." Jesus has no statute of limitations whatsoever on his forgiveness.

Some age old practical advice to foster forgiveness includes making a decision to not retaliate, get even, punish, or wish ill on the offender. It also includes praying for the offender that God would bless him or her—this practice has been especially helpful for me. When it comes to serious offenses, it might involve talking to/confronting the

> offender--not to retaliate but to seek reconciliation. It certainly includes bringing up our resentments in the confessional!

And the most practical way

forward? Participate in the Mass. There is no better place to become increasingly aware that God's forgiveness is immediate and ongoing. This reality is made present and real again and again at every Mass, especially when the priest repeats the words, "This is my body, *given* for you."

Christ gives us himself, of course, for the forgiveness of our sins. We may refuse to accept this forgiveness by not acknowledging our sin, by not repenting, and thus the forgiveness is lost on us, to our grave misfortune. But from God's side, there is no statute of limitations on forgiveness.

On the cross "God was in Christ," St. Paul says, "reconciling the world to himself, not counting our sins against us." One wonderful aspect of St. Michael's architecture is the huge crucifix that greets us every time we enter the sanctuary. It is a powerful symbol of God's mercy that becomes real for us again and again in the Eucharist.
